THE MINISTER'S REPORT

The past year has been a good one. Our Church has in many ways moved ahead; change is apparent everywhere, and yet there is a wonderful stability evident too, so that the change does not become chaotic. Growth appears on almost all sides, indicating an increasing ministry to our fellowship and Town. And through it all, we trust that there is an increasing bond uniting us all one with another, and all in love with our common Lord and Master.

The Church School has continued its everpresent growth, making even the once spacious Metcalf House a crowded and inadequate building. A superior staff of teachers and an excellent curriculum attract more and more young people almost weekly. A Long Range Planning Committee has recently been appointed by the Church Cabinet to study the future needs of the Church, so that we shall be prepared to meet our needs before they overwhelm us. This Committee will study other than Church School needs, of course, but it is in this area that the most critical and urgent problems lie.

In planning for the future, the Church acquired one of the houses on Cottage Street, and has rented it for the time being, until a more necessary use presents itself to us. It would appear to be wise to secure such land as it becomes available, so that when we find ourselves needing this land for expansion or whatever purpose, we will not again wish that we had bought it when the price was more reasonable. Our Church is growing, and we must anticipate this growth to continue for several years yet.

For a good many years, a major problem in the Church was to find enough people for the jobs which had to be done. Now we find ourselves in almost the exact opposite dilemma — that of finding enough jobs for the people in our Church. Our Boards and Committees will find some solution to this by appointing sub-committees to aid them in their increasing work. Certainly another way is to expand our ministry to the Town and its people and to use lay people in this expansion.

The Church has closed its year in excellent financial condition, probably the best in a good many years. This does not mean that we can relax, for the work is done; hardly that! But it does mean that the Church has adequate financial resources to meet its needs when they are tapped. Our budget this year calls for expenditures of budget items in excess of \$26,000; this can be met, and if our Church is going to continue to do its work in the Name of Christ, it must be met.

Our Church's future shines brightly ahead, but to accomplish future dreams, it always takes present work and dilligence on the part of every member and friend of the Church. Let us fervently do our part for the coming of the Kingdom of God, that God's will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.

Christian Education

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

This past year has been, as all years are, one of some accomplishment and some frustration.

As in other years, the principle interest of the Board of Christian Education has been the Church School, although we have tried to aid in the care of the Junior Choir, and have assumed, for the past two Christmas seasons, the presentation of the Pageant.

Parents Night, held in June, was again a pleasant experience. We feel that, in these busy days, an attendance of one hundred and fifty at a supper meeting is a sign of interest that is very encouraging.

The Church School, having adopted the United Church Curriculum, it was necessary to see that classes were held to train our teachers. Several were sent throughout the year to the various Conferences at Framingham. In September the members of the Board served dinner to the entire teaching staff after Church. A meeting was held afterward, with an instructor for each class. Many guests were present from surrounding Churches in the Essex North Conference. Dr. Paul Myers was guest speaker.

Two Girl Scouts, who finished a year of study comparable to that required for the God and Country Award for Boy Scouts, were presented medals. These were designed by Mrs. Richard Nichols, and are unique, since no award of this kind has been presented to Protestant Girl Scouts before.

The Family Workshop was again a success, with more than two hundred attending. This was held under the very able management of Mrs. Harold Howe.

Throughout the year we have tried to be attentive to the needs and wants of our very excellent teaching staff, some times failing in accomplishing our goals because of our present crowded conditions.

In leaving the Board, I wish to thank all those who have so kindly and ably assisted in the things accomplished.

REPORT OF CHURCH SCHOOL A YEAR OF CHANGE:

Probably the biggest change in the Church School is the new United Church Curriculum. The teachers became quite excited a year ago when it was introduced at a Training Institute in Framingham. The new material is almost revolutionary. You have probably been shocked as you have seen some of the books and some of the new art displayed around the Church. Perhaps we have scored a point, for the new courses are meant to create a reaction. Students are supposed to get involved; it is hoped a greater living faith will develop.

New books, new visuals, new audio-visuals, and best of all, the best of the modern teaching techniques are spelled out for the teachers' use. The material is not perfect, but it is the very best available at the present time. Many of you will be pleased to see the Church tackling issues that have been considered too controversial. One danger is picking out any one teaching tool, like pictures, without considering the program as a whole.

As with the Pilgrim Series, the entire Church School study is based around a general theme which is presented so as to neet the capacities of the various age levels. The curriculum is based on a two year cycle. Every two years we will be repeating our theme, but the students will be studying it with more maturity than they did before.

The Church School now follows public school with two semesters for the regular school year. The third theme is designed to be covered during the July and August Church School or at Vacation Church School.

Another change associated with this is the new policy on pupils' books. Again we follow the public school. Pupils books are being loaned to those in Grades 3-12. These will be collected at the end of the Course of study. Students are responsible for returning the books or replacement price.

We are literally bulging at the seams. Our new material also makes us more aware of this problem. The students do get involved, they do research, they move around, they are active discussers. So — we need larger rooms and more privacy; so that one group's activity won't disturb another's. Can you imagine 16 active 4th Graders in the small rooms at Metcalf House? With a shoehorn, they fit! Our enrollment has climbed to 280 pupils — Nursery Class 3 year olds through High School.

