THE MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER

During the Summer, I was talking with a young man in our town and commented during the conversation that I thought that he ought to be coming to Church. His reluctance in agreeing was distressing although not at all surprising. In giving this incident considerable thought in the intervening weeks, the following conclusion has come to mind: such a person (and there are many in our town) does not come to Church because they see little reason for coming. It is our task as Church-goers and supporters to show them good cause why they ought to come.

Our Church has much to offer - good facilities which we are constantly improving, an excellent Church School, groups for virtually all age groups, and we hope, a message of hope which excels all else. This message, the Gospel of Christ, must be taken to all men. We have spread it around the world and into every country on the face of this earth, but it still needs to be spread abroad in our little town, and especially among those who have heard it so much, they now hardly stop to listen. The "unchurched" in our community, and those who do not come to Church, can be our next effort. The must show them why the Church needs them; more importantly, we must show them why they need the Church.

This past year tells of considerable advance in physical facilities - a beautifully renovated kitchen, Metcalf House - a miraculous change, work already begun on the Church Library. But our greatest area of concern now lies in the spiritual realm. It is here that we shall really advance the Kingdom of God.

Christian Education

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Board of Christian Education has met at least once each month at members' homes, since September 1959, except during the month of July.

Delegates have attended most of the Cabinet and Church School Teachers meetings, providing refreshments at each of the latter sessions. Coffee and doughnuts were also provided by this committee after worship services during September 1959, and at the all-day workshop in the Bradford Church in September 1959.

Other projects and events sponsored included a very popular Christmas Family Workshop, Christmas Pageant, basketball team, God and Country classes, Parents Night in May (not supported by parents), Childrens Sunday and Vacation School.

Present members of the Board include the Minister, Student Assistant, Church School Superintendent, Harry Bedell; Chairman, Mrs. Brunel Christiansen; Clerk, Mrs. James Blair; Albert Perley, Kenneth Tripp, and recently elected member, Mrs. Maurice Spaulding. Mrs. Lewis Pingree served as Chairman and Mrs. Christiansen as Clerk during the 1959 and 1960 season. During the year, Harry Bedell replaced Mrs. Charles Blanchard who resigned as Superintendent. Mrs. Dorothy Reed assisted as Superintendent for a period and we are grateful to these people for their service and to each Church School teacher.

The work load of the Board is increasing each year and the group may require more members in the near future. Maintaining a competent teaching staff is an ever present problem. The housing situation will be remedied somewhat by the opening of Metcalf House. We are deeply indebted to two dedicated workers on this project, Mr. Brunel Christiansen and Mr. Bedell. Other workers have also given much time and energy, but without these leaders we would still be waiting.

The proposed budget is approximately \$1,000, which does not include equipment for Metcalf House. A number of new books were purchased for the library.

This committee has a great responsibility and is still educating itself in the duties and potentialities of our Church. Each Church member should give thoughtful consideration as to how he or she can add at least one extra hour each week (other than in worship service) to the cause of Christian Education.

REPORT OF THE CRURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

The position of Superintendent of the Church School was vacant for the major portion of the Church School year. After organizing the Church School in September 1959, Mrs. Charles Blanchard requested a leave of absence which terminated in her resignation in January 1960. In March 1960, the Board of Christian Education, after searching diligently for someone outside their conditient to serve in this position without success, requested that I take over as Superintendent and selected Mr. Kenneth Tripp to serve on the Board in my place. I wish to take this opportunity to thank Mrs. Blanchard for her efforts in setting up the program for last Fall.

The year 1959-60 found our Church School serving 257 young people from the age of three years through the junior-high-school age. Our staff numbered 27. Our average attendance was 85%. The curriculum used throughout the year was the Pilgrim Series material published by the Congregational publishing house. The themes for the entire school from first grade through junior high were as follows:

> Fall - Our Church Winter - How the Church Grows Spring - Christian Living in Our World

The nursery and kindergarten programs, though not a part of the Pilgrim Series, acquainted the children with the world around them; God's presence in it; the Great Teacher, Jesus; and living with others.

A senior high class, a "Study Hour", was started in the early evening in conjunction with Pilgrim Fellowship. However, lack of interest made this venture short lived.

