

The Annual Meeting of the First Congregational Church was called to order by the Moderator Donn Chatterton at 8:05 P. M.

The Auditors report was read. Donald Johnson, Chairman of the Finance Committee, commented that by Borrowing from the Vestry Fund and the Guild pledge all bills were paid. Renovations and repairs have been made at Metcalf House but there is still work to be done. Keith Tibbetts was thanked for the work he has done at Metcalf House. The Moderator commended Olive Metcalf for her Faithfulness to the Church and Cabinet.

#### Minister

#### REPORT OF THE MINISTER

In looking back upon another year of our shared church life, we see special programs, personally important events, ongoing projects, and many impressions. We see highlights that may but dimly suggest our spiritual growth or the workings of the Holy Spirit. Yet, here is what we see as memorable about 1977:

In January, on the Sunday following our last Annual Meeting we held a service of appreciation and dedication -

appreciating the devotion of those who had served as officers

and committee members in the previous years,

dedicating those continuing to serve and those taking upon themselves new assignments for the ongoing ministry and administration of our church.

During the winter months we were concerned with creating an up to date pictorial directory, to give ourselves a sense of identity - who we are as Christ's community here and now.

We held a one day blood drive, which we hope to make into an annual event, emphasizing through the church that we do indeed share ourselves with the world.

The Easter season was filled with pre-membership meetings, confirmation class, and well-attended special services. On Palm Sunday we welcomed new members from other churches as well as from our church confirmation class, and we were treated to a cantata by the Senior Choir, followed by a reception celebration in the vestry. Having coffee available after morning worship has provided increased opportunities for people to talk together as a church family.

The Annual Meeting of the Massachusetts Conference of the United Church of Christ was held in Chicopee, with special attention focussed on world hunger, and the racial policies of South Africa. We passed a resolution condemning present policies there. Later on in 1977 Polaroid Corporation, doing business with South Africa, took economic stands against the government there. Hopefully, the action of our state conference in cooperation with other religious and non-religious groups had a part to play in such steps toward racial justice.

During the conference meeting there was a sense of excitement because it had become known by that time that our conference President, Avery Post, was to be nominated for the office of national President of the United Church of Christ. It may be of interest to you to realize that three or four years ago Avery Post conducted an all-day preaching seminar for ministers of the Northeast Area in our church.

During the summer months, while we held union services with West Boxford, several families and many individuals were involved in a corn project on Bob Morehouse's land, which produced a truck load of corn as our positive step in combatting world hunger.

#### Report of the Minister, Continued

Just before the Church School resumed in the fall, I enjoyed conducting an overnight retreat with a group of our Church School teachers. I hope this helped us get off to a good start this fall. Spirit in the Sunday School was high because of the amazing amount of work done by a group of willing hearts and hands in Metcalf House, making it an attractive, cheery place, certainly more condusive to learning about what it means to be a caring person like Jesus.

We decided to try a morning discussion group instead of an evening Bible study, hoping to attract some who would be unable to attend at night. We wanted the discussion to be all inclusive, so we plagerised the title 'Everything you wanted to know about religion, but were afraid to ask'. Our discussions have ranged from current events to the Bible, from death to faith, from personal experiences to feelings.

We combined stewarship Sunday with a day to honor those who have been members 35 years or more. This turned out to be quite successful, both fellowship wise and stewardship wise. Thanks to the straight-forward charts and message of Al Barlow about our financial responsibility and needs, and to the responses of many who increased their pledges of support for the current expense budget, our income for 1978 is increased by some \$4,000. This is good. I wish that I could say this takes care of our stewardship problem. But I can say that this is a giant step in the right direction. Congratulations!

The Thanksgiving Eve Ecumenical Service has become a high point, featuring outstanding music from our choir augmented by those from other churches. Christmas Eve continues to be for many the highlight of the church year - the most loved service. Since Christmas Day fell on Sunday this year, I felt it was special; we were able to incorporate the baptism of children into our celebration of Jesus' birth.

