To see if the church will authorize the Finance Committee to borrow from the Improvement Fund and/or Renovation Fund, if needed, in anticipation of income to pay current expenses and further, to transfer funds from the Improvement Fund and/or Renovation Fund accounts to the Current Expense account in the event that income for current expenses does not meet the budget expectations;
- To hear the report of the Nominating Committee ARTICLE 4. and to take any action required thereon;
- To hear the report of the Renovation Committee; ARTICLE 5.
- To see if the church will authorize the ARTICLE 6. Renovation Committee to draw up specifications to initiate discussion with one or more architects for the purpose of obtaining quotes for the design of a structural addition to the main church building with authority given to the Finance Committee and/or Cabinet to permit expenditure for the above not to exceed \$3000.00;
- To take any other action relative to the church and ARTICLE 7. its property.

The annual meeting of the First Congregational Church was called to order at 8:03 PM by Donn Chatterton, moderator, with forty five members in attendance.

The Rev. Southwick opened the meeting with prayer.

All members were welcomed to the annual meeting. It was noted that there were many youth among those attending the meeting.

The clerks report of the 1986 annual meeting was read and accepted as read.

The following listed articles were acted on.

ARTICLE 1. To receive the reports of the several boards, committees and officers of the church, and to take action thereon:

Time was given to all members to review the reports booklet. Report of the Nominating Committee would be presented under Article 4.

Allan Barlow reviewed the Treasurer's Financial Statements 1986, Collector's Report 1986 and Budget-1987.

Calvin Pingree moved that the reports be accepted as printed with the noted changes, seconded by Dwight Southwick, so moved.

ARTICLE 2. To hear the report of the Finance committee regarding a church budget for 1987, and to take action thereon;

Comparisons could be made from 1986 to 1987 as the report catergories were in columns noting 1986 budget, 1986 actual and amount budgeted for 1987. It was noted by Allan Barlow that there were salary increases for 1987, and that missions and benevolences were now budgeted. Also noted was that there has been an increase in the total amount of pledged dollars.

Bob Knapp moved that we accept the budget as printed, seconded by Don Ames, so moved.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the church will authorize the Finance Committee to borrow from the Improvement Fund and/or Renovation Fund, if needed, in anticipation of income to pay current expenses and further, to transfer funds from the Improvement Fund and/or Renovation Fund accounts to the Current Expense account in the event that income for current expenses does not meet the budget expectations;

Allan Barlow moved that the church authorize the Finance Committee to borrow and/or transfer funds from the Reserve, Improvement, and/or Renovation Funds, if needed, in anticipation of income to pay current expenses of in the event that income for current expense does not meet budget expectations, seconded by Calvin Pingree, so moved.

ARTICLE 4. To hear the report of the Nominating Committee and to take any action required thereon;

Ed Jones presented the slate of members to be elected to committees as designated.

Calvin Pingree moved that the Nominating Committee's nominations be accepted, seconded by Dwight Southwick, so moved.

ARTICLE 5. To hear the report of the Renovation Committee;

Frank Stewart reported on the findings of the Renovation Committee as reported in "A New Vision". The committee identified the church's physical needs along with evaluating its existing physical plant.

It was determined that there was a lack of space and flexibility in using of space. The overall appearance of the interior of the church and interior and exterior of Metcalf House were poor. Storage space is very limited. The restrooms are in poor condition, the back entrance was "totally inadequate and poorly designed". More kitchen space is desirable. The minister's and secretary's offices were more than crowded.

The committee envisioned a new addition which would provide class rooms within the church which could be used as meeting rooms, a spacious Thrift Shop, a minister's study, a secretary's office in which a person could walk about, updated restrooms, extended kitchen, an office for the church school superintendent, an elevator, increased storage area, a renovated entrance at the back of the church.

"Once an exterior shell was in place and rooms for Sunday School and the Thrift Shop were finished, the less essential portions of the addition could be deferred". The narthex should be cosmetically improved so that one's initial view of the church's interior would be a positive experience. This was identified as a high priority.