In addition to our regular offering, of which the collection on the first Sunday of each month is set aside for the mission field, special offerings were taken for the Home for Little Wanderers at Thanksgiving, The Roxbury Intercity Project at Christmas, and Share Our Surplus in the Spring. Individual classes also made scrapbooks and sent them to India and collected seeds to send to Honduras.

Our major problems this past year have been two-fold. First, the lack of enough interested and devoted people to properly staff our Church School. It is just impossible for <u>one</u> person to handle 25 to 50 youngsters and try to impart some Christian teaching to them in an hour a week. Secondly, the problem of space was ever with us this past year, but the purchase and subsequent renovation of The Metcalf House has relieved this situation for the present.

A teacher-training institute was held in September 1959 to prepare all teachers for the coming year. Monthly teachers meetings were held throughout the year to coordinate the Church School program and provide training and background education for the teachers.

REPORT OF THE CHIRCE SCHOOL SUPERENTINDENT

I wish to thank the too teachers who forewent their opportunity to attend summer conferences due to the poor financial condition of our Church last Summer. These conferences provide a wonderful occasion for excellent training and inspiration. I sincerely recommend that more teachers be given the opportunity to attend in the future.

I wish to interject a word of caution. We are growing and fast. Our enrollment as of October 2, 1960 is already equal to last year's. We can no longer operate a Church School with the dozen faithful teachers that have perved for many years. Georgetown will continue to grow and the Church will grow. Our ideas and ideals must keep pace.

In conclusion I wish to thank the Board of Christian Education, Mr. Robert Bradstreet, and especially the fine staff of teachers who helped make the year a successful one.

REPORT OF THE PILGRIM FELLOWSHIP

The Pilgrim Fellowship started last year's season with a drive for new members. We gave a free chicken pie dinner to any prospective member on the first Sunday. The second Sunday we followed up with a feature length movie. The meetings from then on consisted of a program and a short worship service almost every week. The programs included mainly speakers and movies from one of four categories - Faith, Fellowship, Service and Action. To finance our various programs and activities we held two paper drives and a "Sounds of the Great Bands" dance. In order to bridge the gap that forms between most youth groups and the adult Church members, we donated one-hundred dollars toward a new projector. We also supplied free baby sitting for Couples Club members on their meeting nights. We had about seventy names on our roster and we averaged about forty-five members a week. This was polished off with our annual retreat to Thorn Mountain in Jackson, New Hampshire.

Summing it up we feel we have a lot of room for improvement but we still managed to make a lot of improvement over the year before.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The past year has been one of material rogress. The Church properties have been maintained, and long delayed improvements have been accomplished.

Throughout the year the business of the Trustees has been conducted toward the full measure of our responsibility: maintaining the Church properties within the bounds of prudent spending.

The most important project carried through, covered repairs and painting of the front and north side of the Church. New copper gutters were installed which will give us years of service. The lead and oil paint that was used should stand up longer than previously used formulas. The Trustees hope that further work on this project can be carried forward this next year thereby completing the exterior work on the Church.

Total budget for the year was \$1800.00. Total expenditures amount to \$1556.92. The \$1995.00 for exterior work mentioned above was voted as a separate appropriation by the Church members.

The Trustees wish to thank all the individuals and committees for their help and cooperation during the past year. Our thanks also to the many firms who have been fair in their costs and charitable in their discounts.

In 1959 the General Council recognizing its responsibility for the spiritual well being of our colleges and students announced its purpose of raising \$7,500,000 during a two-year period. This project is known as CHEF. This Church has responded by accepting its quota of \$2000 and designating a proportion of the regular missionary offering for that purpose.

Sunday School Renovation (Metcalf House)

PROGRESS REPORT of the SUNDAY CONCOL RESIDVATION COUNTTEE

The remodeling of our house on Clark Street has been carried forward with all possible haste, but due to the condition of the property and the extensive repairs and alterations necessary, it has taken more time than anticipated.