Our youth continue to play an important role in the life of our church - singing, playing instruments, serving - in short - doing whatever is asked of them. We are indeed fortunate. We had a good confirmation class this year, and showed an increase in membership for the year. Our youth (senior high students) created a wonderful Youth Sunday Worship Service, and a beautiful Easter Sunrise service, which was followed by breakfast at the church, fast becoming another annual tradition. Twenty young adults responded to the meaning of Maundy Thursday when they gathered together for supper at the church prior to the worship service that evening.

Last spring our senior high youth attended a production of Godspell in Boston, and this fall the movie "Oh God'". The highlight of our serious discussions was a lengthy meeting with a former member of Unification church about the Moonies - especially their presence on the college scene. We continue to have paper drives twice a year; these help pay for such programs as an annual swim party. This past year, with a large number of our youth wanting to attend summer conferences, we were able to finance three from

funds they had themselves raised. This year we had a total of 8 who attended conferences. Our youth enjoyed several social events during the year, topped off by a beach party at Gloucester in June.

I enjoy teaching our high school class, which has had an average attendance of 8 to 10 per week; this year the class is composed mainly of boys. In both Church School and through the youth group we are trying to lead our youth to experience the presence of God's spirit, and then trust that they will sense the leading of His spirit for the rest of their lives.

At this turning of the year our choirs are growing and healthy; the spirit among our church school teachers is excellent; the diaconate has worked exceptionally well as a group, and in small sub-committees; our Christian Education Committee and our Board of Trustees have spent untold hours together and individually working to maintain and improve both our church property and program.

Looking ahead: we have an all church retreat scheduled for March 10 and 11 and our state conference center in Framingham; we will be studying the prevailing practice among churches of having greater lay participation in worship on a weekly basis. We have re-designed our celebration of Tenebrae for Maundy Thursday, and we not only invite your participation but seek your reaction to our attempts to involve everyone more intimately We wanted to have two more union services this year with the West Boxford Church on Christmas Day and New Year's; but the diaconate at West Boxford preferred not to do so, since this is a time of homecoming for them. We look forward to more union services with them in the coming year, and perhaps some combined projects too.

I thank all the willing workers of our church, those who spend so many hours, those who do so much in so many ways to minister to one another and to the world. It is my privilege to minister with you.

#### REPORT OF THE DIACONATE

First of all, this year's Diaconate has been a wonderful group to work with. The projects we have undertaken have turned out to be fun and enjoyable because of the splendid cooperation shown by all.

The Laymen's Sunday service, with the assistance of the adult and youth choirs, was well-received again this year.

Recognition Sunday for Long Time Members proved to be a memorable occasion, and greatly enjoyed by those who participated. It is good to honor those who have done, and are still doing, so much for our church.

As usual the Service of Tenebrae, the Thanksgiving Eve Ecumenical Service, and the Christmas Eve Candlelight Service were all beautiful and inspiring. May these services continue to be a part of our church festivities.

We have updated the Christian Service group this year, and have many more volunteers, for which we are thankful. It is a pleasure to work with and be a part of this group, and to be aware of all the help and wonderful acts of kindness that they do.

With the Diaconate Fund we were able to extend help to a few families in need of assistance, and we also made a few purchases from the Memorial Fund - Youth Choir robes, books for the church library, etc. The Upper Room and Guideposts have been added to the Literature Rack and are available to anyone who would like them.

It has been a pleasure to have the Deaconesses take an active part in the serving of Communion, the Candlelight Service, and of course, the Laymen's Sunday service. They also have visited with many shutins, people who are ill, or could not attend church, newcomers to town, etc. In many cases they receive as much joy and inspiration from those they visit, as they expect to give. The men, on this year's Diaconate, have also participated actively in the visiting program; their cooperation has been very supportive.

