At this meeting the following officers were elected for the 1962-1963 Church year: The state

It was then voted, after discussion, to extend the present Church fiscal year until December 31, 1962, and to ask the members to extend their pledges to the Church and to the Improvement Fund until December 31, 1962. The Finance Committee will conduct the Every-Family Canvass in the Fall, which they feel will be a more advantageous time for the Canvass.

The Finance Committee then recommended that the Church vote to pro-rate the present budget to cover the period from September 1, 1962 to December 31, 1962. It was a vote.

The List of Inactive Members (compiled in 1956) was read. According to our Constitution, Section 5, par. (d) which reads "A person (member) for two years non-resident, or for the same period not worshipping with this Church may be transferred to a list known as the Inactive (or Reserve) list. .... At the end of three years from the date of transfer, the person inquestion shall cease to be reported." and Section 5, par. (f) "The membership of no person shall be terminated (except by letter) save under the recommendation of the Pastor and the Board of Deacons and at a meeting of the Church subsequent to the one where such action is proposed."

The List has been read, and these members will be dropped from the rolls if the Church so votes at the Autumn Meeting, unless we hear otherwise from them. #### REPORT OF THE MINISTER

The past year has seen our Church strengthened in two important areas. With our membership rolls growing, the Deacons felt that it was time to assess them. Out-of-town members were contacted about their membership and asked whether or not they wished to maintain their affiliation with us, or if they would rather join the Church which they were attending. Members in town, whom we had not seen for some time, were also asked about their membership, hoping that they would become more active. Now new members joining the Church meet with the Deacons before they join to discuss the meaning of Church membership -- its privileges, responsibilities, and opportunities. I feel that this work during this year has added greatly to the strength of the Church, and I am grateful to the Deacons for their hard work.

This past year has seen a rise in the number of persons in our parish seeking help from the Minister in solving the problems which life so often presents. Many hours have been spent in counseling sessions and in deep thought resulting from them. Although a great time consumer, counseling is one of the more important areas in which a Minister can serve his people, and is rewarding for all concerned.

Hindsight is always better in assessing a situation than foresight. In looking over the past year, I find that my time was too much spread over activities outside the Church. Although each legitimately should be served, surely they should not all be served in one year. I have held such positions as President and Treasurer of the Church-YMCA Basketball League of Haverhill, President of the Pilgrim Club of Boston, Advisor to the Essex North Pilgrim Fellowship, Dean of the Deering Senior High Conference, a member of the State Conference Committee on the Youth Ministry, and the Essex North Committee on Ministerial Standing. Except for the latter two which take relatively little time, I have or will retire from the other positions this autumn. This will leave me with more time to serve the pressing and increasing needs of our Church.

Our Church continues to grow, although not only in membership. It grows also in its ability to serve the community in which it stands and the world in which it also stands. We must seek out new areas of service, and be alert to needs which we can serve. Our eyes must never grow dim to our tasks, but together under the banner of Christ, we will move steadily forward.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

NEVER HAVE SO MANY OWED SO MUCH TO SO FEW OUR SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHERS

The Sunday School year of 1961 started off with a full compliment of teachers, after considerable telephone calls and personal contacts. Mr. Harry Bedell resigned as Superintendent of the Sunday School right after school opened due to moving out of town. The Board was fortunate in securing Mrs. Charles Blanchard as Superintendent, and she took over the duties in January of 1962.

Mrs. Elizabeth Illsley was chosen to replace a member of the Board who resigned.

The Board again this year sponsored a boys' and girls' basketball team in the Y.M.C.A. League.

A small portable electric organ was purchased for use in the Metcalf House, and has proved helpful to both teachers and children in keeping in tune while singing.

A petty cash fund of \$25.00 was voted to the Sunday School secretary to pay for small items as needed by both the secretary and teachers.

Mr. Bradstreet, the Student Assistant, met with the Board regularly and gave detail reports as to the progress of his young peoples classes.

The Board travelled to Andover Newton Theological Seminary, interviewed and asked Mr. Charles Huhta to take Mr. Bradstreet's place, who is graduating from college and going on to his own church.