All this, notwithstanding, we have accomplished much and will occupy the premises shortly,

The first work on the property by work parties consisted of cleaning out all the debris and removing all the accumulation of rubbish. Our committee then proceeded with its work. Two chimneys were removed. Wall between the halls and rooms on the first and second floors were taken out. Three ceilings beyond repair were ripped down and all wallpaper removed from the walls.

A new electric service of 100 amp. was put in and all wiring replaced. A completely new heating system using oil was put in which includes ductwork to all rooms. Besides this we installed an exhaust system for the downstairs lavatory.

New ceilings were put in where needed and all walls were plastered or spackled. At this writing nearly all the interior painting has been completed.

All old plumbing was removed and replaced with copper. Lavatories have hot and cold water and all fixtures have been reconditioned with new faucets, etc. One new fixture installed and rooms are equipped with large plate glass mirrors.

Modern light fixtures for the classrooms are all in as well as new light fixtures for the lavatories, hall and stairways.

Floors were reinforced and repaired where some bad conditions existed. Three classroom floors upstairs which were in fair condition were painted and all other floors are done over in tile with an underlay of masonite. Vinyl stairtreads to be used on stairs.

Approximately twenty windows were repaired resetting many with new glass.

Exterior repairs were made on the rear of the house with new gutters and trim included. All outside doors were rehung to swing out, two new rear porches built and handrails put on each side of the front steps. Fire escape from second floor was built.

Recommendations by the State Safety Commissioner who we called in for consultation have been followed and we feel all members of the Church should be apprized of this fact.

Only a few hours work is needed to complete interior painting. Draperies which are on order will be hung as soon as received and the furnishings will be moved in as each room is ready.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REMOVATING CONTINUES

Exterior painting will proceed only to the extent allowed by weather and available volunteers. Last but not least will be a general dressing up of the grounds and reseeding of some of the lawn.

An arount of 5500 was allowed our connittee for this renovation. Any increase, if any, will be due to a few of the unforseen problems.

The committee visces to thank all the individuals who gave so willingly of their time and telents on everything that has been done. We will still need the cooperation and some time from everyone to help to finish this project.

REPORT OF THE KITCHEN COMMITTEE

The Committee appointed to renovate the Kitchen have received in addition to the \$1500 voted from the Improvement Fund the following:

Preliminary Survey Board

PRELIMINARY REPORT OF THE SURVEY BOARD SPECIAL MEETING - THURSDAY, JANUARY 28, 1960

The Survey Board was formed to investigate the needs of the church, and after evaluation of our present facilities, to make recommendations for action by the church to provide for future expansion and improvement of our present program.

The problems to be discussed in this report are so pressing that the Survey Board felt that immediate action by the church was necessary to deal with them, since to wait until the annual Spring Meeting could have resulted in additional expense as well as seriously affecting our operation in several critical areas.

Our initial action was to look into the work done by the Long Range Planning Committee which preceded us, to avoid duplicating their efforts. The report presented by a local architect to that committee presents an excellent picture of the condition of our building. That report, somewhat abridged, forms a part of this report since the problems outlined are the same, made worse if possible by two more years of overcrowding and neglect.

Exterior and Site

When the church was built, the parking problem was far in the future with the result that today there is almost no space left on the site for any amount of automobile parking. This situation will likely become more of a problem in the future.

Also as a result of the location on the site, the main entrance is seldom used, it being more convenient to use the side entrance.

Sunday School Facilities

Typical of older churches, no provision was made in the planning for a comprehensive teaching program such as we have today. There are no rooms specifically designed for individual classes. For optimum effectiveness a classroom should have good light, heat and ventilation, provision for permanent cabinets, chalkboard and tackboards, sound separation from other classes. Without these factors it is very difficult, especially for an amateur teacher, to conduct a class with any degree of effectiveness.

At present all usable areas are being utilized as classrooms. Other than the Nursery, only three areas are separate rooms where classes can be conducted without mutual interference. Classes are being held in both balconies of the second floor. These areas are not satisfactory in that they interfere with the use of the sanctuary for other purposes and do not have permanent equipment.

Classes now being held in the Primary Room and the Vestry operate under considerable difficulties. Nearly all of the essentials of a functional classroom are absent.