Maybe the atmosphere of the Christmas season is still with us, but it seems as though there is a spirit of friendliness, love and good will in and around the church and its activities. This is good and we hope it will continue and spread.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Board of Christian Education took charge of the refreshments for the Family Night Program in April. The children acted out the story of "David and the Giants". This was a program to benefit the Heifer Fund.

The members of the board, with the help of the teachers and other people, worked very hard during the summer and all of the month of September, to get Metcalf House ready for the "Open House" on September 25 - Rally Day. If you haven't been to Metcalf House to see the painting and papering, rugs, curtains and renovations, please take a few minutes to go and visit. This work was done with "tender loving care' and dedication to make a pleasant, workable, learning place for the young people of our church.

The Board served coffee and doughnuts to the Teachers before church on Rally Day. There was a Dedication Service for teachers, children and workers at the church service. The "Open House" at Metcalf took place before and after church. The Family Picnic, scheduled for that day, had to be cancelled because of the weather.

#### REPORT OF THE CHURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

One of our projects for the Church School this past year has taught us how close people can become when they are part of a common task. Our many mission projects include:

UNICEF - mission Sundays fund.

THANKSGIVING FOOD OFFERING - given to elderly of Georgetown

CHRISTMAS GIFTS FOR CHILDREN - donated to Salvation Army.

HARVEST OF CORN - children helped in husking bee.

A special thanks to all who donated things for Metcalf, and to parents for supporting our bake sales.

As we learned the value of working toward a common goal in redecorating Metcalf, we also learned again when doing "David and the Giants" with the third through sixth grades, that children learn and remember best when they have an active part in things.

The Junior Choir has had a busy year, with 24 active members. In May they joined a Festival of 14 choirs in Calvary Episcopal Church in Danvers. They had an outing in New Hampshire in June and a Christmas pizza and caroling party in December.

Our teachers this year are Marcia Manning, Carol Flyzik, Kris Thompson, Gail Rogers, Jan Robertson, Jan Spence, Sue Kelley Elaine Kimball, Carol Knapp, Marion Harding, Marcia Houlden, Bob Houlden and Reverend Southwick with many young helpers.

#### **Trustees**

#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

First of all, let's review how we did against the goals that were set in last year's annual report.

1. Structural reinforcing and new covering for the Metcalf House garage roof, contract awarded to Duffy Bridges.

Results: After spring cleanup revealed holes and rotted wood on the rear wall of the garage, Duffy suggested we tear the garage down and erect a new lean-to type storage shed on the back (Cottage St. side) of the church. With Trustees and other church members supplying the labor, and Duffy the supervision, Duffy estimates the cost at about \$600 - \$700. This was discussed briefly with the Finance Committee, and is under consideration by the Trustees. No further action to date. (To be continued in 1978).

2. New roofing for the Thrift Shop room on Metcalf House - to stop a serious leak; contract awarded to Duffy Bridges.

Results: Completed.

3. Repair/Replacement of badly rotted window sash on the southern (Andover Street) end of the church.

Results: No action. Another pane has fallen out of the balcony windows. Temporary repairs assigned to Jim Boynton and Craig Southwick. (To be continued in 1978).

4. Scraping and painting of the outside of the church.

Results: Front doors, steps, and landing and the kitchen door were scraped and painted. As a result of suggestions at last year's Annual Meeting, we invited contractors to bid on installation of vinyl siding on all or part of the church. We could not find anyone who was interested. (To be continued in 1978).

5. Installation of a Lexan or Plexiglass cover to protect the stained glass window over the front doors.

Results: No action. Up for action in 1978.

6. Review, up dating, and publishing of rules for use of the church property and facilities by outside organizations, including fee schedules and suggested donation rates.

Results: Completed.

7. Installation of carpeting on the Sanctuary aisles, dias, front area of Sanctuary, Narthex floor and stairs, and the balcony stairs and aisles.

Results: No action. To be dropped in 1978 in favor of higher priority work.

