FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH OF GEORGETOWN, MASS. PASTOR'S REPORT FOR 1954

.....

We have completed our first Church Year under the new constitution. It has been a brief year because of the change of the time of the Annual Meeting. The new machinery is still a bit stiff, for here and there we have been held up by time lags which, of course, are inevitable when one system builds upon another. We need to oil the wheels so that the machinery, which is good machinery, will run easily.

The need for patching and renovating the fabric of the Church has caused the responsible officials some concern and essential work has been done and paid for. I would like the finance committee to recommend to the Church in the near future some means whereby we can raise money sufficient for the painting of the Sanctuary and whatever else we think fit.

We have been seeking to guarantee the future of our Church by stressing the training of our youth. This year, besides an active Senior Pilgrim Fellowship, we are in the process of organizing a Junior Pilgrim Fellowship, and to the lively Church - sponsored Camp Fire Girls has been added a strong Blue Bird group.

No Church is alive which is unconcerned about the needs of the world around. In our fellowship this Christian concern is specifically expressed in the World Service Committee and the Social Action Committee, both pioneer committees seeking to find the true meaning of Christian service in the world.

The recently admitted new Church members are beginning to take an active part in the leadership of our Church and others are requesting membership in our fellowship.

Our Church attendance for the year beginning September 1953 to the end of July 1954 averaged 125.

One index to the strength of a Church is the voluntary work cheerfully done for the sake of Christ. Not only have we performed the long and arduous work of removing the old chimneys from the Church building but have just completed the second coat of paint on the Parsonage - most commendable work for busy people.

The new Church year promises to be a year of rare challenge to our Christian perseverance and foresight. I believe that this can be a year of unparalleled growth in our fellowship, and I pray that each and every one of us will be blessed with the knowledge of God's presence as we re-dedicate ourselves to the work of the Kingdom.

Acting as the result of votes of the First Congregational Church and the First Congregational Society at their annual meetings held on Jan. 19, 1954 both groups met in joint meeting on Feb. 8, 1954 voted respectively to merge and incorporate under the name of The First Congregational Church of Georgetown, Inc. and adopted a Constitution and By-Laws record of which is made elsewhere. Records of the meetings and votes were duly submitted to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Department of Corporations and Taxations and a Charter of Incorporation was issued by the Secretary of the Commonwealth as of Feb. 11, 1954.

membersOn date of Incorporation there were 284 members and 15 Associate members.

There have been 3 special meetings held during the year to consider adding to and withdrawals from the membership lists.

- 42 New members have been taken into the Church which includes
 - 22 by Confession of Faith
 - 5 by Baptism and Confession of Faith
 - 13 by letter of transfer
 - 2 by special vote of the Church
- 4 Members were lost
 - 1 by death
 - 2 by transfer
 - 1 stricken from list as having joined elsewhere


This represents a net gain of 38 members to a new all time high of 322 members.

The Cabinet is composed of twenty-one members representing the Officers and each organization of the Church.



SUNDAY CHURCH SCHOOL REPORT
OCTOBER 14, 1954

The period of time that our report should cover includes two quarter's work in the church school. During the winter Quarter we studied How the Church Grows, and in the Spring Quarter we studied the very important topic of Christian Living In Our World. At the present time our students are concentrating on the Life of Christ.

This year has been one of changes in our church and in our church school. However, one constant we have, is a very fine staff of teachers and officers who meet monthly for instruction and for discussion of church school situations. This Fall many are attending the Intercommunity Institute of Christian Education in Topsfield and are studying the "Life of Christ", Worship as it pertains to church school, and methods of teaching their own particular age group. We cannot praise our staff too highly for they have given very unselfishly of their time and energies. These people come every Sunday morning and must of necessity spend weekday hours in preparation for Sunday. The church owes these people a large vote of thanks for a job well done, for they are essential in fostering attitudes in Christian Living.

Unfortunately Some of these people have found it impossible to continue to help us this year, and we have the following changes.

Nursery Class--Mrs. Shelia Kelly and Mrs. Belle Jones

Kindergarten -Mrs. Dorothy Blanchard is serving temporarily assisted by Suzanne Elliott

Primary Department--Mrs. Marion Tapin has replaced Mrs Coulthard who is teaching the Junior High Girls

Mrs. Hatch has come in to teach the newly created 4th Grade Boys Class.

Jr. High Department--Dr. Harold Wagner is teaching the Jr. High boys--he says temporarily, but we are hoping he will decide to be with us for the year at least.

We have two important secretaries one is Mrs. Marion Poor who is helping to keep the class records and other church school data in order, and Mr. Harold Elliott who is our financial secretary.

