

Rev. Southwick opened a Special Meeting on Thursday, May 27, 1982 at 8:03 P. M.

Moved, seconded and voted that Donn Chatterton preside as Moderator Pro tem for this meeting.

The Warrant was read by the Clerk.

ARTICLE 1. To hear a report of the Trustees regarding the Ghurch Boiler and to take action thereon.

Forrest Bridges, Chairman of the Trustees, reported that after extensive investigation and discussion the Board of Trustees have decided the old boiler in the Church is badly in need of being replaced. Consequently, the Trustees have voted to replace it with a new boiler or boilers. The system recommended is two Axeman Anderson Anthratubes. The total cost of the Boiler and installation, which includes parts, labor and materials is not to exceed \$15,000.00. Allan Barlow spoke of the urgency in replacing the Boiler, he has an anthratube in his Home and is very happy with it. Arthur Wyman spoke of the tremendous amount of work required to keep the Boiler in operation. There was some discussion regarding replacement, etc.
Motion made, seconded and voted that the report of the Trustees be accepted.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Church will authorize the Finance Committee to borrow a sum of money not to exceed \$15,000.00 to be expended by the Board of Trustees for the purchase and installation of a new heating boiler or boilers, for the main Church building, the dismantling and disposal of the existing boiler, and such other labor and material as may be required to assure proper operation of the new boiler or boilers, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Allan Barlow of the Finance Committee explained the options open to the Finance Committee for financing. Pass Book Loans may be available, interest on Invested Funds. Pass Book loans on present loans will be paid off by

December.
Allan Barlow moved that the Church authorize the Finance Committee to borrow a sum of money not to exceed \$15,000.00 to be expended by the Board of Trustees for the purchase and installation of a new heating boiler or boilers for the main church building, the dismantling and disposal of existing boiler, and such other labor and materials as may be required to assure proper operation of the new

boiler or boilers.
Donn thanked the Trustees and Finance Committee for their work. Steve Robertson has spent many hours keeping the old Boiler going. Clerk will write Steve thanking him for all his work.

Then there was our Pictorial Directory - which turned out to be a year-long venture, due to circumstances beyond our control.

Many of you were inconvenienced, yet you took it in stride.

What else is one to do? Appreciate the hours of frustration and confusion for those carrying out the project in such good faith and spirit. We do have a fine finished product by which to identify one another and introduce ourselves to newcomers.

It was not a single event, but an adventure for those who undertook to dig into our heritage. We worshiped with the aid of the 'faith of our fathers' on Laity Sunday, hearing what they felt and believed, and expressing our continuing faith in God and dependence upon God. There were those who spent much time looking up bits of information about our Church and its ministers of earlier years. Identifying and selecting from many photographs, the few which were included in our latest history, proved exciting. We now have available a delightful short history of Our Congregational Heritage.

As the time for our Anniversary Banquet drew near, we asked for some anecdotes that you remembered about our Church - those precious thoughts and moments that probably never became a part of the written record. True to form, you came up with more than could be used. We enjoyed the after-dinner recollections around the dining table.

Sometimes we look back, as we did this year, to see where we came from. At the same time, always, we must look up to God and also look in mirrors to see ourselves face to face. We also need outreach - a stretching of ourselves toward others, ministering to them in both words and deeds of loving service. Occasionally we become excited about particular projects, but much of the time we depend upon someone else carrying on and reminding us of opportunities and our Christian responsibility

to serve others. For more years than I can remember, Olive Metcalf has been a voice of conscience and concern for others. Through her interest in, and concern for others all over the world - particularly her work for Church World Service, and for other projects in our own country - she has set an example of caring.

During the past year Carolyn Boynton has taken over as our Missions Coordinator. We invite you to share with her your interest in particular projects which you know about, and we hope that others will share willing hands and hearts in ongoing mission work.

The money which we pledge to missions is sent directly to the Christian World Mission arm of our Massachusetts U.C.C. Conference. In addition, we have supported other worthwhile mission work this year.

In the spring our Mission Coordinator encouraged an allchurch collection for Church World Service which amounted to 127 pounds of good quality clothing and 50 health service kits. Through the cooperation of Guild members and the Thrift Shop, clothing and miscellaneous items were sent to the Appalachia poor and the Walker Missionary Home in Auburndale.

Our Board of Christian Education launched a fund-raising drive for World Vision. Many families filled 'love loaves' over a month's time to aid World Vision's relief efforts in Africa. Our Church School is an important mission arm of the Church; through Family Night and other offerings, they raised money enough to purchase two pigs for our continuing interest in Heifer Projects. For the third year in a row we have sent our food collection at Thanksgiving to the Crombie Street Church's outreach program in Salem. At Christmastime we added a new mission concern to our list by collecting food and gifts for H.O.M.E. (Home workers Organized for More Employment) a self-help organization aiding the rural poor in northern Maine, which, incidentally, has received help from Heifer Project.

