Meetings Annual Meeting First Congregational Church, Georgetown, MA

February 2, 1997

The meeting was called to order at 11:22 AM by Moderator Donn Chatterton. The Rev. Philip Southwick opened the meeting in prayer.

Donn read <u>Article I</u> - to accept the reports of the various committees and boards of the church.

Steve Leblanc moved to accept the reports of the various committees and boards of the church. This motion was seconded.

Donn applauded the people who wrote up the reports and said that for a church our size, we have many gifted communicators.

The motion was carried, and the reports were accepted.

<u>Article II</u> To accept the report of the Finance Committee in regard to the 1996 church operations and the proposed budget for 1997.

Allan Barlow moved to accept the reports of the Finance Committee and the 1997 church budget. The motion was seconded.

Allan indicated that finances went along very well in 1996 and that salary increases were granted for 1997 because of this. Donn asked for any discussion relative to the financial reports and commented that these reports seem to get better every year - especially for those who are not "financial wizards".

No additional discussion - the motions was carried, and the financial reports and budget were accepted.

Article III

Frank Stewart moved the church vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Finance Committee to transfer money from the Capital Outlay Fund to the General Checking Account from time to time during the ensuing year, for the purpose of maintaining an equitable cash flow and of financing current expense operations, in the event that unrestricted receipts from stewardship, loose collections, donations and fundraising

activities do not meet needed expenditures. Page 2

The motion was seconded.

Donn asked for any discussion in relation to this motion. A question for this motion to be clarified was asked for. Allan responded that at times funds in the General Checking Account are not available to meet various expenses. It is at that time that the Capital Outlay Account is tapped to transfer these funds.

The motion was carried, and the Article accepted.

** Frank Stewart indicated that 1996 was the first year in a long while that is was not necessary to make transfers of these funds during the year. Frank indicated that we should be proud of this accomplishment. Allan also commented that it was the first time in at least 15 years that funds need not be transferred to the General Checking Acct.

ARTICLE IV

Donna DeSisto moved that the Clerk cast one ballot in favor of the list of officers and committee members for 1997. The motion was seconded. The list of new officers and committee members was read. The Clerk cast one ballot in favor of these nominations.

ARTICLE V

Donn asked for any discussion in regard to the church and its property. He spoke of how fortunate we have been to have Phil as our minister here for 32 years.

Additional Discussion -

Joan Chatterton recognized members of the 1997 Confirmation Class who were in attendance at this meeting. Donn expressed his appreciation to Donna Muise for her hard work in organizing youth activities. He indicated "she's quite a gal!!"

No additional business at hand, Allan Barlow moved that the Annual Meeting adjourn - motion was seconded. The meeting adjourned at 11:40 AM to the Fellowship Hall for coffee!!

REPORT OF THE DIACONATE

Annual Report of the Board of Christian Education 1997

Members of the Board for the year included the following: Beth Castle; Jeff Garvin, Vice-Chairman; Jane Kennedy; Marci Risch; Pam Sheehan, Secretary; and Diane Townsend, Chairman.

Highlights...

In June ten young people from our High School Youth Group flew to Greensboro, NC, to help in the rebuilding of the burned down Pleasant Ridge United Church of Christ. The trip was a huge success spearheaded by Rev. Donna Muise, and aided by youth leader Sue Stead and four other adult chaperons. I was glad to be part of that experience with my husband, Joe. The spirit of our whole Church family was there. Contributions from many people made it happen. It was a giving experience, a learning experience, an unforgettable experience!

Vacation Bible School (VBS) was a hit again this year. It had shaky beginnings but ended up a rousing success. The theme this year was *B.C. 1440--Build a Holy Place* and was held at our Church on August 11-15, 9 a.m.-12:00. Donna Muise enlisted the help of Audrey Giangregorio, a youth leader from Saugus, as our VBS coordinator. Audrey also brought some wonderful helpers with her and was assisted by Donna and all our volunteers-carpenters, artisans, tribe mothers, seamstresses, bakers, general all-around helpers, etc.,--who helped make this a wonderful event.