Aside from the aforementioned shortcomings, none of the classroom areas has the attractiveness in appearance which can go a long way toward creating a pleasant atmosphere that is condusive to learning.

In view of the importance to be attached to the teaching of the Gospel, it appears that the program operating under the present circumstances must be quite inefficient compared with its potential under more favorable conditions.

Recreation

The Vestry is the center of activity for most functions of a recreational nature. In size it appears adequate for all but the more active games. Some disadvantage results from the three columns in the room. The platform appears to be inadequate for effective use for many activites requiring a stage. Headroom at the front of the platform is insufficient.

Artificial lighting in this area is completely adequate. The heating system causes some difficulty due to noise of the fans. Also sound is transmitted to the floor above through the duct system.

The Kitchen, which is part of the recreational facilities, leaves much to be desired but can be improved somewhat without great expense.

Utility

The heating system, being recently installed, is in good condition. The principle drawbacks of this system lie in the sound transmission through the ductwork to the Sanctuary and the fan noise both upstairs and downstairs. Avoidance of these annoyances would have involved a larger expenditure for fans of a different type. Some of the noise can be eliminated by reducing fan speeds. However, this will slow the response and reduce the capacity of the system somewhat.

Condition of Building

With the exception of a few items the building is structurally sound. Some settlement of the crossover balcony in the Narthex is noticeable. Some of this apparently has occurred within the last few years.

There is some evidence of settlement in the exterior walls indicating either decay in the sills or settlement of the foundation walls themselves.

There is some decay in the steps at the main entrance but inasmuch as these steps are seldom used attention to this condition can be postponed for some tiem.

Some items of maintainence will require attention within 3-5 years such as exterior painting, roof patching and sash glazing. The roofing itself should be good for another ten years or more but there is evidence of leakage indicating needed repairs to flashing.

The steeple appears to be structurally sound.

The interior is in average condition and improvements in the decorations can be undertaken whenever desired. There are no conditions requiring immediate attention in order to preserve the building.

Summary

The foregoing analysis of present facilities is of a critical nature in order to point out areas in which the building falls short of meeting the requirements of an up-to-date church program. This information is essential to making sound decisions as to future course of action. Realizing the inadequacy of our present physical plant, as shown above, consider the following facts:

- 1. Georgetown has grown in the past 10 years from 2411 to 3500 people (1960 estimate). This is an increase of 45 per cent.
- 2. In the same period, our church membership has increased from 202 to 327. This is an increase of 63 per cent.
- 3. As an indication of how much more active our membership has become, our average church attendance has increased by 78 per cent, with a corresponding increase in the membership and activity of almost every church connected organization.
- 4. Our Church School, never adequately quartered, has increased from 193 to 301 members. This has worked a hardship not only on the pupils, but on the teachers as well.
- 5. Our kitchen, the center of activity for every supper, fair, and most other social functions sponsored by the church, has become completely inadequate for its purpose, and has in addition fallen into deplorable disrepair. This is an extremely sore point with anyone who has had to prepare a meal for a group. This is a very important part of our plant since it plays such a large part in all our fund-raising affairs.
- 6. The parking problem has been aggravated by the increase in attendance both in church and church school, since early arrivers for church find all the convenient parking spaces taken by parents waiting to pick up their children from church school, and late comers find the same spaces occupied by those already in church.
- 7. There is a serious lack of "live" storage space everywhere in the building. This inevitably leads to inconvenience and in many instances loss or damage to equipment that would last longer if kept out of the way.
- 8. Since the only room now available for meetings of a moderate size is the vestry, providing heat for meetings of this type represents a considerable expense.
- 9. Again due to overcrowding, our choir which presents an outstanding music program throughout the church year, suffers great inconvenience from lack of adequate robing space, music storage space, and on Sunday mornings, from inability to use the organ for practice until the classes which meet in the choir loft have finished their work.

10. There is a definite need for a church office, separate from the ministers study.

These are not, we realize, all of the areas in which improvement is needed. They do represent, however, some of our more pressing problmes, and since the Survey Board has resolved to work on a "first things first" basis, we have assigned top priority in our recommer lations to two of the items on the list. We find that in dealing effectively with these two areas, we can solve a great many problems.