The Renovation Committee recommended that "seed money" be obtained through the sale of Metcalf House. A shell could be built with the finishing of class rooms and a Thrift Shop first priority. Other priorities would than be established.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the church will authorize the Renovation Committee to draw up specifications to initiate discussion with one or more architects for the purpose of obtaining quotes for the design of a structural addition to the main church building with authority given to the Finance Committee and/or Cabinet to permit expenditure for the above not to exceed \$3000.00.

Letters from Helen Snow and Evelyn Boose were read. Both Helen and Evelyn are in favor of keeping Metcalf House and putting it into top-notch condition.

A discussion followed concerning pros and cons of the Renovations Committee's recommendations.

Billy Stewart questioned if the selling of Metcalf House would provide sufficient money for an addition and improvements. It would not cover total expenses but it would provide money for a shell and high priority projects.

Forrest Bridges pointed out that Metcalf House is a fire trap and we as a congregation need to look toward a change.

Dorothy Blanchard noted that the purchase of Metcalf House was to provide temporary class room space with the idea that it be torn down and replaced at a later date.

Robert Knapp stated that he was in favor of selling Metcalf House.

Millie Gangloff questioned if we would be in compliance of building codes. This question was discussed by the Renovation Committee and upon research they established that we could meet codes.

Mina Hartman stated that Metcalf House has outlived its' need and it is time to go forward.

Betty Jo Fawley noted that the Thrift Shop need a great deal more room.

Joan Chatterton noted that we need to attract new young families to the church and the addition would provide a more workable environment for everyone's needs.

Shirley Southwick noted that we should look at the total picture. Is a separate building serving our needs or would one larger building better serve out total needs?

Ed Jones favored an addition and questioned if \$3000.00 would be adequate to cover the cost for the search of an architect.

Bob Knapp motioned that we authorize the Renovation Committee to obtain quotes for the design of an addition to the main church building. The search for quotes should not exceed the expenditure of \$3000.00, seconded by Rick Auclair, so moved.

ARTICLE 7. To take any other action relative to the church and its property.

Allan Barlow noted that the main bellows of the church organ need to be replaced. The church has received \$4500.00 anonymously. Additional money could be obtained through the Lenten offering. Allan moved that the church authorize the Board of Trustees to obtain quotes for the renovation and repair of the main bellows in the Butler pipe organ and further, that the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Cabinet, be authorized to expend a sum of money not to exceed \$10,000.00 for said renovation and repair, such activity to commence when the Finance Committee determines that sufficient funding is available, seconded by Forrest Bridges, so moved.

Joan Chatterton noted the need for a new snow blower ro replace the twenty year old snow blower now in questionable use. The Trustees will tackle this problem.

With no further business to discuss, Dwight Southwick motioned that the meeting be adjourned, seconded by Forrest Bridges, so moved.

The meeting adjourned at 10:05 PM.

MINISTER'S REPORT

As I review my church calendar for 1987, I am encouraged by the variety of our church activities - the continuity and the variations. We have reached beyond ourselves in mission and ministry. We have given of ourselves, and received assistance from our State Conference.

I have continued to serve as Registrar of the Essex Association, and Secretary of the Church & Ministry Committee. In that capacity I relate to other churches and ministers throughout the Area. It is my growing conviction that ours is a more cooperative church than many. We have our strengths and weaknesses. However, as individuals we respect each other's opinions, and succeed in resolving our differences democratically and congenially.

An example of this comes from something we did not do this year. After consultations with the Diaconate and parents of prospective Confirmation Class members, it was agreed not to have a class in 1987, but have a more mature one in '88. This was a harmonious decision.

I report to you a brief summarization of the statewide results of Dialogue '86/'87 meetings from the column of our Conference Minister and President in the latest Pilgrim State News. We held our Dialogue meeting in June with Rev. Harry Myers and Bonnie Dinges as our leaders. As those of us who attended can recall, we attempted to complete this unfinished statement about ourselves:

"We are a people who ..."

What did the Conference discover about U.C.C. churches in our state?

(Some programs fell into more than one category.)

1."In completing the unfinished sentence, "we are a people who.." the five most frequent responses were: care; are friendly and fun; are community minded; are Christians on a faith journey; reach out and respond to missions. both locally/in the wider community.