Our two youth groups--Middle School and High School--are flourishing under the guidance of some pretty special loving, caring and sometimes just plain crazy people! Bob Watts and Marion Freiberg are our Youth Leaders for the Middle School group, and Sue Stead and Jim Urbanski our High School Youth Leaders. Participation is up over last year in both groups. As of late this fall, Jane Kennedy became the liaison between the youth groups/leaders and the Board.

Even though both groups are strong, we are still seeking the spiritual guidance of a youth minister. As you know, Rev. Donna Muise accepted the call of the First Parish Federated Church of South Berwick, Maine, to be their pastor and began her new ministry this summer. She loves it and we wish her well

Through Donna's insight, urging and guidance regarding establishing a Youth Mission Statement, and as a joint venture between the Board of Christian Education and the Diaconate, the following statement, approved by the Cabinet April 15, 1997 and signed by Church family members in support thereof, reads:

The First Congregational Church of Georgetown, MA Mission Statement for Youth Ministry

As an expression of respect for and commitment to young people, our Christian Ministry to youth provides ongoing opportunities for their individual faith exploration, personal development, positive inter-personal relationships and involvement in church and civic activities within an enjoyable, safe and stimulating environment.

Additional Highlights...

In February the Board and Church School hosted the Annual Valentine Candy and Craft Sale and raised \$260.50. Our theme was "Checks for Chicks" and funds went to buy chickens for Heifer Fund International and H.O.M.E (Homemakers Organized for More Employment), Orland, ME. Thanks to bakers, makers.....and takers!

An ad hoc committee went to St. James Church in Amesbury, MA, February 25, 1997 to review the "Whole People of God" curriculum as presented by the publisher. Dorothy Blanchard, Marion Harding and Diane Townsend attended.

Also on February 25, 1997 Donna Muise and Board member Pam Sheehan attended a forum at Georgetown High School presented by the Parent Teacher Organization. Discussion focused on the recent Risk Survey of Georgetown young people. Concerns are that Georgetown students have a higher than state average for substance abuse. Suicide ideation along with other high risk behaviors were also concerns. A copy of the report is at the town library.

In March, the Easter Sunrise Service was conducted by the Middle School Youth followed by our usual super breakfast back at Church. Thanks to the youths for an inspiring service, adults who assisted, and to Pam Sheehan and Emily Knapp and helpers for all that good food. Oh, yes, table waiters/waitresses as well.

On April 20, 1997, the Board hosted a dinner to raise funds for the Youth Mission Trip. Mr. Richard Cummings from Greater Lawrence Habitat for Humanity, Inc. was our after dinner speaker. Delicious soup, chowder and chili and cornbread were made by Joan Chatterton and Tracy Southwick. Thanks to all for food preparation and donations and to our chair people, Jane Kennedy and Janet Pantano. We raised \$300 in a freewill offering!

In May, seven young people were confirmed and welcomed as members of the Church. The mentor program for confirmation classes got good reviews.

June is always a busy month for everyone. Graduate Sunday was the first Sunday of the month, and our high school seniors were recognized and honored before the congregation.

Children's Sunday was the second Sunday in June and the theme for this year was the travels of Paul. The Church School children did a wonderful job. We thank them and our super staff of teachers and aides. Our thanks also to Mr. Al Hurd for his generous donation of the beautiful petunias.

A Teacher Appreciation Dinner hosted by the Board was held June 14, 1997 and chaired by Beth Castle and Pam Sheehan. We thank George and Liz Merrill for graciously offering their home and hospitality for this event.

Starting in February and continuing throughout the summer, meetings were held by the Board to staff Church School with teachers and aides. This consumes most of the Board's time, energy and effort—a task that seems more gargantuan each year. Please appreciate our teachers, aides and Church School Superintendent, Dorothy Blanchard. They are like gold—a most valuable and treasured resource. [Hold on for a moment while I get up onto my CE soapbox!] We are always looking for people to help. When the Board makes a call to recruit you as a teacher or an aide, please listen with an open mind and heart, even if you have not had prior teaching experience. The curriculum is very teacher friendly and classes are taught with a team-teaching approach where a teacher (and possibly an aide) teach for a month and then switch off with another teacher or teacher and aide. This allows near future and hope you will consider our request favorably. If you are interested and available, let us know. Without volunteers our Church School cannot function it should.

