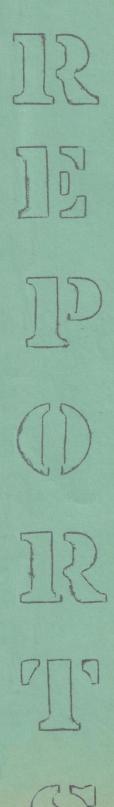

Dear Friends,

This letter is one of the most difficult which I have been called upon to write. It is difficult because of the deep relationship which we have had for the past several years, and because it is not wholly something which I want to do.

My task here is to submit my resignation as your minister, effective April 19, 1965, to accept a call from the Church of Christ, Congregational, Millis, Massachusetts. This has not been an easy decision to make, as you must know. Careful and prayerful consideration has gone into this choice, and were the result to be purely selfish, this letter would not have to be written. But all choices which we make in this life, if they are to be worthy of our high calling as Christians, cannot be limited to self-interest; and so it is in this present case, that I must realize that my work here is largely done. Just as a field is set to corn one year and to cats the next, so must a minister move on when his work is completed. To stay on, much as one might wish to do, would admittedly be selfish, and would give rise to a certain stagnation which must never be allowed to jeopardize the work of Christ.

We look forward, of course, to our new Church and the challenges which it will bring; but our eyes will ever glance back here, where we have thus far lived together longest. The friendships and relationships which have grown here through the years will remain strong and enduring. Our roots here are deep. We pray that this Church will continue to grow ever stronger in its witness for our common Lord thus expressing a spiritual unity which is fitting for the Kingdom of God.

#### MINISTER'S REPORT

During 1965 we have all had reasons for taking honest looks at ourselves as Christians, and at this Church's strengths and weaknesses, apparent and hidden. As we faced the problems involved in changing ministers, many things came to light. The minister had taken care of many little details for us. Naturally, it takes time and diplomacy to delegate such responsibilities to committees or individuals.

We do not always like to change, but we do always need to be changing and growing. All of us need to be asking questions, suggesting changes, so that we let Christ affect all the areas of our lives. We will continue to try out new ways of taking God's ways to others and letting them strike home in us. In all such experimentation we must diligently ask God's help in lifting our activities and programs toward the idealism we see in Jesus Christ, and never consciously drag the Church into accepting the standards of the world in an effort to keep up with the times. One of the signs of a healthy Church is its willingness and enthusiasm to try something new,

In the few months I have been with you, I have realized how sensitive the Pastoral Supply Committee was to the various interests and needs of this Church. As we came to learn of you through them, my wife and I both sensed among them an awareness to the leading of the Holy Spirit. We believe that God did not simply bring us together, but is leading us on together in an adventure which no one of us can map out far in advance. We must feel and trust in the leading of God's Holy Spirit, from week to week as well as from year to year.

In the few months we have been together we have been getting acquainted with each other as persons. I have been getting an on the scene view of the programs and activities of the committees and groups of the Church, and of the problems and concerns of the community. I appreciate and will continue to need our combined efforts to keep informed of people's special needs for pastoral services. Without knowledge of needs and illnesses and the like, being at the right place at the time one is especially needed is too dependent on chance.

Depending, as did our fathers, upon the continued guidance of the Holy Spirit, let us push on together toward the goal, the kingdom of God on earth, made possible by God as Christ dwells within each of us and thus unites us.

#### DEACONS REPORT

The year of 1965 was one filled with more than the usual work-load for the Deacens. On Easter Sunday, the Deacons and Deaconesses served breakfast to the hardy people who attended the Sunrise Service. A breakfast of pancakes and sausages and coffee was set before approximately 25 people

The Deacons were asked to poll the congregation and with the money raised, purchased a suitable gift for the Flomings. A little over \$500 was raised, Church members as well as friends of the Flomings donated money, and attended a reception held in the Church. A silver tea set and a money tree were presented together with a book containing the names of those attending.

Dr. Schofield did an admirable job of keeping things running smoothly, as well as keeping the Sunday attendance up. A reception was held for Dr. and Mrs. Schofield on the last Sunday he preached and he was presented with a gift as a token of our appreciation.

The first Sunday in October Mr. Southwick took over the helm and our Church continued its upward progress of taking in new members and growing.