2. The four program areas which local churches most often identified as either "alive and well" or "growing" were: mission

outreach; church school; stewardship; worship/music.

3. The four program areas which local churches most often identified as "going to seed" (in trouble) were: women's associations; men's groups; building and grounds; youth fellowship.

4. The four program areas identified as "new sprouts" (emerging areas of growth) were: social responsibility; mission outreach; church school; youth fellowship."

We have been concerned with Church growth. Members of our church have attended two area-wide programs about it, and returned inspired and encouraged - encouraged that we are doing many of the right things, and convinced that, as a congregation, many more of us can become more intentional about it.

We spent part of our December committee meeting time with the Rev. Roy Nyren of Burlington, and his parishioner Joan Zink, members of the Mass. Conference Task Force on Church Growth. They shared with us the strengths and weaknessesses, the advantages and responsibilities of becoming involved in a State Conference supported program.

At a recent meeting of the Diaconate, it was their opinion that it would be in our best interests to undertake this program in cooperation with the State Conference, at the same time that we are considering the renovation and expansion of our church facilities. With this concern in mind, the article about church growth has been included in our Annual Meeting agenda for 1988.

On a positive note relating to this subject, we have had twenty students enroll in our Church School since our registration in October, and our Superintendent notes with satisfaction that most are regular in attendance.

We cannot simply stand still. Instead, let us forge ahead with faith in God, and confidence about the future as we rely upon His guidance and inspiration.

I wish to express special appreciation and commendation to Evelyn Boose for more than twenty years of faithful and loving service as Church School Superintendent. My sincere thanks to all who have given so willingly in service and joy to this church during 1987. Thank you for allowing me to share this joyful pilgrimage toward God's kingdom with you.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH CLERK

- A. Highlights of Cabinet meetings for 1987 are:
 - 1. January: Voted to accept the Renovation Committee's report entitled "A New Vision". Voted to extend the Renovation Committee's term of service "as needed" in order to carry on with their project.
 - 2. March: Cabinet acted on a recommendation by the Trustees that the fee, charged to the Joyce Dance Studio, be raised by \$20/wk. (to \$90) beginning in September '87. Voted 80% of the Lenten Offering be applied toward the rebuilding of the bellows of the pipe organ; 20% be sent to Camp Rosemary of Boston City Mission.
 - 3. April: In response to an emergency request from Heifer Project, it was voted to allocate our annual "Peace Offering" to the "Save the Cows" endeavor, instead of going to the denomination.
 - 4. May: The Trustees sought guidance from the Cabinet: whether to hire Andover Organ Company to make necessary repairs to the organ, or to seek out other organ companies. The Cabinet voted to go with Andover Organ.
 - 5, October: The Finance Committee sought guidance for the distribution of funds from the Advent Offering. It was voted that 80% be disbursed to the Heating Fund for the main building; 20% be sent to Emmaus House.
 - 6. December: Voted that we would contribute \$250 toward the request from the Essex Association for scholarship funds to aid students studying for the ministry. It was further voted that 20% of the Christmas Eve collection be allocated for missions/benevolences.
- B. The Annual Meeting held on January 29, 1987 was attended by 45 members. There were a number of teenagers present at this meeting. This made a noteworthy beginning to the 1987 year teenagers and adults working together to carry on the work of our Church.
 - At the Annual Meeting, authorization was given to the Renovation Committee to "initiate discussion with one or more architects for the purpose of obtaining quotes for the design of a structual addition to the main church building". Although there was an allowance not to exceed \$3,000 to follow through on a seach for an architect, it should be noted that there has been no expenditure of money in this search.
- C. In June members of all Committees and Cabinet officers took part in "Dialogue '86-'87", sponsored by the State Conference U.C.C. as an attempt in better communication between the Conference leadership and local parishes. The Rev. Harry Myers of Rowley and Bonnie Dinges of Lynnfield were our Dialogue leaders.

- D. On October 17th a Fall Resource Festival was held at the First Congregational Church, Rowley, sponsored by the U.C.C. Northeast Area of the Mass. Conference. Workshops were presented on the following topics:
 - 1. Organists & Choir Directors
 - 2. Youth Workers
 - 3. Missions
 - 4. The Diaconate
 - 5. Trustees
 - 6. Pastoral Relations
 - 7. Stewardship
 - 8. Christian Education
 - 9. Church Growth/Evangelism

Our Church was well-represented with seven members attending the workshops, bringing back new ideas and shared experiences from other churches of our area.

