# PASTOR'S REPORT FOR 1955

The most obvious physical achievement this year has been the painting of the interior of the Church. To this project our people responded so well that the completion of the payment will cause no financial burden to the church authorities.

The building, as a whole, is in good repair.

Work began on the kitchen and I understand that the Trustees intend to continue that work this year.

I would like in this report to congratulate the Trustees on their work on the Church property in general.

One encouraging sign this year has been the active part which newly received members have taken during during the year. in the work of the Church.

That our Church is reaching out into larger work is evidenced by the certificate of commendation received for the substantial increase in our Christian service in the world.

Both senior and junior Pilgrim Fellowships were active and maintained a high percentage of attendance at their meetings.

The Camp Fire Girls and the Blue Birds which the Church sponsored have grown so rapidly that it has become necessary to divide the groups. This means that our own people are supervising the work of our own children.

This is a growing Church in an enlarging community. The recent religious census indicated that there are more people interested in this Church than in all the rest of the churches put together.

It is our responsibility, therefore, - yours and mine - to see that newcomers who are brought in are able to find a helpful spiritual atmosphere. Such an atmosphere is not created by deacons or minister but by the whole Christian fellowship.

This is the biggest thing we have to do this coming year.

To bring this about I recommend:

- 1. a new interest in the Bible
- 2. a revived sense of the need of a week-night devotional meeting
- 3. a deeper understanding of theplace of the Christian home.
- 4. an increased interest in Church attendance.

Church organizations - as organizations - are not inspired by the Spirit of God. God works through men and women, men and women who dedicated to His work.

In that condition is our guarantee for a successful Church year.