Rally Day was September 14, 1997, and our program featured the spirit, music and song of Donna Collins, a super lady from Lynn, MA, who was previously introduced to our young children at VBS where she told stories, played the guitar and sang songs. She was a hit with children and adults alike.

On Oct. 26, 1997 the Board hosted a covered dish supper to show slides and tell tales of the NC Youth Mission Trip. More than 100 people attended. We had a truly enjoyable evening and thank you for your enthusiasm and support. We were pleased to welcome Donna Muise and her youth group from South Berwick.

In November the Church School and Church family gathered food for our annual Thanksgiving food offering which was donated to Emmaus House, Haverhill, MA. Our thanks to all for your thoughtfulness.

The proposed budgets for the Board and the youth groups for '98 were reviewed and forwarded to the Finance Committee in December.

The Board of Christian Education works not only in its individual capacity governed by Board policy but in concert with other boards, committees and groups within the Church and within the greater community. We look forward to serving our Church family in the New Year and want to thank all those people who have helped us out along the way. My sincere appreciation and thanks to all fellow Board members. REPORT OF THE CHURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

The only constant is change. That seems as true for our Church School as it is for any other sub group of a larger organization.

The biggest change has been a revised curriculum. We are still using David C. Cook Bible-In-Life curriculum materials. However, their revitalized approach has included newly formatted and colorful teachers' guides, more current learning activities and a new suggested division of age-appropriate materials. In September David C. Cook gave us complimentary materials for the classes that would be affected by the new divisions, so the teachers were then able to evaluate which materials were best for their classes. The class divisions chosen are quite close to the revision suggestions with the exception of our 7th and 8th Graders who are using the High School Curriculum. The 6th Graders are included in the Upper Elementary set. The advantage of the Kindergarten and Grade 1 using the same materials is that the Grade 1 students are in the very early stages of learning to read.

The curriculum also includes CD Rom discs for coordinated music and some other resources. We need to move to more up-to-date equipment!

Another change involves the 5th and 6th Grade class which now meets for the full hour in their classroom instead of attending the first part of the worship service in the sanctuary.

The 2nd Sunday of each month, Grades 1-6 attend the first part of the worship service with their classes. The Junior Choir (which numbers 34) usually sings on that Sunday. We miss Donna Muise's and Denise Downs' Children's Stories - although Jim Callahan's magic brought a new and interesting dimension to that section of the service! I am personally very pleased to see so many more of our young people participating in the music programs, using the wide variety of their talents.

This Fall our enrollment number was 155 with 21 new families. We appreciate all that the church families can do to help the new families feel at home. This Fall also brought larger class sizes, so meeting places had to be changed. The only classes that meet in the same spaces designated for them last year are the Nursery, Beginners and the 7th and 8th Grades.

The Trustees - especially George Desrochers, Mark Fehlmann and Tom Hamelin were very helpful as we adjusted the correct table and chair heights to the new room assignments. George Desrochers also fixed three stored tables, so we didn't have to buy more.

Churchgoers are well aware that last year and this year the 1st through 4th Grade worship services are held in the Fellowship Hall. This occurs on the first Sunday of each month plus special events such as Advent Season and preparation for Children's Day. We appreciate having Tom Hamelin play the piano for us. Holly Gray was most helpful leading the singing as we prepared for Children's Day. Special thanks goes to Melissa White who

not only sets up the 40-50 chairs and the worship center but who also quietly takes down everything, so that the Fellowship Hall is ready for the Coffee Hour.

We are most fortunate in having a dedicated and competent staff. Some High School students are helping us. This year Claudia Smith oversees the Beginner Class and the High School team of Danielle Stead and Renee Urbanski who rotate the teaching responsibilities monthly with Claudia. Abby Chatterton is Claudia's assistant. Travis Hamelin helps his parents with the Pre-K Class.

