Prayer was offered by the Rev. Philip Southwick.

The Clerk read the report of the Autumn Meeting and Special Meeting. These reports were accepted as read.

Moderator H. Nelson Pingree read the Warrant.

#### ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the First Congregational Church of Georgetown was called to order at 8:05 P. M. by the Moderator H. Nelson Pingree.

The Kev. Philip Southwick offered Prayer.

The Warrant was read by the Moderator.

Minutes of a Special Meeting held on January 2, 1968 were read and approved.

ARTICLE I: To receive the reports of the Sevenal Boards, Committees and Officers of the Church, and to take any action desired thereon.

The members present were given time to peruse the various reports. Andover Organ bill was discusses. Mr. Melzard reported on many conversations with Andover Organ officials. Mr. Melzard feels we received full value although he would have liked to have them take \$1000. off the bill. Andover Organ will assist with an Organ Concert to be held on March 24, 1968. Ken Wilson of WHDH will be the Organist. The Moderator thanked Mr. Melzard on behalf of the Church for the hours of effort put into this project. (Cabinet, to consist of Pastor, Moderator, Clerk, Collector, Treasurer, Superintendent of Church School, Board of Deacons, Chairmentof all Committees of the Church, and Presidents of all Church Organizations.) Motion seconded and so voted.

Leland Lowell moved that Article IV, Section III, Paragraph G shall read The Moderator shall preside at all Meetings of the Church and Cabinet. Motion seconded and so voted.

ARTICLE III: To take any other action relative to the Church and/ or its property.

Deacon Leland Lowell moved that a letter of transfer be sent to the Hamilton Congregational Church for Mr. and Mrs. Patsy Iafolla. Seconded by Deacon Forest Bridges and so voted.

Meeting adjourned at 9:45 P. M.

#### REPORT OF THE MINISTER

In these days when we sometimes hear on television or read in books and magazines that "the institutional church as we know it is dead", we must take a careful look at ourselves to see not only how healthy we are, but, more importantly, that we are using our energies in ways that are of greatest benefit to ourselves and society at large. Though eternal values do not change, ways they are expressed must change to keep in step with our changing society. As churches change their ways there is internal tension created, which makes them come alive and remain healthy.

How do we stand? In most ways we are a healthy church. Responsibilities are spread among many families. Both comparative newcomers and long time members have major responsibilities. Our committees meet and enter into dialogue to a greater degree than is true in many other churches. Our church school is well staffed by interested and concerned teachers. Our church fair continues to create fellowship and enthusiasm, along with great financial success. As a church we exceeded our goal for Our Christian World Mission.

Along with other churches we operate at half-strength much of the year. The camping season starts earlier in the spring and runs later in the fall, causing some churches to try Wednesday evening services during summer months instead of traditional Sunday morning services.

Attendance at morning worship leaves something to be desired. Maybe PeoPle are watching services on television or listening to them on radio, while some are stressing the idea that they can worship God at home, which is true to a degree. But may it not be one of the major sources of weakness in the church and in society, that by ourselves we fail to strengthen, encourage, support, and inspire each other? It is in coming together that we affirm the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man. It is in coming together that we declare that we want a better way of life for everyone, including ourselves. Publicly gathering together is the only way to develop community spirit and communion. That many of our people are deeply involved in community responsibilities and activities is as it should be.

Many are enjoying the monthly coffee hours, using these opportunities to get to know each other better, to discuss ideas and concerns together. We have set up a retreat for the Board of Education and the Church School teachers at the Framingham Conference Center on March 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup>, with Dr. Duane Windemiller as our leader. There may also be a retreat for Junior Highs or Senior Highs in early May. I hope that such overnight retreats become as important as summer conferences have been to our young people. A brochure is now being prepared for use by the Welcome Wagon to acquaint newcomers with our church and its activities. The Long-Range Planning Committee has been reactivated and will be working once again during 1969.

I thank all of you who have worked to make our church all that it is - the deacons for their cooperation and counsel - the choir members and church school teachers whom we depend upon week after week, rain or shine - the church officers and committee members - those who arranged for the wonderful organ concert - to mention just a few. Shirley and I personally thank the trustees and their crews of volunteer painters for giving the parsonage a face-lifting, and we thank all of you for your thoughtfulness throughout the year.

We thank God for all of you who make this church a concerned community, a community coming into dialogue, a community seeking new ways to apply Christ's gospel in our time.

## REPORT OF THE CHURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

Our church school this fall has about 250 children registered with attendence fluctuating between a high of about 200 to an average of 120 to 150 children. We have 22 teachers and 12 teenage helpers.

We continue to support a Korean orphan. The collection of the first Sunday of each month goes toward his support of fifteen dollars a month, with any extra money turned into the general church mission fund.

We have started a monthly meeting with our teenage assistants taught by Richard Annis. The girls are being trained to help the teachers, and plan to try some portion of the class alone so that eventually they will be capable of teaching a class on their own.

Last spring the theme of our entire church school was "Exploring Our Christian Heritage." All the children learned about Jesus, ranging from the three year olds' "The First Christmas" to a detailed study of "A Life of Jesus" for the Junior Highs. This fall our theme is "Responding To God's Love." The younger children have learned about living in a Christian community. From the third grade through Junior High the emphasis has been on the Old Testament--learning of the people of the Old Testament and how they responded to God. The Senior High studied in greater depth about our biblical heritage.