8. Improved lighting in the choir loft in cooperation with the Music Committee.

## Report of the Trustees - Continued

Results: Completed, along with an improvement in the stage lighting in the Vestry.

10. Redecoration of the Sanctuary and Narthex.

Results: No action. To be dropped in 1978 in favor of higher priority work.

11. Installation of ceiling insulation in the ground level rooms to save on heating costs.

Results: No action. Up for investigation in 1978; possible action

12. Installation of valves and thermostats on the ground level rooms to permit better and easier regulation of heat, resulting in savings on heating costs.

Results: Technical feasibility investigated and found possible. We decided to see what would happen by regulating the radiator controls. Thanks to substantial effort on the part of Elliott Bros., (Steve Robertson), regulation was accomplished and preliminary results indicate coal consumption was reduced by more than 25%.

### Additional goals for 1978:

A. Installation of a drain field for the church septic tank.
B. Installation of storm windows on the 2nd and 3rd floor of Metcalf House.

Other major accomplishments by the Trustees and others in 1977 included:

Repair and painting of Metcalf House front steps and railings and front porch eaves trough.

. Repair of Parsonage front steps.

Replacement of Parsonage rear stairs and landing.
 Repair of roof at 3 Cottage Street rental property.

Payment of six weeks arrears on rental payments at 3 Cottage Street, much of which was outstanding for more than two years.

New oven for the Parsonage.

. Cleanout of Metcalf House attic, cellar and garage.

The Trustees wish to thank the Guild, again, for a fine luncheon at the spring cleanup, and the many others in the church who helped in many small ways and some not so small, to maintain and improve our property. A particularly fine job was done on the upgrading and redecorating of the interior of Metcalf House by the Church School Teachers and helpers.

They entertained the Guild on February 22 with "Fashions from the Yellow Room", using outfits and accessories from the Thrift Shop. On March 2 a Rummage and Bake Sale was held.

At the May Guild meeting, \$900 was given to the church from the Thrift Shop proceeds and in September \$100 more was given, making a total of \$1,000 as a Guild pledge.

The shop was closed from June 25 until September 8, when it opened under the new leadership of Marjorie Pitkin and Carole Face as cochairmen. Due to all the work that Gert and Connie did the previous two years, all we had to do was price and sell.

Friends and church members have been very generous with clothing and even white elephant items. We picked over the articles and donated to Olive Metcalf for Material Aids and some things to the Salvation Army.

We have donated clothes to two needy children through a member of our church.

Our first month of September was very successful - we sold \$60.50 for the first three days. It then slowed down but we were able to deposit \$300 for September, October and November, plus the \$70 we gave to the Fair; some of the Fair money was donated.

Our hours remain the same - 1 to 4 on Thursday & Friday
10 to 4 on Saturday, excepting
holidays.

We closed two weeks before Christmas, partly due to weather and because our helpers were so busy with their holiday preparations, or were ill. The Shop will be opened again on February 9.

Anyone in our church family, who would like to volunteer time to The Thrift Shop, is very welcome to do so.

We still need clothes and will soon display our summer things, which we have had put away for the winter.

May I take this opportunity to thank all the workers who were so faithful and all the people who donated clothes. Thanks also to the many people who were our customers, some of whom were the workers. We could not have functioned without the help of Gert and Connie, and last but not least I want to thank my co-chairman, Carole Face, who is faithful and hardworking.

#### World Service

#### CHURCH WORLD SERVICE COMMITTEE

Your Church World Service Committee has had a very successful year, thanks to the help of very many people. A hearty "thank you" to all who helped in any way, whether by gifts of clothing, etc., of time, or by using their car to help deliver things. A special "thanks" to Graf's Express for carrying things to the Boston area free of charge, and to the Reverend Ian Stuart of Amesbury for taking things to the Boston Seaman's Friend Society.