Over the years, our Church has been responsive to the One Great Hour of Sharing (supporting foreign missions) and Neighbors In Need (supporting social services in our country).

I thank God for inspiring us. I thank you for the time and spirit you spend in loving Christian service.

#### Diaconate

#### THE REPORT OF THE DIACONATE

The Diaconate started the year with nine members, three men and six women. Marcia Houlden was elected chairman, but for health reasons was forced to retire from the Diaconate in September. Helen Snow and JoEllen Fielding were elected co-chairmen to complete the year. We limped along, shorthanded but dedicated in spirit and willingness.

The year was a very busy and often rewarding one. We have continued to celebrate the birthdays of our 80 (+) year old members and Diaconate members have delivered the birthday roses. We have distributed Easter and Christmas plants to shut-ins in the community and environs. Also we have participated in Baptisms, Communions, the presentation of ten new members, and aided in the Christmas Eve candlelight service. The Visiting Volunteer team, in addition to Diaconate members, have made many calls and delivered copies of The Upper Room and Guideposts to those who wish to have them. The Christian Service Committee has prepared numerous meals, provided many rides, and helped anyone we knew needed any kind of consideration.

The Diaconate Fund has financially aided a few local people in need. In addition, items required to complete 50 Health Kits for Church World Service were purchased, and the cost of mailing the kits was provided.

Fifty new hymnals, dedicated to loved ones, have been added to the pews - 38 provided by individual donors and 12 purchased by the Memorial Fund. Also the brass cross in the sanctuary has been refinished and looks great! An anonymous donor gave two brass bud vases for displaying the birthday roses. JoEllen Fielding donated ten candle snuffers made by her husband, David, for use at Tenebrae Services. Unfortunately this service was cancelled this past year due to an unprecedented, severe snowstorm in April.

Laity Sunday celebrated our church's 250th anniversary with Ray Curtis! synoptic delivery of a long-ago sermon. We rejoice that we live in the Twentieth Century!

Once more we enjoyed a joint Ash Wednesday service with the West Boxford church; also met jointly with them during the summer months, and shared an ecumenical Thanksgiving Eve service which was held at St. Mary's.

In October Marion Harding and Helen Snow attended a joint Essex North and Essex South meeting in Rowley's Congregational Church and came away elated that our Diaconate has been ever aware of the changing needs of our congregation, and enthusiastic about re-evaluating Diaconate responsibilities.

Worship services continued in the sanctuary through "Little Christmas" for two reasons: 1. unseasonably warm weather did not necessitate a move downstairs and 2. Ken Nunan gave us all his "after Christmas" poinsettias which were too numerous to move. These were all distributed after the "Little Christmas" service.

Our church is made up of people who <u>care</u> - not only for its members but for all of God's community. This spirit is enhanced and largely created by the competent leadership of our Minister, Philip Southwick. God bless you, Phil, and everyone.

#### Christian Education

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The number one duty and objective of our Board of Christian Education is to be responsible for the organization, administration and supervision of the entire educational program of our Church. This is so stated in the "Board of Christian Education Policy Booklet" which outlines the policy and guidelines which the Board is encouraged to follow.

If you asked most people, they would probably tell you that the Church School Program was the prime function of the Board of Christian Education. Although we devote the majority of our time to the Church School program, we spend considerable time on other areas of education that affect our Church Family.

Highlights of this past year are as follows:

Fellowship Night with Covered Dish Supper and the program "The Sounds of Truth" trio, featured an evening of most enjoyable Christian-like music.

(over 125 attended)

Lenten series on "Living With Stress in the 80's" March a four week series shared with the West Boxford Congregational Church, covering guilt, frustration, financial, young families, commitments, aging parents and death. Very worthwhile program

with average attendance of about 35-40.

Distributed "Love Loaves" to families for "World April Vision"! Family Night program featuring varied program by boys and girls of our Church School

and also members of the Board of Christian

Education. (good attendance)

Held "Appreciation Supper" for teachers and helpers of the Church School and Nursery. Program consisted of "singing and sharing."

Collected "Love Loaves" and sent nearly \$400 to World Vision for their world-wide distribution

of food and medical help.

Youth and Graduates Sunday - presented by our June Senior High youth and recognizing our graduating

seniors.

Childrens Day featured a musical program, "Jonah" and Bibles, plants and balloons were given to the children to conclude the Church -School year.

This year five "first-time" Senior High young people attended a week at Star Island, experiencing a program of Christian activities that they

shall long remember.

Rally Day was held on September 26, with a September program in connection with this Church's 250th Anniversary year celebration. Refreshments after featured a very special 250th Anniversary cake

baked for the occasion by Lillian Grissino.