- E. On November 15th the Essex Association held its fall meeting in Merrimac with an emphasis on the importance of Christian Education in the life of the church. Four members of our Christian Education team attended this program.
- F. On December 8, 1987 the Cabinet sponsored a program "Concerning Church Growth" presented by the Rev. Roy Nyren, Minister of the United Church of Christ, Congregational of Burlington, and Joan Zink, a member of his church. In attendance were church committee members and other interested church people. Rev. Nyren is a member of the MACUCC Task Team for Church Growth and Development, which organizes, develops and conducts the training programs for covenanting churches in cooperation with the United Church Board for Homeland Ministries.
- G. Last year there was no screening of the membership list. When reviewing our membership list, it was noted that many listed members have become inactive. A person, who has not participated in the life of the church for a minimum of two years, is considered inactive.

Many of the listed members have relocated <u>outside</u> of Georgetown, but have not requested a membership transfer. Some joined us in their teen years, and did not return to Georgetown after their schooling. Keeping in mind that it is our policy to invite people to transfer their membership (or place them on the inactive list if they do not transfer), the following is an update of our church membership:

REPORT OF THE DIACONATE

The Diaconate is composed of elected church members whose duty it is to assist the Minister in carrying out the spiritual work of our Church.

Members serving on the 1987 board were: Jacqueline Amnott, Charles Blanchard, Forrest Bridges, JoEllen Fielding, Barry Games, Ross Kelloway, Emily Knapp, Janice Murphy, Jan Spence and Frank Stewart.

The Diaconate, as many other committees, met on the second Tuesday of each month with the exception of July and August. There were few meetings at which we had less than 80% attendance, and there were many meetings at which we had 100% attendance. As the attendance records indicate, this was a board which was always there, willing to do their share of work and more. As Co-Chairmen, Frank Stewart and I were always secure in knowing that each member carried out his/her responsibilities. There was always a volunteer to coordinate special tasks. Together we carried out our duties.

We would like to note that Bill and Vivian Rasmussen gave us extra hands by taking care of cards and flowers. We appreciated the time spent and "leg work" done in purchasing and coordinating the distribution of the cards and flowers.

Along with delivering Easter lillies and Christmas poinsettias, the Diaconate members distributed the <u>Guidepost</u> and <u>Upper Room</u> magazines to people unable to attend Church services regularly. Often a ten-minute visit was extended to an hour or two.

Again this year, we were able to help church members and people within our community who needed financial assistance. As Christians we were able to lighten their burden as they faced a family crisis. Christian Service was called upon often to provide transportation, supply meals, etc.

Along with offering financial assistance to our fellowman, the board voted to earmark up to \$5,000 to be transferred from the Memorial Fund to the organ repair fund as needed. Thus we are able to help the Music Committee carry on with their exceptional music programs.

On March 4th an Ash Wednesday Service, held at the Groveland Congregational Church, was well-attended by the people of our Church. Rev. Southwick assisted Rev. Klassen at this service.

On April 16th, Maundy Thursday, the Groveland Congregational Church joined us at our church in observing this special date and carrying out our traditional ritual.

As in previous years, joint worship services were held with West Boxford during the summer months. Upon returning to worship in our church in the fall season, it was decided to hold evening services on September 20th and 27th in place of morning services.

On November 25th, our church was host to the Ecumenical Thanks-giving Eve Service. The Rev. Charles Barton from Groveland's St. James Episcopal Church provided the sermon. Clergy from St. Mary's Church, Groveland Congregational Church, St. Patrick's Church in Groveland, and Second Congregational, West Boxford, also participated in the service. There was a positive response to the special invitations mailed to college students and young people in the work force to attend this service and visit with their high school classmates after the service.

On December 13 the Diaconate was called upon to carry out one of its' duties. Yes - the one duty we hoped wouldn't surface. Reverend Southwick had suddenly become ill and it was Sunday morning Frank Stewart very capably "carried on the religious service of the church in the absence of the minister" while the rest of us gave a special thanks to God that Frank is a member of the Diaconate.

