THE ACT OF RE-DEDICATION

of the

MEETING HOUSE OF THE FIRST

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH of

GEORGETOWN, MASSACHUSETTS

December 8, 1974

Minister: We are and always have been in awe of the ancient. Perhaps this is our way of relating ourselves to God, His universe, and life itself.

Congregation: For 100 years this building has been the gathering place of our congregation for worship, fellowship, and social concern. It has sheltered us: it has been a beacon and symbol to us of what we hold valuable in our lives. Eternal God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ and our Father, the same yesterday, today, and forever: we meet in this place of many memories to pray with gratitude for Your faithfulness, Your inspiration, and Your strength.

Minister: This building is more than stone and mortar, wood and glass. It is our meeting place, a place where we meet God in each others' lives. We admire its structure and its longevity, but even more we respect and celebrate what has taken place here for 100 years.

Congregation: If these walls could speak they would tell of songs of joy and of sadness, times both good and bad, incidents worthy of celebration, events requiring confession and reformation. Here we baptize our children, here we commit ourselves to live the Christian life to the best of our insight and ability. Here we come to be joined in marriage; here we

can focus upon our concerns and problems, our hopes and dreams; and here life as we know it has its end celebrated in the Christian funeral. May this building serve our needs and help us serve God and our fellow men with faithfulness and vigor. May we be determined that this building serve the needs of the community rather than that it be preserved for posterity. May it house the Spirit of Christ in its congregation.

Minister: We must not become lost in what has been, no matter how impressive. The past must be our school master, but not our task master. The past must challenge us not to simply repeat the past, but to grow and be our own people, - the people of God for our time.

Congregation: Thus we re-dedicate not simply a structure, but all that it symbolizes. We re-dedicate ourselves to make this house, a house of peace, a house of love and forgiveness, a house whose strength lies not in its walls, but in its occupants. We, as have all who have lived in this house, offer ourselves repeatedly to the task and mission of Christ's church. Accept, O Lord, this pledge of personal re-dedication. We are the buildings, the arts and craftsmanship of Your spirit, through which Your word of reconciling love must flow.

Minister: We are one house of worship among others in our community and country. May our act of rededication and celebration on this great day draw us closer to each other and increase our effectiveness for God's Kingdom.

Congregation: So be it, Lord. Amen.

The Georgetown Advocate continued from the December 23, 1874 issue:

"The building is 90 ft. in length and 55 fin width. The Tower rises to the height of 100 ft. from the ground, the spire rises fifty feet above the belfry.

"The services were announced to begin at 2 P.M., but long before that time the road was thronged with people, some in carriages some on foot, but all eagerly pressing toward the main entrance. The scene within was indeed beautiful and gladdening.

"The exercises began with a voluntary on the organ, whose majestic tones rolling through the house, prepared the audience for the fine rendering of the opening chorus, "Mighty Jehovah", by the united choirs. The invocation was given by the Rev. C. T. Lyford of the Baptist Church, Scriptures from I Kings VIChapter, by the Rev. D. D. Marsh of the Memorial Church, Dedicatory prayer by Dr. Seeley of Haverhill and the Sermon was given by the Rev. J. H. Ecot of Augusta, Maine."

When the Church was dedicated, the Rev. Charles Beecher was the senior pastor (he was one of the celebrated Beecher family). Rev. Beecher was extremely controversial; his doctrines led to a split in the church and so on December 17, 1874, the date of the Jedication, Rev. Beecher was on sabbat ical leave in Florida and his Associate, the Fev. Thomas R. Beeber, was actually in charge of the Church.

SOME HISTORICAL NOTES FROM THE GEORGETOWN ADVOCATE

The Georgetown Advocate, Wednesday,
November 11, 1874

"The old bell (referring to our 1815 Paul Revere Bell; purchase price, \$54.57!) that has swung in the old steeple for so many years was successfully lowered to the ground on Wednesday last and is about ready to swing again in the new tower.

"It will be missed by the denizens in the east part of the town at the hours of its customary ringing and also sadly missed should a fire break out in that locality.

"The organ for the new church has arrived and is being placed in position."
