In-Between Times

By its very nature, Advent is an in-between time - one of *already*, but also *not yet*. Jesus has *already* come at Christmas, God in human flesh, serenaded by angelic promises of peace on earth and good will to all people. But Advent is also a season of preparation and waiting for those *not-yet* promises to be fulfilled, when Jesus returns to reign forever.

On the whole, in-between times tend not to be very popular. Most of us are all about reaching the destination: the COVID vaccine, the presidential inauguration, the arrival of our Settled Pastor! Are we there yet?

But in God's economy, the in-between seasons fill the journey *toward* the destination with purpose and meaning. These waiting times are not meant to be passive, but rather active seasons of growth and leaning into God. I think Oswald Chambers said it especially well in *My Utmost for His Highest*:

What people call preparation, God sees as the goal itself. God's purpose is to enable me to see that He can walk on the storms of my life right now. If we have a further goal in mind, we are not paying enough attention to the present time. However, if we realize that moment-by-moment obedience is the goal, then each moment as it comes is precious.

As this congregation stands in between the departure of an Interim Pastor and the arrival of a Settled Pastor, you are called to trust God to "walk on" all the uncertainties of your shared life right now. Be mindful of what God is doing in this present moment and your part in it.

Holly is preparing for ordination and a brand-new call during a social-distancing season when getting to know you will be challenging. Ask God how you can encourage Holly in this present moment. Maybe pray for her? Maybe send her a note of welcome to introduce yourself? Maybe deliver a blueberry pie to her door? Maybe ask God about all of this?

God intends what we think of as in-between times to be moment-to-moment journeying in God's presence. Particularly as we journey together through this in-between season of Advent during this uncertain year of 2020, may your days be rich with awareness of God's presence and joy in your moment-to-moment journey.

Our team has had quite a search journey and we are thankful to begin our new year with Holly walking with us. Following our congregational vote, many of you drove by the church to welcome her with tooting horns and warm wishes. We appreciate your support as well as the support of the entire congregation while we have been on this journey over the two plus years. Below is a copy of the Search Committee's report as read during the Congregational Meeting for those of you who might be interested as we understand the sound was not as good as anticipated during Zoom worship.

Search Committee Congregational Meeting Report

I have been asked to provide a report of the work that we have done for the past 15+ months. It seems like so much longer than that because time seems to have worked differently since the COVID virus impacted our daily lives. When the Transition Team of Marie Birdsall, Michelle Brock, Antoinette Jones, Bob Knapp, and Susan Stead, with guidance from our interim pastor, Reverend Doctor Julie Mavity-Maddalena, was put together last summer, we knew that we were putting together a snapshot of our church to present to potential pastoral candidates. A snapshot that would show exactly what a fun loving, caring community we are. We had worked with our church community to discover what was important to us and to dream what our future could be. And we did it well! It was said more than once during our search by our potential candidates that our profile was well written and really reflected a community that was very enticing to potential pastors. One pastor even asked if the church he was leaving could use it as a model!

Then our Search Committee was put together. This team consisted of Rachel Angerhofer, Michelle Brock, Tom Chafee, Rachel Edwards, Sylvia Johnston, Paul Nelson and Kirsten Orender. Later, Steve Pinto stepped in for Paul Nelson. Thank you, Rich Brock for being thoughtful when putting together this team. The goal is to find people who represent different perspectives of who our church is and we think you did it. We met together in September to begin the process. We met in my home and shared stories and ideas, cookies and conversations, laughter and fellowship. While we knew the gravity of selecting our new pastor, I think some of us might have said to ourselves, "oh this is going to be an easy job finding our new pastor. We can do this quickly. We know who we want. It will only take a couple months. "Boy, were we wrong! God had other ideas.

Once we were ready, we sent our profile to the Conference and we waited for the pastoral profiles to start arriving in our inboxes. And they did! We enjoyed getting together to talk about the profiles we were getting, talking with candidates by phone, getting excited about the possibilities until....... Quarantine started! While it wasn't as easy, we continued to meet by using Zoom. We helped each other get used to this new form of being. The candidates did too. Their profiles continued to come in.