It became apparent early in our discussions that in order to expand in any direction, we require more land. There is not sufficient land to do any building now or at any future time except directly in front of the church. It seemed preferable to investigate the possibility of expansion to the side or rear of our present property. Inquiry revealed that the property directly behind the church was about to be placed on the market. This property is approximately one acre in area, and would provide adequate room for any future construction plan, however ambitious. The two family dwelling on this property has been examined by a disinterested party, and is, in his own opinion as well as ours, structurally sound, although major renovation will be required to make it useful for our purposes.

It is our recommendation that this property be acquired as soon as possible, and the building renovated for temporary use as church school space. By this we will acquire the following room for expansion:

4 classrooms 12¹/₂ x 24 (approx.)
1 boys room
1 girls room
1 small storage room
1 large entrance hall and cloakroom
1 kitchenette if desired
1 garage usable for storage or some other purpose

This space would allow transfer of our four largest classes during the 9:30 session of church school and the entire pre-school group at 11 o'clock. Crowded conditions would be eased considerably in the church building at 9:30 and the regular 11 o'clock worship service would be conducted without the distracting influence of the church school activities directly below.

Another advantage would be that a complete rearrangement of the vestry area would not be required between 10:30 and 11 o'clock every Sunday morning. This has worked a considerable hardship on the sexton, and also presents the possibility of injury to any of the small children who get in the way of tables and chairs being moved.

We further recommend that the kitchen be renovated without further delay. This project was approved several years ago, and the money (\$1,000) appropriated but never raised. The need for adequate kitchen facilities is now more urgent than ever before. The advantages of this proposal need no explaining to anyone who has worked in our present kitchen.

Summary

The recommendations contained in this report are not offered as a final solution to our problems. We do feel however that action on them would be of lasting benefit to the church, and would relieve the pressure in these two critical areas for a long enough period to allow a long range improvement program to be at least well started. The Improvement Fund is yielding enough income to easily support these two projects, and we sincerely believe that once something concret has been done to improve our program, this income will increase.

Only through faith can we move ahead. The response to Spring Canvass was a beginning. We are now in a position to make an even more decisive indication of our faith in God, our future, and ourselves. Let us not be found lacking.

Finance

FIMANCE COM ITTEE REPORT

The past year has been a very eventful year for the Finance Connittee. It was the first year following our extensive Every-Member Canvass; it has seen the Church expand physically; and it has also seen rejor improvements and repairs. As a result of the latter two events, it has also seen some major expenditures.

Taking first the church-giving during this year following the Every-Member Cenvass, we found that the actual giving had fallen behind our pledged giving by about 25% at the end of the first half of our financial year. Also, at about the same time, we were engaged in a canvass for 1960-1961 funds. The returns from the canvass at that time indicated that the pledged giving would be lower this year, the reason for this being that many of the previous year's inactive pledges were removed which would give a more realistic forecast of 1960-1961. As a result of the abovementioned problems, the Finance Committee turned to the Church and the Cabinet to balance the budget. It was the decision of the Cabinet to try to raise additional money from outside sources rather than cutting back on Church expenses.

Secondly, the Church has purchased additional land and buildings, now called Metcalf Rouse, at 12-14 Clark Street. The financing of this [8,000 investment has been through a [1,000 down-payment and a [7,000, eight-year mortgage. It is the intention of the Finance Committee to pay double monthly payments on this mortgage with a goal of 4-5 year completion. The money for this program is to come from the Improvement Fund.

Thirdly, the Church has entered on a program for improvements and major repairs to the Church, the first of which is the work on the hitchen. The Church voted to give the Kitchen Committee [1,500 from the Improvement Fund for this purpose and it has been so done. Church and parsonage painting, gutter repair, and steeple repair accounted for another expenditure of [1,995.

The Finance Committee has applied for a mortgage on the parsonage in the amount of \$6500, the breakdown of this mortgage is as follows:

It was the feeling of the Finance Committee that the remaining [1,400 note should be cancelled as a 90-day renewable note and carried on a mortgage because it provided a more systematic means of decreasing the principal.

The Grace Bartlett note was paid as the result of generous and anonymous givers. This helped our financial situation greatly.