On December 24th we held our Christmas Eve Candlelight Service. This is the highlight of the Christmas season as we celebrate the birth of Jesus. How fortunate we are to be with our families and loved ones and live in a country which recognizes the freedom of religion.

Many thanks to the Reverend Southwick, and all others who assisted us in carrying out the work of the Diaconate.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Our mission projects this year included Heifer Project International, Emmaus House in Haverhill and H.O.M.E. in Orland, Maine. We decided to buy bees for Heifer and then found out about the "Save the Cows" program, sponsored by Heifer (under the government's termination policy, several thousand milking cows were doomed for slaughter - unless they were purchased and sent to needy countries). With this in mind, we switched from bees to cows, sending money we made from the February Candy Sale and the offering from Family Night to Heifer toward the purchase of a cow. Bee money for 2 hives was sent later. We are saving for missions all the time; the Sunday School offering on the first Sunday of every month is used for this purpose.

The people at Emmaus House were amazed and pleased at the amount of food, paper goods and toiletries we had to bring them at Thanksgiving. Thank you everyone for being so generous in your giving.

The Sunday School Christmas Party was a big success. John Morrison and the Junior High boys and girls did a great job entertaining us with the puppets. Each teacher had a craft for each child in the class to make and take home. At the end of the party each child took the gift, he or she brought for H.O.M.E., to the Sanctuary where Dorothy Blanchard showed slides about that mission. Two representatives of H.O.M.E. were on hand to give interesting details about the place, and they were very pleased with all the gifts.

The theme for Family Night was "Peace in the Family". Linda Reilly, Peace Cordinator for the Northeast Area of the U.C.C. was our leader. She had games and activities for everyone to do. Sometimes we participated in family groups, sometimes in age groups or all together; a good time was shared by all.

In February we sponsored a series of programs on Thursday mornings for mothers of pre-school children. Baby-sitting was provided so that the mothers could enjoy an hour and a half of fellowship together. Diane Blunt was our professional baby-sitter, assisted by women from the church. The series included (among other speakers) Mary Rogers, Librarian, who told of interesting ways to use books with children; Nutritionist, Helen Early from the Essex Agricultural Extension Service, and Marge Daniels, Special Education Coordinator for the Georgetown public schools.

Junior Church is for those boys and girls in grades 3 - 6 who go to Church on Sunday mornings with their parents. At a designated time in the service, they go downstairs for an activity with an adult. Anyone, willing to help out in this program, please let us know.

On Children's Day the Church School children presented the musical, "Moses and the Freedom Faratics", directed by Evelyn Boose. This was Evelyn's last Children's Day production as Sunday School Superintendent; she retired on that Sunday. We all thank you, Evelyn, for the many years of love, devotion and caring you have given to the Sunday School. May you enjoy your extra free time.

We were pleased to have fifteen high school graduates come to the service on Graduation Day. Rev. Southwick, as Minister; John Morrison, representing the Board of Christian Education; and Lillian Grissing, Senior High Youth Group Advisor, welcomed these young people and wished them well in their future endeavors; each was presented with gold crosses.

In September we started a new Church School year with a new Superintendent, Dorothy Blanchard, and we welcome you aboard, Dorothy!

Rally Day was celebrated a little differently this year. We made it an early evening service with Sunday School registration before the worship. Rev. Southwick led the service, and the Covenant Players performed some short plays and songs. It's possible we'll try an evening service again.

The Youth Groups have been very active this year. We would like to thank their leaders—Pam Feitz, Junior P.F., and Dwight Southwick and Lillian Grissino, Senior P.F. — for their dedication, love and devotion to our young people. Lillian and Dwight decided that they would be unable to continue as senior advisors at this time. Thank you both for the many hours you have shared with our teens. Rev. Southwick has agreed to coordinate the Senior High P.F. activities with the help of parents and other interested adults. Any time or help you can give Rev. Southwick or Pam Feitz would be greatly appreciated.

