REPORT OF THE MINISTER

It is a bit hard to realize, as I sit here to write this Annual Report, that it will be the last one which I will submit to this Church. Since it is the last one, it should probably sum up all of my activities for the past seven years. And yet this would be neither practical or possible. Some ministers are able by intricate book keeping to submit reports giving exact numbers of house and hospital calls, hours spent in meetings, as well as other similar information. This tells part of the story but I am persuaded, the less important part of the story.

Statistics cannot tell of the lives which have been touched, the hearts which have been opened, or the spirits which have been moved by the Minister in his work for Christ's Church. No one on earth knows fully this information, and yet we trust that lives, and hearts, and spirits are compellingly affected by what the Church does; if it were not so, we would be as St. Paul suggested, of all men most to be pitied.

Our Church has seen great growth in the past year, and in the past seven years. Certainly, it was not at all due only to the Minister of the Church, although he may well have had a hand in it. The vast majority of the credit lies with a loyal and devoted group of lay people, who are willing, indefatigable, and possessed of a vision of a great Church for the glory of God. Some, too, of the credit for this growth which we see in this Church, in membership both in the Church and Church School, is due to the excellent foundation laid by my predecessor, the Rev. Arthur Coulthard. Real growth and progress come from work and sacrifice, from trying and failing, and attempting again until success is achieved. We are filled with this kind of people in this Church.

We ended the year in good condition - financially, we are strong. Although we never seem to have all the money we want, yet every bill is paid, and a surplus remains after each month's accumulated bills are paid. Physically, the Church and its property are in very good condition, with the greatest need lying in the area of expansion of present facilities. Our Boards and Committees, our Church offices and organizations, are peopled with excellent leadership; and our staff positions are filled with dedicated and talented people.

If there is ever a time when a Minister should leave his Church, it is when that Church is strongest. That time seems to be now, and although I go most reluctantly, I go knowing the Church will grow stronger in its witness for Christ.

To paraphrase St. Paul, "I have fought the good fight. I have done my work, I have kept the faith".

REPORT OF THE DEACONS

During the past year, the Deacons held monthly meetings to discuss and act upon the matters for which they are responsible.

In addition to routine business, the following highlights are worthy of mention: The practice, followed in previous years, of meeting with prospective new members has been retained. This continues to be one of the more pleasant and satisfying features of the Deacons' duties. Memorial Fund purchases resulted in several significant additions to the Church.

A Book of Remembrance and a Bronze Memorial Tablet have been placed in the front of the Sanctuary and the illuminated record has now been brought up-to-date. Earlier in the year, a conscle-type carillon was purchased and dedicated at the Easter Service in memory of Mrs. Robert Metcalf. As an invitation to prayer, the carillon has greatly beautified our service and has a mood forming quality which is exactly right for the occasion.

Our summer pulpit was filled for two weeks this year by our Minister for Youth, Mr. Lyman Reed. It was also a pleasure to welcome back Mr. Jack Condon, the son of one of our parishioners who filled the pulpit during the remaining two weeks of the Rev. Mr. Fleming's vacation.

In response to a suggestion from several Church members, two additional Communion services are being added to the year's calendar. These services will be held on the first Sunday in June, and the first Sunday in December.

In the coming year, several neighborhood fellowship meetings are planned to be held in the homes of Church members. The first of these meetings will take place in January and it is expected that they will be informal in nature, and initially somewhat experimental.

Christian Education BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

The members of the Board of Christian Education for 1964 were, Mrs. Nichols, Mrs. Illsley, Mrs. Johnson, Mr. Condon, Mr. Chatterton and Mr. Winkelman. In January a work shop was held on the new Sunday School material for our teachers and teachers of other Churches were also invited.

A Young Adult Group was organized in February for post high school boys and girls. The Board voted to establish Lenten services to be held every Wednesday evening with the different departments of the Sunday School in charge each week. The Board established a policy of mailing the minutes of it's last meeting to each member along with an agenda for the next meeting. The board also voted to spend the first thrity minutes of each regular meeting in some manner of study which will aid it in the better fulfillment of it's duties and responsibilities. At the May meeting the Board adopted policies to govern the Board of Christian Education.

At the May meeting the Board announced that Mrs. E. Boose would be the new Sunday School Superintendent in September due to the resignation of Mrs. Blanchard.

The Vacation Church School and Parents Day were held in June. The Vacation Church School was a great success due to the fine work of all teachers under the direction of Mrs. Fleming. It was with regret that the Board learned that Mr. Reed would not be back with us this year.

At the August meeting, the board decided to hold an organizational and get acquainted meeting for the teachers on Sunday, September 20 from 9:30 A.M. to 10:30, followed by coffee.

A recognition program as part of the Sunday service was held on September 20th to acquaint the congregation with the members of the teaching staff. The Board authorized Mr. Fleming to increase the salary of the student assistant to \$30. The Board up to this month had spent \$1,150 of it's \$1,500 budget. The Board announced the appointment of Mr. W. Kargus as the new student assistant.

The fall term of our Church Sunday School got off to a good start under the direction of Mrs. Boose and an excellant staff of teachers.