There is really no end to the demand for good used clothing. We have a special need for men's and children's clothing, because these are what we get the least of. Torn sheets, white or colored, can be made into bandages, worn shirts are made into hospital gowns. Remnants of yard goods can always be used. There is always a use for bedding, table cloths, curtains, etc., which though used, still have wear in them. Magazines and books are being sent to the Seaman's Friend Society and we can place children's books, toys, etc., in good hands, too.

During the past year we have sent at least 100 lbs. of used clothing to a Thrift Shop at Pleasant Hill, Tenn., about 30 lbs. of selected used clothing to the Walker Missionary Home in Auburndale, probably 60 lbs. of used clothing, six partly filled ditty bags, and some books and magazines to the Boston Seaman's Friend Society. Over \$100 worth of unwrapped Christmas gifts were sent to the City Missionary Society in Boston.

During 1977 we sent over 200 lbs. of used clothing, 2 cartons of bandages, some hospital gowns and six blankets to Church World Service and we have two boxes already packed for the April collection. Two lots of used clothing went to Danvers State Hospital and one to a nursing home. We sent a carton of children's books to the "Marrow Bone School" in Pikeville, KY. Two large cartons of clothing went to GLEAM in Lawrence and about the same amount to Mr. Sweeney Condo in Lawrence for his work for Indian and other minority families.

At the present time we have about 40 lbs. of winter clothing to go to Mr. Condo within the next few days, two cartons ready to go to Danvers, a carton of warm clothing to go to the Indians in South Dakota. We have two boxes ready to go to a nursing home and a large collection of powder, lotion, room freshener, etc. for the same purpose.

When people give us used Christmas or general greeting cards, we pass them on to various nursing homes for their craft work, and they can usually use them. Why not try this yourselves? When visiting in a nursing home, if you have any used clothing, toilet articles, or craft material that you think would be useful to the less fortunate residents, take it with you and ask the people at the desk if they can use them. This might widen our circle of usefulness by quite a bit.

#### Church World Service, Continued

Mrs. Guy Minchin has resigned from the Material Aid committee. Our thanks to Clara for all she did while on the committee. Our members now are Mrs. Henry Dea, Mrs. Wilfred Hunt, Mrs. Donald Johnson and Miss Olive Metcalf. Plans are already being made for the February meeting of the Guild which is the annual Material Aid work party. If you are interested in our work, please plan to come whether or not you are a Guild member. If you have any suggestions as to projects we might undertake, or if you would like to do knitting or sewing in your own home and on your own time, please call any one of us.

The Church School raised \$100 for the Heifer Fund, which bought rabbits to be sent overseas. These are used to further the breeding of rabbits, both for meat and fur, in countries in need of such help. They also contributed to UNICEF. At Thanksgiving, articles of food were taken to elderly residents of Georgetown and at Christmas toys were donated to the Salvation Army for use here and in Haverhill.

Many people in the church helped this year with the "Harvest of Hope" program - planting and growing corn. Mr. Robert Morehouse furnished the land, which he plowed and fertilized. Mr. Forrest Bridges was in charge of the project. When the corn was ready, it was harvested and taken to the C.W.S. processing station in Stockbridge, Mass., to be refined and prepared for emergency use.

At Christmas the Couples Club purchased toys from our own Fair Toy Table, which were distributed through the Salvation Army - thus benefiting our church with the purchase and others outside of the church.

The Women's Missionary Society has contributed to the Walker Home, CARE, "1776" College Fund, the Least Coin Offering, the Good Ship HOPE, and has sent several boxes of school supplies, craft material and other articles to the Marrow Bone School in Pikeville, Ky.

The Thrift Shop, which most of us think of as a way to help the Guild make money for our church, - or as a chance for us to buy good used clothing at a reasonable price, is doing its bit to help others. Several times, when some needy family has come to the attention of the committee, a number of garments in the needed sizes have been supplied free of charge. One way the Thrift Shop is so successful is that it keeps its stock moving as much as possible. When they decide to remove articles that have not sold for a time, a large box is given to the material aid committee, so nothing is ever wasted.