We have had one coffee hour and two teachers' meetings this fall for the purpose of discussing teaching methods, problems, etc. More important, we talked together about what we believe as practicing Christians and how we can communicate these beliefs to our children. How can we make our teaching meaningful in today's world, for ourselves as well as for our children? We try to reach the children at each stage of their development so that what we teach has meaning for them today and will be something for them to build on as they mature.

### Pilgrim Fellowship

## REPORT OF THE PILGRIM FELLOWSHIP

During 1968 we have had what has amounted to two different Pilgrim Fellowship groups, the first group ending in the spring of the year, amd, generally speaking, a new younger group gathering this fall.

In the spring and fall we had paper drives, the one held this fall being the biggest we have had. We use the money thus raised for bus transportation to Crotched Mountain and to Boston for basketball or hockey games.

We made trips to Crotched Mountain our big undertaking last year, and are at the present time setting up one for, hopefully, mid-February. In the winter and spring of 1968 we spent a lot of time discussing issues pertaining to the war in Vietnam, problems of integration, and the struggle for Black Power. Worship was carried on frequently with the use of records and tape recordings in psychedelic fashion. Five of the young people attended Star Island conference this summer.

In the fall the group became composed primarily of freshmen and sophomores and the program geared more closely to them. We have made considerable use of motion pictures to stimulate discussion and by and large the results have been good. There seem to be more young people from the community as contrasted with those brought up through the Church School in the present group, several of the members having little previous or other contact with the church. In this way we may be serving the community more than in some other years.

Several members of the Fellowship attended the Tri-Association meeting held at Gordon College in October to hear Mr. Melvin Miller, publisher of the Roxbury Banner, speak about some of the difficulties in communications between the Black community and White society. In addition, we have visited the Amesbury group for a meeting in their new coffee house, and held a joint meeting with the group in the Newbury Church.

Within the next month we plan to hold Youth Sunday and next week a group from the Fellowship will be sharing some of their thoughts with the Women's Guild. We will be inviting other groups here so that we share with each other and learn from each other.

#### Trustees

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The trustees have held regular meetings throughout the year. This year we have been again fortunate in having a group of devoted and hard-working trustees.

The Church is also fortunate in having the services of Mr. Maloof as our part time sexton. He has performed his function most satisfactorily.

We also are indebted to Elliot Brothers for the fine service in maintaining our heating system. We have had to call on them all too often and they have never failed to respond promptly.

During the year the Church acquired the Meisner land--which is the corner lot on Cottage St.--and also the Mrs. Locke house. Those acquisitions give the Church all the property on the Church side of Cottage St.

Trustee-landlord Woodburn continues to faithfully each week collect the rent for 3 Cottage St. and with the increase in rent the property about pays for itself while the mortgage is reduced.

Since July D. E. Melzard has been the landlord for 1 Cottage St. The rent from this property defrays all but about \$200/year while paying off the 5 year mortgage.

The improvements and repairs to the Church property include the following:

1. Early in March we burchased a bower buffer and brush for the tile floors. Since this acquisition the pews were moved in the Sanctuary and the entire floor cleaned and bolished. This was previously done about 8 years ago. Also all the floors in the Church and Metcalf House are cleaned and waxed by Mr. Maloof on a regular schedule.

2. The work party at the Church for providing a sparkling Church for Easter was attended by 15 people. These people had the satisfaction of aiding the Church maintainance as well as eating together a fine lunch prepared by the trustees' wives--homemade beef stew, homemade bread and homemade pies. Let us have 5 times that number of people this year.

3. The parsonage was painted blue with white trim during two Saturday work parties.

4. Three rooms were redecorated in the parsonage to suit the taste of Shirley and Rev. Southwick. We were only 3 years late, but the Southwicks have been patient.

5. The Church office floor was repaired and then a new wall to wall rug installed. The walls were painted and plans have been made to replace the drapes.

6. The Church sign in front of the Church has again been repaired and painted. Soon we will need a new sign--so keep your eyes open. Any volunteers?

Numerous requests for the use of the Church property have been refused as has been our custom. However as in the past, the Girl Scouts were granted permission to use the Church one day a week as long as they left the property clean and undamaged. The Georgetown Historical Society also used the Church for their monthly meeting.

It has been a real pleasure to serve the Church and I look forward to other such rewarding associations.

#### Music

#### REPORT OF THE MUSIC COMMITTEE

The music committee held four meetings during the year. Carl Krumpe, organist, attended two of the meetings. Mr. Southwick was also present at some of the meetings.

There were general discussions as to how to improve congregational singing, choice of hymns, and ways of introducing new hymns to the congregation. Ways of securing new choir members were also discussed.

A figure of \$150 was decided upon as the amount available for the combined musical supplies for the Senior, Junior and Youth Choirs.

It was agreed to increase the organist's salary \$100. It was also agreed to fix the amount to be paid to substitute organists at \$25.00 a Sunday, and the fee to be charged for the organist's service at a wedding at \$15.00.

The music committee feels that Carl Krumpe should be commended for his serious efforts in making the musical part of the service a worthwhile contribution to the worship service as a whole. We know that he has devoted a great deal of time and effort toward this end.

We are also very appreciative of the work Evelyn Boose and Mrs. Flyzik have done with the Junior Choir, and of Elizabeth Pingree's directing the Youth Choir.