The Board attended the November teachers meeting and at this time, the Teacher Church Agreement was presented to the teachers.

The Christmas Family Workshop was held on December 13th under the direction of Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Illsley and the Christmas Pageant was held December 20th under the direction of Mrs. Nichols and Mrs. Reed. The Board again voted to financially support the Church basketball team. The Board voted Mr. Chatterton as the new Chairman and Mrs. Illsley as the new Secretary for the coming year.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

Our Church School continues to grow, with an enrollment of about 250 last year, and with an average attendance of between 160 and 190 children. Our present teaching staff includes 26 teachers and 15 assistants.

I hope that the members of the Church realize the time and thought that is required to be successful Church School teachers. We have an excellent staff who give a great deal to our Church School.

We have tried various ways to help make our teaching more effective. We have special speakers and discussion at teachers meetings. Some teachers attended workshops at Framingham and Bradford. During Lent all of the teachers participated in four meetings to show interested Church members how the individual departments worked. This fall we started a weekly Bible study class.

We are now using the second year material of the United Church Curriculum. Roger Shinn, one of the developers of the curriculum, has written a book about the purpose of Christian education. The following quotes are typical of the thoughts which we are asked to consider when we prepare to teach the children.

"Does the Church School bring the word of God into our lives today, or does it keep Christ and the Bible at a safe distance?

Do children and adults really enter into a community of faith where they are appreciated as persons? Do they experience love instead of just talking about it?

Christian education has a very similar aim for the three-year old, the adolescent and the grandparent; to introllce persons into the life and mission of the community of Christian faith."

Most of us who use the new curriculum are enthusiastic about it. We hope that many of the Church members have become acquainted with it and feel as we do.

REPORT OF THE YOUTH FELLOWSHIPS

The Youth Fellowships have met regularly for the past year at their regular Sunday meeting times.

During the winter and spring of 1964, the Pioneer Fellowship was under the direction of Mr. Lyman Reed. Some of the meetings were taken up with serieus discussions and learning how to conduct worship servies. Outside activies including, bowling and skating parties and a Work Day For Christ. Occasionally Friday night dances were held in the Vestry. In the fall of 1964, Mr. Walter Kargus became the group's new Director. He has carried on a varied program for our young people.

The Pilgrim Fellowship under the direction of Mr. Fleming, assisted by Mr. Kargus has continued their service projects this past year. Always a popular service, the free baby-sitting is very much in demand from the Couples Club, the first Monday night of each month. The Fellowship has continued to support a Korean orphan and they earn the money by sponsoring dinners at the Church. They continue their service project to the Carleton Home by shoveling snow there after each storm.

Activities of the Pilgrim Fellowship include open discussions, movies, debates, speakers, and a once-monthly "Fireside meeting". These meetings are held in members homes, or with a family in the congregation who are interested in the young people and are willing to open up their home to them for an informal, "homey" meeting. The Fellowship has also enjoyed field trips to Boston to study city mission work, and to attend football and basketball games.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT

This year I have been very fortunate in having a willing and active group of fellow members on the Board of Trustees for which I am greatly indebted. Additionally, the Trustees have had the cooperation of many church members and friends so that all the functions of the Church were carried out without any serious interferences which might well have occurred because of having only a part-time sexton.

Early this year Mr. Chapman resigned as Sexton due to the pressure of his full-time employment. In his place Mr. Bourassa accepted and fulfilled the sexton's job until the fall when by mutual agreement, he resigned, principally because of his living in Groveland. At this time, our Mr. Joseph Sheehan took his place. Since then Joe and Carol have performed in a most satisfactory manner.

Throughout the year a number of work programs have been held in which members of the Board and others interested in the Church, improved the property. We are indebted to these people for spending of their time and money for improvement of our Church. Included in the interesting activities of the Trustees and the Church members and friends during the past year are the following:

- 1/ A new procedure has been worked out to care for the tile floors in all our buildings. The new procedure involves the use of a material called Poly Glo and it is our opinion this new procedure has resulted in cleaner, shinier floors.
- 2/ The vestry was redecorated which included painting the walls and doors, the installation of new drapes, and a new curtain.
- 3/ The dry wells on the street side of the lawn were remade, and new grass was planted in this area to improve the outside appearance of the Church.
- 4/ The large coffee urn used for suppers, etc., was repaired by replacing the cracked agate with a new stainless steel liner.
- 5/ Improvements were made in the parsonage including redecorating as well as repairing the tile in the shower.
- 6/ The large kitchen door of the Church was replaced with a solid door.
- 7/ The ladies! lavatory was remodeled and redecorated and the heating in both lavatories was improved by remodeling.
- 8/ A closet was built in the back hall to house the robes and music for the Junior Choir, and has resulted in much greater convenience for the Choir Director.
- 9/ The house at 3 Cottage St., owned by the Church has been rented for the year, and remains in good condition.

Immediate plans for further remodeling and decorating include:

- 1/ Redecorating the Sanctuary using the funds made available from the Christmas offering.
- 2 / Replacing the floor of the stage in the Vestry. 3/ Painting the outside of the Church, particularly the side adjacent to the road.