I would like to thank all the Board members: John Morrison, Craig Southwic Marge Stewart, Norma Collin, former Superintendent Evelyn Boose, and our present Superintendent Dorothy Blanchard — for all the support and help which you have given me during this past year. Also a big thanks to all who taught in our Sunday School in the past year. We all thank Joan Chatterton for all the little extra things she does for us.

CHURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

It is an unexpected and strange, but rewarding, situation that finds me as a returning Church School Superintendent after a hiatus of 23 years. This long "vacation" gives me a perspective of both changes and continuing traditions.

Perhaps the biggest change is the size of the Church School which at 70 enrollees is about 1/3 the size it was so many years ago. However, it is quite comparable to the size of other Congregational Churches of our size in the area. This Fall the four-year-old class has been sharing 1/2 of their room with the Thrift Shop. We have combined the five-year-olds with the first graders. This seems to be working well. Another positive change is the on-going and well-attended High School Class.

There are two cultural changes that increase the need for a strong Church School as well as having parents being very active partners in Christian Education. The first is the impact of the separation of Church and State in school activities. At school it seems that children no longer learn Christmas Carols nor is their memory reinforced by repeating the Lord's Prayer and hearing Bible readings daily. Over 20 years have elapsed since prayers and Bible reading were banned and it does make a difference in student's knowledge and perhaps attitudes. The second change is that some students spend alternate week-ends with separated parents. In most cases an arrangement can be made between the Church School teacher(s) and the parent; so lesson leaflets can be given out ahead of time; so with parental help, students can keep up with their classes.

The Church School Curriculum being used is the JOY Curriculum published by Winston Press. It is safe to say that no curriculum is entirely satisfactory. However, it is a good solid guide to follow, and supplies us with good resources and good take-home leaflets with ideas for family follow-up. The summary of the program given by the publishers describes it the best.

"In presenting the Christian message, the JOY program builds on basic Christian teachings, integrating the message at each level through a careful balance of belief, Scripture, prayer and life application."

We are fortunate to continue to be fully staffed with a group of dedicated and faithful teachers, whose responsibilities span the infancy stage through the high school years. This year three Junior High teachers are trying an innovative approach to team teaching. We are most appreciative of the strong support from the Board of Christian Education.

Special activities the Church School has had this Fall include the innovative evening combination Rally Day/Church School Registration and Church School Teacher Dedication Service at which the Covenant Players were featured. Advent was observed by four weeks of special worship services for combined age levels. The emphasis was on student

participation as we followed the Advent Ceremony. Copies of suggestions for Home Advent Ceremony observances were distributed as students took leaflets home and, the same information was included in the Church Newsletter. A very successful Christmas Party was held Christmas Sunday afternoon. It included a good blend of activities. Take-home projects were made, entertainment was led by the Junior High Class and their teacher, some slides of H.O.M.E. were shown, a representative of H.O.M.E. was on hand to give a short message and we had the final Advent Candle Ceremony. Activities took place in Metcalf House, the Vestry and the Sanctuary. Refreshments were served by the Board of C.E.

Church School Mission giving includes the offering taken on the first Sunday of each month, the Thanksgiving food etc.contributions for Emmaus House in Haverhill, and the wrapped Christmas gifts given for children at H.O.M.E. We estimate the Church School's portion of the Thanksgiving contribution to be about \$350.00 and their part toward the H.O.M.E. gifts to be worth about \$300.00. This is a very creditable showing for our Church School.

I have attended three Northeast Area meetings. One was the September meeting of the Northeast Area Christian Educators at the Wenham Congregational Church, the second was in October at the Christian Education Session of the Northeast Area's Fall Resource Festival in Rowley. The topic was "Choosing a Church School Curriculum That Is Right For You". It was led by the Rev. Thomas H. Evans, who has recently joined the staff of the Mass. Conference of the United Church of Christ in the new position of Associate Conference Minister for Christian Education. Rev. Evans was also the speaker at the November Essex Association's Fall Meeting in Merrimac. His topic was "The Mission of Education". The essence of the message was that there is no age limit to the need for Christian Education.