Please see the accompanying list of our staff. We had a Teachers' Fall Orientation Meeting. Monthly meetings are held after church fairly regularly for teachers of the Beginners through Grade 8 and occasionally for the Nursery Staff. A very special 'thank you' to the teachers who continue to help us and a 'thank you' to those who have volunteered or who have been volunteered to help fill this year's vacancies. Jaime Krenn, who supervises the Nursery, deserves special recognition for her weekly and overall coordination of that section of our Church School.

We lost eight staff members from last year. We thank them for their service to our young people. They are Carrie Callahan, Karen Flom, Paula Martel, Charleen Maunsell, Gail Morehouse, Deborah Rogers, Jamie Ruh and Diane Sudak. Charleen Maunsell had been teaching for at least 7 years! Holly Gray has had to resign in the middle of this year but hopes to be able to continue to help us on some short term projects.

The policy regarding giving Bibles to our young people has been revised. On Children's Day the 1st Graders will be given the easier to read *International Children's Bible*. This has been well received by both our students and teachers. An adult Bible will be awarded to our students when they are confirmed.

The biggest undertaking of the entire Church School year is the Children's Day Program. Last spring the teachers chose to create the original program *Paul*, the First Missionary. This was based on their winter quarter's curriculum. The classes portrayed short segments of the various highlights of Paul's life. There was coordinated fun music, costumes and minimum scenery. The updated audio system with body mikes helped the program be more understandable to the entire congregation and the students loved using the equipment! Both the teachers and students worked very hard, in a short period of time, to produce an outstanding program.

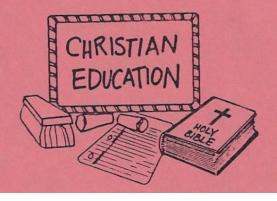
On October 26 Marion Harding and I attended Colossal IV which was a state-wide workshop for Christian Educators sponsored by the Massachusetts Conference, United Church of Christ and the Baptists. We hope to bring one of the leaders, Donald Bliss, from Hyannis, to our Church to lead a workshop for our teachers, Church leaders and parents. He brings the practical application of the multi-intelligence theories to general Church and Church School activities. He brings the appreciation of our several talents and interests into focus and how they can be used in supporting the Lord's work.

Each month I contribute to the Church Newsletter to keep parents and others informed of current curriculum, concerns and activities.

An extra commitment this year for me has been to be the Counselor to three 5th Grade Cub Scouts - Jeffrey Comeau, Jeffrey Fehlmann and Michael Kenneally, who have been working on their God and Family Program. One parent of each Scout acts as a mentor to his/her child. Both the Scouts and their parents have workbooks which require Bible reading, thought-provoking questions, discussion starters and suggested activities. The Counselor works with both parents and Scouts. It has been a very meaningful endeavor. Two service projects were chosen to help put their faith into action. They chose to do yard work for both Satira Stetson and Mina Marble. They not only did the work but also brought refreshments for their hostesses and gave a brief concert for Satira Stetson. 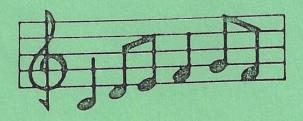

Our February and March 1997 meetings were devoted to missions - sewing quilts for AIDS babies and rolling pennies for Church World Service school kits. The pennies are collected at our Coffee Hours. This year we had a group of Girl Scouts helping us make the quilts and together we were able to send thirty-eight quilts to the ABC Project and purchase twelve Church World Service school kits.

In May we held our Annual Banquet at the *Hearthside* in Essex. After a delicious meal, Betty Cooke regaled us with tales of a trip to Egypt and other exotic places. The fall meetings started off in October with an informative talk and video presentation by Cletta Hunter and Judy Rotondo on their family trip to Switzerland the previous fall. The video showed spectacular scenery and everyone was ready to pack their bags and go! In November, following lunch, the group made 124 Christmas candy favors for patients at the Country Manor Nursing Home in Newburyport where two of our Church members reside. The treats were very much appreciated by the nursing staff at Country Manor. A small group of women attended the Life Long Learning Program's Christmas Party at Northern Essex Community College in December. The program included luncheon, music and carol singing.