Among the duties of the Deacons, is the administration of the Memorial Fund through which articles of a lasting nature are purchased for the Church. Several of the items purchased this year were installed hearing aids, Baptismal Faunt, Nativity scene.

Leaving the post of Deacons this past December are Clyde Tozier and Kenneth Tripp. Taking their place are Everett Bunker and Leland Lowell, with Matthew R. Kelloway as their Chairman.

## **Christian Education**

## BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

As 1966 begins, the Board of Christian Education looks toward the continuing challenge of providing a well-rounded program of education and fellowship for our children - a program not confined by nor limited to "one classroom hour" sessions of a Sunday morning.

> Many people have given generously of their time and ability during 1965 to render successful various programs for which the Board of Christian Education is responsible.

The very teachers in our Church School make possible the functioning of such a Board. Whereas the choice of a Church School curriculum is a responsibility of a Board of Christian Education, its execution is in the hands of the teachers. We, as a Church, are fortunate that our Church School is staffed by capable, devoted men and women all of whom work under the guidance of Superindendent, Eveyln Boose.

> Your active support is a vital contribution to the continuance of the weekly Sunday morning classes; to summer Vacation Church School, Children's Sunday and the Church Family Picnic; to both Youth Groups, Youth Sunday, the Christmas Workshop, the Pastor's Confirmation Class. The "success" of activities such as these is measured not by more "numbers participating"rather by the spirit of fellowship and co-operation which each produces.

We would be remiss if we omitted certain direct acknowledgments: to Mrs. Elmer Kneeland and her staff for an efficiently organized and effectively operated Vacation Church School - June 21 to June 25 at Camp Leslie; to those Church families who opened their homes to the High School Youth Group of the First Baptist Church of Royal Oak, Michigan providing overnight accomodations for these young people, following a Board of Christian Education sponsored beach party at Crane's Beach June 19, during that group's summer trip to the East Coast; to Lib Illsley (whose term on the Board expired in December) for yet another rewarding Christmas Workshop on December 12 - now firmly entrenched as an annual tradition in our Church, one looked forward to with anticipation by children and parents alike; to the Rev. Mr. Southwick who, at the request of the Board of Christian Education, has reorganized the Church School Class for High School students (Freshman through Senior) and who has undertaken the supervision of both the Pioneer and Pilgrim Youth Fellowships; to you, the Congregation and, again, to the teachers, for an overwhelming response to the Church Picnic (the afternoon of Children's Sunday, June 6) the first picnic of its kind to be held by our Church in many a year - an event which, like the Christmas Workshop, promises to be another "annual" family activity.

## Superintendent

#### REPORT OF THE CHURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

Our Church School has a registration of 276 children this year. There are 22 teachers and 14 assistants. This is the third year that we have used the United Church curriculum. This curriculum is based upon a twoyear cycle, so we are again using material used the first year. This means that our cost for educational material will be considerably reduced from now on.

> Our Church School collection from the first Sunday of the month is used for missions. We are still sponsoring a Korean orphan and we receive cards and letters from him occasionally. The children brought a special Thanksgiving offering, which we sent to buy a warn winter outfit for our boy and others at the home.

On February 7th, the teachers were the guests of the Board of Christian Education at a catered dinner. Reverend Horace Seldon, Director of Christian Education for the State Conference was the speaker,

> We have an excellent teaching staff who work hard and are very enthusiastic about their work with our children. We also have an excellent group of responsible teenage girls who have contributed greatly to the success of our Church School and the Infantry.

This has been a good year for our Church School. We look forward to continuing to serve our children and, quoting one of the writers of our manual, "Our intention is that each person we serve through the educational mission of the Church, will find his place in the Christian community and so become prepared to serve God and man in both Church and the world."

## Trustees

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#### BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT

This year we have been particularly fortunate in having an active, cooperative and willing group of trustees. These together with a number of active Church members and friends as well as our very hard working sexton and his wife, have accomplished a great deal in improving and maintaining our Church properties.