We are looking ahead to a larger Church School enrollment, evaluation of the new United Church of Christ Curriculum, some new furniture for the pre-school students, and a facelift for Metcalf House. We need to continue to do good maintenance even as we are considering church renovations.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

For the Trustees, 1987 was the "Year of the Sexton": From January to February, Bob Knapp filled the job; and then after meeting with three candidates, the Board hired Kristy Jackson in March. She resigned in September, and the Trustees (with help from former Board member, Jim Boynton) handled the job through October. In November Dave Fielding (and family) assumed the position. Their work has been excellent, and hopefully they will be with us for a long time.

We retired the snowblower-half of the combination lawnmower/ snowblower referred to in last year's report, and spoken about at last year's Annual Meeting. It was recommended at last year's Annual Meeting that the Trustees look into this purchase. A new Simplicity snowblower was purchased in February - which of course ended all snow storms for the winter season! However, it has served as well during the present winter season.

Both the Metcalf House and Church basements were flooded (as was half the town's) during the rain of spring. They were pumped (thanks to the Fire Dept.) and no damage was discovered.

Dusting, polishing, vacuuming and - thanks to the Guild, eating - was shared by all who attended Clean-up Day. A bright, shiny sweet-smelling Church was the result!

We were happy to accept the donations of a freezer chest and electronic organ during the year; the former from the Dave Stewart household, the latter from Harvey Chandler. The reed organ in the Vestry is for sale. If you know of anyone interested, please notify the Church Office.

While on the subject of the organs, the Andover Organ Company has been contracted to replace the pipe organ's bellows, and other minor repairs for early in 1988.

Under purchases: New ash barrels were purchased for the furnace room, and two new bathroom sinks (donated by the Southwicks) were installed by the Trustees at the Parsonage. The Parsonage, by the way, survived the spring flood quite well.

We continued to handle minor maintenance and repairs including: painting the stage, long room, kitchen, Metcalf House steps, etc., replacing a damaged storm window, replacing broken window in Metcalf door, strengthening Metcalf fire escape and more.

However, gathering together is easy for some -doing the work requires energy. Would you believe this? The December meeting committee consisted of eight seniors and all but one showed up. Some of our "seniors" are over 80: This is great, but how much longer?

REPORT OF THE MISSION COORDINATOR

City Mission Society

The City Mission Society provides year-round programs for the urban poor and summer is their busiest season. In March 1987 our church sent 20% of our Lenten offering to CMS for Camp Rosemary which amounted to \$346.30. Camp Rosemary serves 30 teens and their children each summer which meets at our Mass Conference USC Center in Framingham, MA. The young women who attend the program have particularly complex problems and find themselves mothers long before they are adults. They are given an opportunity to develop parenting skills and guidance in setting goals for the future.

on May 17, 1987 about 49 adults from the First Congregational Church in Groveland, Haverhill and Georgetown went by bus into Boston to attend the CMS "Night at the Pops". The President of CMS, Valerie E. Russell, informed us this was the most successfull ever: The profits CMS receives from this event are particularly welcome as the summer programs place a heavy drain on their resources. Churches and church groups are a significant source of CMS funds. In addition to their year-round programs, the Youth Dept. provides a wide range of summer activities for inner city children, ranging from a weekly trip to the suburbs to expand their horizons - by exposing them to vegetable gardening and creative arts, to full-time tutoring and recreation for middle school students in danger of dropping out of school. Also CMS operates Camp Rosemary for single mothers and their children. Camp Meadowcrest is for women over 60 to give them a relaxing atmosphere to look back, cope with today and plan for the future.

Church World Service

Church World Service is the relief development and refugee assistance arm of 31 Protestant and Orthodox communions working together through the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. CWS currently is involved in programs on five continents in more than 70 countries. CWS also provides disaster and emergency assistance in the United States. Blankets, layettes, health kits, school kits, sewing kits and hospital supplies are some of the ways churches can help CWS.

On February 24, 1987 the Ladies Guild devoted their monthly neeting to CWS. We saw a short film on the work of CWS. We made 20 hospital "johnnies". Using men's old whiteshirts the collar was cut off and bias tape was sewn around the neck. Then all the buttons were cut off and bias tape strips were sewn for ties. If the shirt had long sleeves we just cut the cuffs off and hemmed the sleeve.