A "Haunted House" was provided by our Junior High young people to raise money for UNICEF.

A seven-week series on "Focus on the Family" by Dr. James Dobson, was held at the West Boxford Congregational Church under the co-sponsoship of the Boards of Christian Education of both of our churches. This series was most meaningful and informative to the more than sixty-five to seventy persons who attended each week.

November

The donations of food supplies that were received from our annual Thanksgiving Offering were given to the Crombie Street Congregational Church in Salem; they have a fine weekly mission program of feeding those in need in the community.

The Pre-School Mothers' group turned over \$184, that they had earned from a Tupperware Party, to the Board for educational purposes. (We are most appreciative!)

December

The Annual Christmas Party was held for all children in our Church School up through Junior High. Each child brought a present that was to be given to H.O.M.E., a self-help cooperative project in Hancock County Maine.

Our Junior High and Senior High youth groups have been meeting basically twice a month under the guidance of Barbara Parker and Dwight Southwick for the Junior Highs and Phil Southwick, Beth Arsenault and Bob Houlden for Senior Highs. Some of our programs have been the following:

#### REPORT OF THE CHURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

Someone called me a while ago to ask what I thought was the reason for the success of our Church School. (The caller was planning a workshop.) I answered without hesitation - "the teachers - the love they have for the kids and the fun that they have working with them." We do have fun - along with the normal amount of frustration!

Besides the weekly Sunday lessons, we stress missions and music. Our missions last year included:

- 1. HEIFER FUND: \$200 for pigs, raised by contributions given on a spring Family Night, a February Candy Sale, Birthday money and mission money (collection of first Sunday each month).
- 2. UNICEF: Raised by Junior Highs who made a Ghost House during the Fair and the Sunday following.
- 3. THANKSGIVING FOOD OFFERING: Sent to Crombie St. Church, in Salem.
- 4. CHRISTMAS GIFTS OF TOYS: Brought by children to our Christmas party and given to Project H.O.M.E. in Maine.

#### Our music included:

- 1. Use of our new Church School Hymnals
  - 2. Musical "Jonah A Tale of a Whale" and other songs for Childrens Day in June.
  - 3. Musical numbers learned for Spring Family Night.

We started our year in September with an overnight teachers' retreat in Sandown, N.H., led by Reverend Southwick.

Our motif this year is butterflies, symbolizing new life in Christ. You will be seeing many butterflies from now until Childrens Day, which we hope to celebrate with Spirituals and stories of Jesus.

Our Junior Choir is very busy throughout the year. We sang in the Junior Choir Festival of the Essex County Chapter of the Choristers' Guild in First Church, Wenham, March 21. The children sing once every month in the regular Church service, for Family Night, the Christmas Concert and Walk to Bethlehem, and on Christmas Eve. We had an outing in Sandown on June 6, and a Christmas Party with caroling in the square and for friends nearby.

#### **Trustees**

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The usual maintenance and repairs of the church property have kept us busy this year, plus the unexpected things that continue to happen.

The counter top stove, in the kitchen of the parsonage, wore out and as we were not able to get parts for it, we replaced it with a new one. We also replaced the old vacuum cleaner for the church with a new and better model.

The spring clean-up day in April was well attended and the church took on a new and shiny appearance, as many hands swept, dusted and polished. Many thanks to the Guild members for serving a nice lunch to the workers.

At a special church meeting held in May, the Board of Trustees recommended that the old boiler, which was living on borrowed time, be replaced by two new ones. It was voted on and passed unanimously, and the contract to do the job was given to Elliott Bros.

The new boilers so far have proven to be more efficient and economical than the old one. As it appears now, either one of them running alone will heat the church building except in extremely cold weather. This should result in quite a saving on our coal bill. Many thanks to Steve Robertson for following through on this project, even though he had completed his term on the Board of Trustees last year.

Loose mortar was removed from the chimney at the parsonage, and replaced with new. Also the front steps and walk were repaired. The front steps of the church, and steps at Metcalf House, were repaired and painted.

Bob Cheney donated his time, truck and bulldozer to fill in the cellar hole and to do some grading on the Cottage Street property. Our thanks to Bob for his contribution!

The door on the Thrift Shop and the kitchen door were repaired, storage shelves built in the Metcalf House, leaks in the church roof repaired, and work is progressing on the sanctuary ceiling - plus many other things which have to be taken care of each year.

New dry chemical fire extinguishers were purchased and installed in both boiler rooms, as it is no longer possible to have the old copper extinguishers recharged.

We had four church work parties in the fall, and though the response was not as good as we had hoped for, many things were accomplished - such as raking and cleaning up outside, cleaning up the cellar, minor repairs and painting inside and out, etc. I feel that the fellowship we enjoy, while working on church projects, is as important as how much we actually accomplish.