It was brought to the Board's attention that there was a feeling among some that the children of the church school do not contribute enough money to support the department. The Board voted unanimously that it isn't necessary for the church school to be self-supporting, but the important part of children contributing is their training in stewardship.

It was necessary during the year to change several classes around due to the number of children in some classes and the available space in both the Metcalf House and Church. All available space is now being used.

The Board sponsored a very successful World Friendship Supper, with both parents and children attending. Each family brought a covered dish, the Board providing dessert. A gathering of 60 was expected and over 150 people attended.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees wishes to thank the Congregation for the excellent support received during the year. Their support of the Chair Fund at Christmas time, and the Paint Fund at Easter, enabled the Trustees to use their funds for the general upkeep and repair of the Church.

Along with the general upkeep of the Church the following was accomplished:

- 1. New ceiling for classroom in Metcalf House.
- 2. Classroom painted in Metcalf House.
- 3. Front steps of Church replaced.
- 4. Outside light installed on rear door on Clark Street.
- 5. Emergency Lights (more required) installed in Sanctuary.
- 6. Stairways refinished in Narthex.
- 7. Aluminum storm door installed at Front door of Parsonage.
- 8. Parsonage roof repaired.
- 9. New cesspool installed at Church.
- 10. Work started in reinforcing (Beams badly checked) roof rafters and beams in Church.
- 11. Fire door installed in Metcalf House.
- 12. Rules for the use of Church written and approved by Cabinet.
- 13. Write-up of Duties of Trustees written and approved by Cabinet.
- 14. Duties of the Sexton written up and approved by Cabinet.
- 15. Insurance coverage reviewed and brought up to date.

Eleven work parties were held during the year. Many members of the Congregation donated time, material, and money to make these sessions successful.

It is strongly recommended that a "Major Repair Fund" be set up in the Annual Church Budget. This fund is visualized as a reserve to pay for major <u>re-occurring</u> repairs. It must be recognized that all our church buildings are old and of wooden construction which indicates costly maintenance. As an example; if all of our buildings were painted once in five years at a minimum estimated cost of \$3,000, this would represent \$500 per year. It is my recommendation that this sum of money (actual cash in a separate account) be set aside each year. Adopting such a practice as this would alleviate the problem of the Congregation raising the total cost of such work in the year that the work becomes necessary.

## Finance REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

During the past year the Finance Committee has held meetings every month to approve bills and discuss Church finances.

In addition to our routine activities, we conducted two financial drives. One drive was held to supply the pressing need of folding chairs for the Church and Sunday School. The other was to furnish money for painting the Church. For the chair drive we used the idea of a Christmas gift to the Church and were very pleased with the results. The idea of an Easter gift to the Church was used for the paint fund. Approximately \$1,000 has been raised co far, with more promised. We will need \$1,500 to pay all the painting bills. In view of the special needs of the Church, it may be well to continue those special gifts. We are told that extensive repair work will soon be needed on the organ. A special fund has also been established for renewing the very worn and soiled pew cushions.

As usual, the summer collections and payment of pledges have been very poor. At this time we are nearly \$1,000 behind in our payment of bills. An increased effort must be made on the part of every member to better the financial position of our Church.

The money collected for the improvement fund has either been deposited in the bank or used to pay off the mortgages that were contracted against the improvement fund. Several lump sums have been paid to reduce the mortgages and after the interest period in October, another will be made.

At the last spring meeting of the Church, the fiscal year was changed to coincide with the calendar year. You were asked to continue your present pledges to the end of the year. During the first or second week of November we will again conduct an "Every Member Canvass" and we ask each one to pledge his support to the well-being of our Church.

The original pledges to the improvement fund were for three years. Now, at this meeting, we hope the Church will see it proper to ask that new pledges be made for a three-year period. This is necessary to continue the payments due for the mortgages.

The Treasurer has submitted a detailed financial report to which you may refer for any particular item.

In closing, the Finance Committee wishes to thank the Church officers and members for their cooperation. Special thanks go to the Treasurer and Collector for their fine and faithful work.
