#### **Church Office Remembrances**

Joan Chatterton, Church Secretary (1962-1967) and (1973-2005)

I have many meaningful memories of worship services over the sixty years I've worshiped at First Church. However, the "behind the scenes" workings of the church are where some of my fondest memories come from – all the caring members who, over time, have looked after each other and our church building, and the friends who helped out in the church office.

To begin with, Reverend Bill Fleming, the first pastor I worked with, came to visit us two years after we moved to Georgetown (1962) to ask my husband's permission, to ask me, to serve as Church Secretary! So much for women's rights in that era! That was the beginning. Back then the Pastor's Study was located where the choir robes hang today. I was ensconced in what is now the men's lavatory and my desk was exactly located where the toilet now resides, and it was "next door" to the big box that stores the organ blower. If the organist was practicing when I was at my desk, I would have to take phone calls in the pastor's office because of the noise coming from the blower! All of our equipment was secondhand, including the typewriter which had two keys that were always sticking and an old mimeograph machine that splattered ink. In 1991, during a trip to Washington, DC, and after stepping into history at the Smithsonian Institute, I spied my 1960's Royal typewriter in one of the displays!

After the addition to the church was built in 1992, we moved into luxurious roomy headquarters located in the new building! An article appeared in the *Georgetown Record* describing the addition to our historic building. The reporter exaggerated only slightly when he called the two office rooms a "suite". Pastor Phil joked, after reading the article, "where's the Jacuzzi?"

All of the folks, I'm about to talk about, have passed away, except for Lillian Grissino Sanford who now resides in an assisted living facility in Amesbury. In the mid 1980's she suffered through a divorce and had to go to work full-time to support her two youngest children. The skills she learned in the church office helped her obtain a job at Whittier VoTech. She later became secretary for the Northeast Area Office of the United Church of Christ, for many years located in Haverhill.

Carol Ann Knapp, Bob and Kim's Mom, was a stay-at-home mother, and spent many hours each week volunteering for the church and for Georgetown High School, in particular for the music department and marching band. She was a dear friend who died very suddenly in her early 40's, after a two-day illness. As a Church Family, we were devastated. The Sanctuary was packed at her Memorial Service; the Marching Band lined the sidewalk leading to the front doors. The office was bereft of her presence.

The others, spoken about here, were faithful members who often dropped in to visit, make suggestions, harass us, or hug us. Forrest and Clyde were retirees. Nat Tidd, who lived to be 100, telephoned at least twice a week.

Dom DeFilippo sang in the choir, had a beautiful tenor voice, and was an extraordinary

caregiver to his wife. Don Gammon, also a retiree, had suffered a heart attack and he took seriously, the admonishment of his doctor, to walk every day.

Thus, he received orders from our office to retrieve the church mail on his daily walk around town.

So these were the cast of characters: Forrest Bridges, and Clyde Tozier from the *Maintenance Department*; Don Gammon, the *Postman*; Dominic DeFilippo, the *Doctor*, Charlie Barton, the *Vicar of St. James*; Nat Tidd, the *InterNat*; Carol Ann Knapp, *My Gal Friday;* Lillian Grissino Sanford, *List Keeper*, and Pastor Phil Southwick, *The Boss.* 

Forrest and Clyde were synonymous with broken down coal furnaces, misbehaving plumbing, miscellaneous carpentry and painting tasks, and when I phoned them with the latest mishap, the calls were always answered cheerfully. After fixing "whatever", there was always a round of freshly brewed coffee with conversation.

When St. James Episcopal Church was around the corner on West Main Street (now the site of the Noack Organ Company), Vicar Charlie Barton came over for his cup of coffee on Fridays, and to get his Sunday bulletin run off on our mimeograph machine. It was an opportune time to share his joke of the week, made palatable because of his charming Australian accent!

On Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, the old colonial soldier marched in with a broad smile, a hearty laugh and a bag full of mail from the Post Office. Remember the days before email? Don Gammon, our gregarious Postman, was a walking history lesson of colonial times nurtured because of taking part in reenactments of the revolutionary wars.

Dominic, a stalwart anchor of the Choir, liked to pop in when he was out on shopping errands for his wife, Myrtle, who was a shut-in. One day I was overjoyed to see him as my finger had gotten stuck in the mimeograph. No one was around and I was starting to panic. Dom ran to the kitchen, grabbed a soup ladle and was able to lift the bar where my finger was wedged. From that day on, he was lovingly called the Office Doc.

The Inter*Nat* (feisty Nat Tidd) never failed her duty to advise and inform on any important doings around Georgetown, and also educated us as to "who was related to who"! She regularly checked in by phone.

Lillian and Carol were regulars in the Church Office. Carol, My Gal Friday, started coming in on Fridays to proofread the bulletin. Soon she was trying hard to organize me with regard to other projects! She was constantly causing wonderful havoc with her whirlwind creativity (Church School, Junior Choir, Trustees, General Housekeeping). Carol did it all, in her uniquely charismatic way, while Pastor Phil and Secretary Joan were hard-pressed to keep up with her!

Lillian was also an organizer: posters for Couples Club projects, making lists for Diaconate duties and Fair events. Then there were *more* lists. Lillian was the most famous list maker we've ever known!

Both women helped to proofread yards of mimeograph stencils while holding them up to the light and peering through the little typewritten holes! Then Joan donned her chef's apron to churn the old machine which splashed ink, unceremoniously, onto the operator! Fortunately we were blessed with some new equipment in the late 1980's.

No one appreciated this unusual "Office Staff" more than Phil Southwick. The door to his office was always open and welcoming. Morning coffee was a shared event with lots of laughs. We cared about each other, and the myriad programs and activities of our church's ministry, and we were *Family*.