We have had very active Department Superintendents. This is fairly new in our Church School. They have spent long hours behind the scenes helping the operation run smoothly. All of them have taken advantage of the many teacher training opportunities. Mrs. Kneeland and Mrs. Ryder were able to attend the week-end Training Institute at the Congregational Conference Center in Framingham last summer.

REPORT OF PIONEER FELLOWSHIP

The Pioneer Fellowship has, in the past year, averaged between fifteen and twenty active members. We have had a variety of programs and activities.

Our serious activities have included movies on safe driving, the refugee problem, a study of the Disciples and a discussion on Catholicism when we visited St. Mary's. This fall Mr. Reed has conducted talks on Worship Services; methods and explanations of the various parts of the formal service,

We have had a variety of dances during the past year with up to forty teenagers attending. Last spring we also went bowling and roller skating, and held a scavenger hunt. A very successful Work Day For Christ was held in May. We painted, washed windows, washed cars, raked leaves, moved furniture and baby-sat; with a total of \$31.00 for our efforts, we purchased small games, puzzles, candy, notepaper, crayons, pencils and erasers, to send to refugee children in camps in Europe through Church World Service. A final trip was held early in June when twenty of us went to Canobe Lake Park for a picnic and to enjoy the rides.

This past fall we have held several dances and a scavenger hunt. An ice-skating party had to be called off because of poor weather, but will be scheduled again as soon as the ice is clear.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees wishes to thank the Congregation for the excellent support received during the year. It is only through the cooperation of the people in the Church that the Trustees are able to undertake projects and complete them. A great deal of work has been accomplished this past year, but only because of the willing workers in our Church.

Through the generosity of the Congregation, we were able to purchase new pew cushions for the Sanctuary. At the present time we are painting the Vestry, long room, Nursery and the kitchen ceiling. This was made possible by a donation of \$150 from the Couples Club. We have had two work parties with up to a dozen men helping.

We now have a new package insurance policy on the Church and Metcalf House which gives us more insurance for less money.

The following is a list of some of the projects completed this past year.

- 1. City gas installed in kitchen.
- 2. Trim on Metcalf House and one end of the Parsonage painted.
- 3. Work on reinforcing beams and rafters in Church completed.
- 4. New vacuum cleaner donated to be used in the Church.
- 5. New stairs built on Clark St. entrance to the Metcalf House.
- 6. New double doors installed on Clark St. entrance to the Church.
- 7. New "off-the-premises" phone installed in the Mctcalf House.
- 8. Mr. Chapman was hired as our new Sexton.
- 9. New railing installed on the stairs in the Narthex.
- 10. Fire alarm bell installed in Metcalf House (courtesy of Douglas Melzard).
- 11. Stairs in Narthex refinished.
- 12. New clock presented by Mr. Raymond Kinney to be used in the Vestry.
- 13. House on Cottage Street was recently purchased and is to be rented shortly.

This is the first piece of property in a long range plan to purchase all available property on Cottage Street for future expansion of the Church.

The next large project is the repair work on the Church organ. A fund was started at Christmas and we do hope enough money will be realized to do a thorough job.

The Finance Committee has held a regular meeting each month to approve the Church bills and discuss Church finances. The Church ended the past fiscal year with a surplus. All approved bills have been paid. For the actual figures, refer to the treasurer's report.

During the past year, a successful drive was made to raise money for pew cushions. These cushions have been purchased and installed. The Finance Committee wishes to thank those who made this possible.

At Christmas we asked that a gift be made to the organ repair fund. The fund now amounts to over \$1,000. It has been estimated that at least \$3,500 will be needed to recondition our fine organ. We acknowledge the support received from all concerned.

The "Every Family Canvass" was conducted during the last week in November, after a postponement due to the tragic assassination of our President. This canvass was led by Mr. Harold F. Howe and a very able group of captains and workers. It was our most complete and most successful canvass so far. We sincerely thank those who made this possible.

During the year, Mr. Dominic deFilippo found it necessary to resign from the Finance Committee in order to devote more time to his duties as Choir Director. We appreciate the fine work Mr. deFilippo has done. Mr. Lawrence Tripp was asked to fill the vacancy.

Mr. Harold Howe's term expired this year and he did not wish to be re-elected. The Finance Committee hopes, however, that it may still call upon Mr. Howe for help and advice in our future efforts. At this time, we wish to express our gratitude for Mr. Howe's efforts. Dr. Bainbridge Larkin was elected as the new member of the Committee.

The Finance Committee could not function nearly as well as it does if it were not for the very efficient work of Susan Merrill and Ruth Jones.

During the year, we took advantage of the additional interest offered by the Georgetown Savings Bank by depositing the general fund in a special notice account.

As voted by the Church, \$650 of the Church Fair money is now in a special account. The policy of reinvesting ten percent of the interest has been continued. The mortgage on the Metcalf House was paid off in May.

The Finance Committee desires to express its sincere appreciation for the cooperation of the Church members and officers.