The adoption of the new constitution has helped us considerably because of the formation of a Board of Christian Education who have largely taken over the responsibility of deciding Church School policy and expenditures. It was largely through this Board's Efforts that Many changes were made this last year.

The church school hour was changed from 10:00 to 9:45 A.M. For we found that the former hour ~~really~~ gave us 45 minutes for Christian Learning; we felt this was not sufficient. The new time change also gave us a little leeway in preparing the rooms for the kindergarten and Nursery Classes who have to meet at 11 o'clock.

At our Children's Day Service the children who graduated from the Primary to the Junior Department were given Standard Revised Versions of the Bible. This is an innovation we adopted to make this new, more easily read Bible available to our young people. At this point it would be well to remind all that these children have to be present 70 % of the church school year and that they have certain memory work to master in order to earn their Bibles.

Many of our teachers helped at the Daily Vacation Bible School which Mrs. Coulthard Superintended. Those who attended were largely our own Congregational youngsters and we felt that we had a very successful two weeks.

The Board of Christian Education also voted to sponsor two delegates Suzanne Elliott and Susan Nichols to a week's study at the Norther New England School of Religious Education at Lake Winnebepesauke.

We always have goals toward which we are striving. The church has for the last two years included \$800.00 in the budget for the church school. The youngsters have contributed between \$400 and \$500 in their offerings, and unfortunately very little of the rest of the money has been available to us to use for Church School needs.

As we look ahead to the next year we would like to see a church building with its rooms painted and in good condition to teach our children that people do care about our church and to create an attitude of appreciation for "God's House"; so in the years to come our church will be maintained in good condition instead of being allowed to deteriorate as it has been doing for years. We are very glad to see that efforts are being made to improve

our building, but these must be speeded up in order to show that we really care. Right now we are unconsciously teaching them that church doesn't really matter very much.

We started our Fall Quarter with a Family Get Together Supper on Friday September 17 followed by a fine Family Sunday Service. This is a start toward the goal for which we are constantly striving--family cooperation in Christian Education. The Congregational Church publishes and advocates the use of Pilgrim Series which is the course that has been used in the church for quite awhile. They and we frankly admit that one hour on Sunday morning is not sufficient Christian Training for any young person. Therefore, we need the family's help to follow through. This year we have made the Family Books that go with each Quarter's work, available at 50 cents a copy. If you haven't secured your copy of "Christmas Here--Christmas There". I would urge you do so quickly. ~~IN~~ Pilgrim Series in order to be effective needs the Church Half and the Home Half--if you are not sure how you can help contact your child's teacher.

We also wish to thank the Couples Club for their assistance financially and physically in repair work on the parsonage which has been painted, partially reshingled, and reguttered. The barn partially renovated has a new roof and the grounds have been cleared.

It is hoped that our repair and paint funds may be expanded in order that future requirements may be taken care of without special financial drives.

Report from the Board of Trustees to the Annual Meeting
of the First Congregational Church of Goergetown---October 14, 1954

To the Members--

The Board of Trustees has, under the new constitution, been in office only since last spring. This report covers only that part of the year since this present Board has been operating.

The Board has met the second Tuesday of each month, except during July and August.

The following work has been approved and carried out:- repairs to the windows which have been in very poor condition for years, construction of a storage cabinet for Sunday School supplies, remodeling of Men's lavatory, removal of Chimneys and plastering throughout the Church. In addition to these major jobs, there have been the usual, numerous maintenance operations.

Also the Board has hired a special police officer for the protection of the Church property on the nights of July 3 & July 4 and has approved a like arrangement for Haloween.

The insurance program of the Church has been enlarged by the addition of \$1000.00 worth of fire insurance on the contents of the Church (no part of which is organ coverage). Also an accident policy with \$5000-\$10,00 coverage has been added to protect the Church against possible law suits brought by persons injured on the Church property. Due to the recent weather pattern, it seemed advisable to add extended coverage to all fire insurance policies on the buildings to guard against any future storm damages. This is now being cared for.

The Board wishes to thank the Couple's Club for the extensive work it did in removing the chimneys and for work done on the parsonage and barn. Without their assistance the work could not have been done without greatly increased expense.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVERY MEMBER CANVASS

Jan. 19, 1954

Approximately 45 canvassers went to work on the afternoon of Sunday Nov. 8, 1953 to obtain pledges in order to meet our 1954 budget. With so many helping hands the burden on each one was much lighter than in other years.

To date 183 pledges have been turned in which total as follows:

Although the goal was not reached the results of the canvass must be considered satisfactory and the canvassers should be congratulated that their efforts far exceeded any previous canvass.

A revised budget with the canvass result in mind although not providing for all that we had wished will nevertheless enable us to have a successful year and if the pledges are paid should find us at least as well off in 1955 as at this time.