We had 46 individuals apply; followed by multiple telephone interviews, Zoom interviews and/or in-person

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interviews with 27 candidates! They all had so many qualities that were appealing that it was hard to choose. We had a couple candidates whom we thought fit our prayers, but then God called them to a different place, literally to a different part of the country! Then, when our team was really feeling down, Holly's profile appeared! It was like she had read our profile when she was completing hers. This is what she said:

"I believe that I am being called to accompany faith communities as they discern next steps in how they respond to God's call. Perhaps what is needed is that they go out into the neighborhood, visit and learn how best to be God's hands and feet. There are many people not reached by today's traditional church model, but they still hunger for the Holy Spirit. There are many more formulas that bring together the faithful who are seeking community. The message need not change, just the mode of extending Christ's message of love, acceptance and transformation. "

After talking with her by Zoom and meeting with her in person, we knew that Holly was an excellent fit for our congregation.

We then went on to check with her stellar references and put together her compensation package. The salary she accepted is within the guidelines set by our Finance Committee. At this time, she will not need health insurance through our church, however, we have acknowledged through her contract that this can be revisited if her personal circumstances change. The language of her contract is consistent with the guidelines set by the UCC.

Many of you have had an opportunity to meet Holly while preparing for worship today and others have had the chance to meet her by Zoom this past week. She is kind and thoughtful, witty and smart, devoted to walking faithfully every day using God's word as her compass. We feel she will be there to love us as we walk into this new world that we are living here at church and in our lives.

Thank you for believing in us to recommend the next settled pastor for First Congregational Church of Georgetown.

Betty thanks you for her birthday card. It was lovely. She is now officially 96 years old. Her real actual birthday is 15 Sept. 1924. Her legal birthday is 30 Sept. 1924. She was named on 30 Sept. and when her mother told the doctor her name he filled out the Birth Certificate and put 30 Sept. 1924 as her birth date instead of her real birth date of 15 Sept. 1924.

Betty and her mother never noticed the error until 17 years later when Betty applied for her Teacher Certificate to teach rural school in Nebr. and had to get a birth certificate from the State of Nebr. Bureau of Vital Statistics. With two birthdays a year she must be 192!

THE HISTORY OF H.O.M.E.

Sister Lucy Poulin, a young Franciscan nun in the early 70's saw a great need in her community in Northern Maine. There were many isolated cottage industry folk struggling to make a living from wood carving, furniture making, sewing quilts, knitting sweaters and painting pottery. Lucy put forth a fledgling business plan for these one-person businesses and called it Homemakers Organized for More Employment - helping people help themselves. H.O.M.E. became a craft shop, a mail order business, a school, a market stand, a mill, and a chapel.

Sister Lucy had relatives in our area. During one of her weekend visits, our Pastor asked her to speak during the Sunday worship service. Some of us remember her quite vividly as she approached the pulpit – a petite woman in a black dress, appropriate to her Franciscan Order. However, on her head she wore a bright bandana, such as a country woman would wear, but out of sync with a nun's traditional headpiece. She gave a powerful message though her voice was soft. It was an inspiring story about lifting people out of hopelessness and poverty.

Upon learning that there were so many families in this impoverished area with no funds to buy presents for their children at Christmas, our congregation began the tradition of granting the children's wishes from the tags on the H.O.M.E. Christmas tree. There are, at present, four other New England churches that also help this mission at Christmas. They provide gifts for older teens, adults and the elderly.

To this day Sister Lucy is held in high regard by her community. Nearly ninety years old, and somewhat frail, she has put the H.O.M.E. leadership into capable younger hands. She lives in a rambling farmhouse that has been turned into a boarding home with many residents who are working but not earning enough to rent. They are grateful for the support that this shared living arrangement provides. And, they have Lucy as their friend and mentor.

H.O.M.E. has expanded into ever widening circles over the decades, while overcoming a steady stream of maintenance problems that come with long cold winters and overused, secondhand farming equipment and trucks that are constantly breaking down! Lumber is now provided from H.O.M.E.'s own mill and used to build modest homes on Land Trust acreage brokered by Lucy. Educational initiatives (tutoring/GED classes) are integral to H.O.M.E.'s mission. Gardens are nurtured, though the soil is rocky and unfriendly, a food truck visits the elderly, the soup kitchen provides nutritious meals to those living on the edge, and H.O.M.E.'s store sells wares locally and in larger Maine cities from the talented hands of the area's crafts people. The challenges of this remote Northern Maine county still prevail, with isolation and lack of employment, but H.O.M.E. continues to champion the poor and underserved with love, compassion, and most importantly ... with hope. In closing, a quote from Sister Lucy:

"If the world is to be a good place for anyone, it has to be a good place for everyone. These days we need to remember the importance of individual responsibility and the far-reaching effects of one act of human kindness."