Looking ahead - we're hosting *An Elegant Tea* on Friday, April 24th in honor of the Guild's seventy-fifth anniversary! Included in this event will be women from neighboring churches and we invite all of our Church Family women to attend. A fund-raiser/mission project is coming up on Saturday, May 16, when Guild women will serve a luncheon to the members of the St. Clare Guild for the Blind.

REPORT OF THE MISSIONS COORDINATOR

Our Church members have always donated to, and participated in various outreach programs. This past year was no exception. The following are some examples of how we have helped others around us, both in this community and through the United Church of Christ.

The Church School offerings brought in on the first Sunday of each month last year were used to purchase chickens for the needy. Thanks to the Church School offerings and the Valentine's Candy/Crafts sales, a check for \$511.13 was sent to Heifer Fund.

Some of our Church families prepare meals for Emmaus House throughout the year. Donations totalling \$750 were sent to them, and items from our food pantry are delivered when available. Our special Thanksgiving food offering provided many bags of food, paper goods, and other grocery items for their cupboards.

The children at H.O.M.E. in Orland, Maine enjoyed the many wonderful gifts donated by our Church Family. At their annual Christmas Party every child attending received at least one gift to brighten their holiday, and they extended their sincere thanks and gratitude to us for our contribution. They also received a monetary gift of \$489.23.

The Guild used their Coffee Hour pennies, totalling \$144.00 (that's a lot of pennies!), to buy school kits for children in Bosnia. With the help of some of our local Girl Scouts, they made 38 warm and wonderful quilts for babies suffering with AIDS in the Boston area.

Each year two special offerings are taken for the United Church of Christ outreach programs. The Neighbors in Need offering in October is dedicated to helping people here in the United States, and we collected \$569.55 for this cause. The One Great Hour of Sharing offering brought in \$367.00, and is designated to be used to support missions throughout the world. Our Church's total contribution to the United Church Wider Missions was \$5,388.00. Each year our Church also donates \$400.00 to help support the Andover Newton Theological School, and we give \$250 to the Essex Association's Scholarship Fund for seminary students.

Our Church's Diaconate Fund is used to assist local Georgetown families whenever the need arises. The money in this fund comes from endowments as well as from occasional donations.

Our Lenten offering of \$236.48 went to the United Church of Christ Task Force for Women and Children. A 20% portion of our Advent offering, \$241.35, was given to the Salem Mission Project of the Essex Association at the Crombie Street Church in Salem, MA.

"Recycling for Missions" continues to thrive. We recycle beverage can pull-tabs, used postage stamps (air mail, commemorative, and denominations above 32 cents) are recycled by the Heifer Fund, and used eyeglasses are recycled by Habitat for Humanity, with the proceeds going to the construction of homes for the needy. Donations may be dropped off in the box at the foot of the stairs inside the back Clark Street door of the Church.

Of special note this past year was the Senior High Youth Group's Mission Trip to Greensboro, NC. Our congregation raised the funds (in very entertaining ways) to send the group down to help rebuild a church that had burned. Equally noteworthy was the Middle School Youth Group's participation in the annual Walk for Hunger in Boston, raising \$900 for that very important cause.

We encourage our Church families to make their personal contributions - to the missions we support - through the Church treasury. Checks may be made payable to the Church with a memo notation indicating the specific mission. The church records will then reflect the magnitude of how we, as a Church Family, can make a difference when we pool our resources. In 1997, total mission giving to, and through our Church amounted to more than \$17,000.00, which included the Youth Mission Trip!

Thanks to everyone for caring about others in such positive ways. It is important to remember that your support of these missions has been truly needed and greatly appreciated by many people.

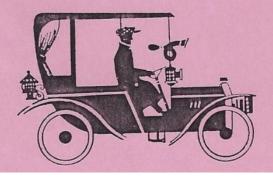
REPORT OF THE FAIR CHAIRS

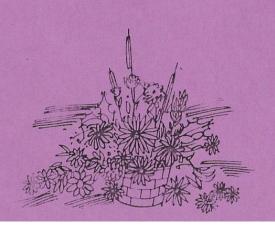
Christmas plants (Diaconate)