Throughout the year the work programs have in large part centered around Church and parsonage improvements. Listed as follows are the principal activities and accomplishments:

- The parsonage and barn at 8 Andover Street were partially painted and repaired and the grounds and flower gardens cared for. This entailed about 5-8 hour days for about ten men.
- 2. Plans were prepared by Alfred Tidd to remodel this parsonage so that there would be suitable accommodations for our new minister, Reverend Southwick. Estimates for the work were obtained from two contractors and this as well as other solutions presented to the Church members for action.
- 3. The Trustees in conjunction with an appointed Parsonage Committee inspected a number of properties in the town as potential parsonages. In October the property at 5 Hart Circle was accepted by the Church and accordingly purchased as a new parsonage. The property at 8 Andover Street was then prepared for sale and sold.
- 4. In the spring, the sanctuary walls, front ceiling in the sanctuary, and Narthex walls were repaired and redecorated. This was accomplished just before Easter with the result that the interior of the Church is in good condition.
- 5. After Reverend Fleming left for Millis, we experienced considerable problem with boys and girls playing in the Church during the week, causing a lot of extra work in cleaning up the property. Accordingly, the doors are being kept locked and all heads of committees given keys to avoid inconvenience. The Chief of Police has worked hard to apprehend the offenders without success. After the Church members became accustomed to having the Church locked, it has worked out satisfactorily.
- 6. Throughout the summer and early fall a number of pieces of slate fell from the tower and louvres. After obtaining estimates from a number of steeple jacks, the slate on the steeple and louvres was inspected and repaired by the Iron works. In addition, the steeple, front and street side of the Church were given two coats of paint by the same contractor. In painting the steeple the facing board on the front street side was found damaged probably from a leak through the slate roof. This was repaired but probably will need to be replaced in a few years.
- 7. After Reverend Southwick came in the fall the Board of Trustees undertook to redecorate the Minister's study. a rug donated by Reverend Southwick was used to provide wall to wall carpeting. The walls, ceiling and woodwork were painted and new book cases and drapes will be installed shortly to complete the redecorating.
- 8. Throughout the year we have been constantly plagued by inadequate wiring in the Church with the result that many fuses have been blown and this sometimes causes the stoker to stop. In the next year a major activity of the Trustees

will be to have a licensed electrician rewire the Church to make it safe and effective.

- 9. The Trustees requested from the Finance Committee that the Christmas offering be designated for repair of the organ. Accordingly about \$500 was obtained and with the \$1,000 in the organ improvement fund will provide \$1,500 for this work. Plans are currently underway to determine the immediate and long range requirements to maintain the organ in good repair as well as to provide the necessary repairs, cleaning and adjustments for continuing excellent tonal qualities. In an estimate obtained from Andover Organ in 1964, a minimum expense for both the mechanical and tonal repairs was about \$2,000 and the maximum figure was in the vicinity of \$6,000. Any assistance available from groups or from memorials for this purpose will be most appreciated.
- 10. The house at 3 Cottage Street owned by the Church has been rented for the year and accordingly the mortgage and repairs for this property has been paid for from the rent collected. Currently in this account we have a balance of about \$200.

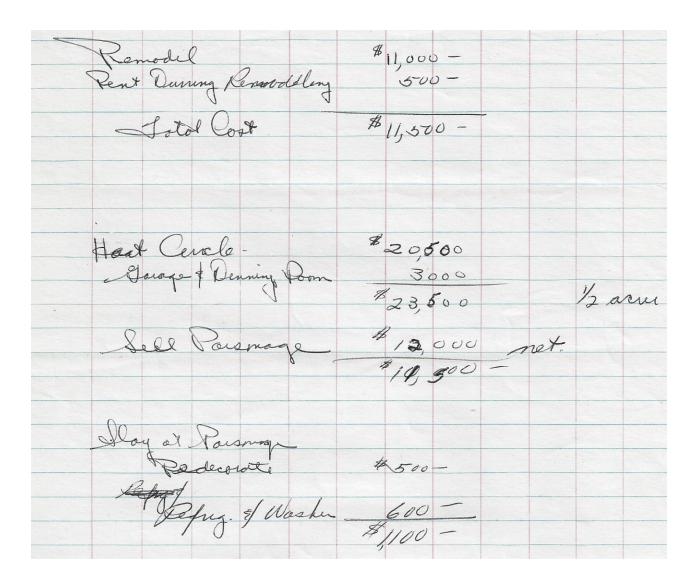