On May 14, 1987 11 boxes totaling 300 pounds were dropped off at the Topsfield Trinity Episcopal Church. Once a year the CNS truck picks up donations in our area and then goes to New Windsor, Maryland for processing. Along with the hospital johnnies we also sent sewing kits, health supplies, layettes, blankets and lightweight clothing.

Emmaus, Inc.

Our Thanksgiving Food Collection included about 100 bags of nonperishable proteins, all kinds of baby food, canned vegetables and fruits, packaged cereals, toiletries and paper products which were delivered to Enmaus, Inc., Haverhill. Thanks to Forrest Bridges' truck we were able to make it in one trip!

Renovations are taken place in the attic and basement. This will enable the Haverhill shelter to take in about 34 people. Emmaus, Inc. is the first permanent shelter located at 105 winter Street which offers emergency housing and focuses on finding permanent housing for those who stay at the shelter and provides general counseling. When the renovations are completed, it then means more bunk beds, linears and more refrigerator and freezer space. Anyone interested in working on the staff or volunteering their help in any way, you may call Rev. Tom Bentley at 373-7290. About 20% of our 1937 Aivent offering will go to Emmaus House.

Heifer Project International

The Board of Christian Education in cooperation with the Sunday School Department continue to raise monies for Heifer. As you know HPI provides food-producing animals and training in their care to needy families overseas and in the United States. There was a candy sale in February and a Family Night in April which raised about \$253 to benefit BEES. For \$25 a hive of Bees can be purchased and in turn can produce 250 pounds of honey a year. The bees live on some of the honey and there is plenty for a poor family to take to the market to sell.

In the spring there was an urgent appeal to help save the COVS. HPI needed \$750 for each cow. On Mother's Day/Peace Sunday a special offering was held. Finally enough noney was raised to be able to save I cow and still buy 2 hives of bees. HPI informed us that 100 cows were from farms in Vermont, New Hampshire and New York and were being prepared by the agricultural staff of HPI for snipment to Mexico. They will provide milk for hungry people rather than being slaughtered for beef.

Homemakers Organized for More Employment

On December 20th, many members of the congregation - and the Church Schochildren at their afternoon party - brought 100+ gifts for the children H.O.M.E. In Orland, Maine, H.O.M.E. provides shelter for the homeless, the abused, or temporary "foster care" unier the direction of Sister Lucy Poulin. Lucy and her volunteers build homes, cut firewood, saw lumber, plant gardens, educate, transport, distribute food and narvest crops.

All during the year we send boxes of clothing to H.O.M.E. especially warm, heavy type clothing for all ages. Through a relative of Sister Lucy who lives in Boxford we are able to make connections.

Operation Blessing

Located at 93 White Street, Haverhill, Operation Blessing is a place for the homeless in the Haverhill area to obtain clothing. Joan Chatterton was able to deliver about 5 boxes of warm clothing especially needed when the temperature dropped below 0°.

St. Clare Guild for the Blind

Forty members of the St. Clare Guild for the Blind were served a hearty luncheon at our church on March 28. Piano entertainment was provided by Betty Cooke. The kitchen helpers under the direction of Joan Chatterton prepared enough food for the Saturday Luncheon and was able to provide two meals for the people at Emmais, the homeless shelter in Havernill.

Jaited Church of Christ

On October 4, 1987 an all-church offering was taken for Meignoors in Need which supports our denomination's mission within our own country. On March 29, 1987 an all-church offering was taken for One Great Hour of Sharing which supports our foreign missions. Both the NIN and OGHS offering provides support when hurricanes, earthquakes, floods and famine strikes.

On November 1, 1987 our guest speaker was Mrs. Marilyn Briggs. She is a volunteer lay leader for the United Church Board for World Ministries. The United Church Board for World Ministries is the instrumentality of the United Church of Christ for planning and conducting its program of mission and service abroad and emergency service in the U.S.A. Our pledge monies marked "benevolences" support this Board.

Thank You

for overwhelmingly supporting our mission projects. You have always been very generous in helping our neighbors close by and abroad. "We are all brothers and sisters, custodians of a shared planet, a shared humanity. In trying to meet the needs of the less fortunate members of our human family, we as Christians demonstrate our love, and fulfill the ministry of Jesus Christ."
