The Annual Meeting of the First Congregational Church of Georgetown was called to order at 8 P. M. by the Moderator Leeland Lowell.

Prayer was offered by the Rev. Philip Southwick.

The Chairman of the Social Committee Carol Tidd and her Committee were thanked by the Moderator for the delicious dinner served before the meeting.

The report of the Clerk was read and accepted.

The Moderator read the Warrant for the Meeting.

ARTICLE I: To receive the reports of the several Boards, Committees and Officers of the Church, and to take any action desired thereon.

The printed reports were passed out before the meeting and those present were given the opportunity to read them and then the highlights of each report were brought out. Rev. Southwick spoke on the Union involving several major denominations. The Fire Alarm System is not yet in, quotes are still being awaited.

The following motion was made by Homer K. Tapin: I move that the reports of the several Boards, Committees and Officers be accepted as printed. Motion seconded by Alice Lowell and so voted.

Tapin would like to have an Organ Concert each year, the proceeds to be used for the Organ and the Music Committee. Mr. Tapin also told us that in the three years the Church edifice will be 100 years old.

Henry Grissino Chairman of the Finance Committee reported a Goal of \$37,670.00 for 1972, this is an increase of \$5237.00 over the 1971 Budget. He asked that more emphasis be placed on Christian Education and that all members get out and help and asked all to help keep all of our members interested and active. Mr. Grissino asked for increased pledges, all carry the load, not just a few. He emphasized that the figure submitted was a goal, not a Budget. Donald Johnson moved that the proposed goal of \$37,670. be accepted.

Robert Davidson seconded and it was so voted.

The Annual Meeting of the First Congregational Church of Georgetown, Inc., was called to order on January 27, 1972 at 8:05 P. M. by the Moderator Donn Chatterton. 20 present.

Prayer was offered by the Rev. Philip Southwick.

Moderator thanked Carol Tidd and family for a very delicious dinner served to 18 members before the Meeting.

The Clerk read the Warrant.

The Clerks report of the Autumn Meeting was read and approved.

The Moderator thanked the Secretary Sandy Annis for her efforts in preparing the Annual reports.

Article I; To receive the reports of the several Officers, Boards and Committees of the Church, and to take any action desired thereon. Passed to Article II.

Article II: To hear the report of the Finance Committee and to take action thereon.

Calvin Pingreeereported the Budget could not be balanced, \$4000.00 is needed to meet the basics. Asked all to tighten belts. Methods of the Canvas were discussed. It was suggested that if the rentals are not paying their way rents should be increased. Calvin Pingree made the following motion: I move that the Budget of \$32,800.00 be accepted, motion seconded by Lawrence Tripp and so voted.

Article III: To hear the report of the By-laws Revision Committee and to take action on their recommendations.

Leeland Lowell reported for the By-laws Committee. The Committee recommended that the existing by-laws and the recommended revisions be mailed by May to the Church families. Matthew Kelloway moved that the recommendations of the by-laws committee be accepted. Seconded by Audrey Magown and so voted. The Moderator thanked the Minister and Clerk for assistance given the Committee.

Returned to Article I. The various reports as printed were perused and discussed. Moved, seconded and voted that the various reports of Officers and Committees and Boards be accepted as printed.

Article IV: To take any other action relative to the Church and/or its property. Matthew Kelloway moved that letters of transfer be granted to Miss Miriam Vorbeau to unite with the United Church of Christ of Wareham, Massachusetts and to Paul, Thelma, Paul Jr. and Nancy Cameron to unite with the First Congregational Church of Exeter, New Hampshire. Motion seconded and voted.

REPORT OF THE MINISTER

During 1971 the Church became more community minded. We arranged for the Haverhill Area Mental Health and Mental Retardation Board to have their area office in Metcalf House. This has meant that our Church has been the scene for more activity in the area of mental health, which is certainly part of the wholeness God desires for everyone. Boy Scout Troop #51 was looking for a new home. They were given permission to use our facilities. In the fall we became the sponsoring organization.

I believe these are steps in the right direction. As a Church we have both a responsibility and an opportunity to serve the community by making the best and the most use of our facilities. We have moved from isolation to involvement; there is still room for improvement.

Financially, 1971 will be remembered as the year of the freeze. Committees spent as little as possible. Our bills are paid. But like local town and city governments we must find more sources of income, because we can not reduce expenses further and have much of any educational program left.

In June five of us attended a weekend Stewardship workshop in Framingham so we would be able to conduct a better canvass in the fall. I believe that the canvass was a success in the sense that people did more talking about the Church with one another than in previous years. Financially we did not increase our pledges as we had hoped to do. Since our Mission Advance pledges will be completed in the spring of 1972 we had hoped that those who had pledged to it would increase their pledges for local expenses in the amount of their Mission Advance pledges. In most cases, this did not happen. What distresses me more, however, is that some people cut their support of our Christian World Mission. In other words, our concern for and assistance of those beyond cur own community dropped significantly, so that the Finance Committee has been forced to reduce our pledged support of Our Christian World Mission.

Some people feel that the solution to a church's financial squeeze is to increase the base of support - get more members. While this helps to some extent, and we welcome all who wish to join our fellowship, I feel that the better solution lies in the spiritual realm. We would benefit personally and the Church would become stronger by greater personal commitment to Jesus Christ. Stewardship begins in the heart; we must learn to relate to each other better. As human relations improve, we will have a more meaningful followship; commitment will increase, and with it, I believe, also money.

Counselling has been time consuming and rewarding. I see people not only being helped and healed, but a reaching out by those who have been helped, a ministering to others by them who know the pain and anxiety. There is more ministry in the spirit of Christ going on in our midst in this respect than can show up in any report.

During the first half of 1971 the Self-Study floundered for lack of leadership. But the Long Range Study Committee felt that it was their responsibility to organize and carry it through. The committees are now organized and working; reports are due in the hands of the chairmen by March 15. I believe that even if the study does not reveal solutions to our problems, it will show us the problems which we must solve. It is better to light a candle and spot our problems than to sit and curse the darkness.

During 1971 I've made monthly reports to the Deacons on my activities. I believe that communication between us has improved and that together we're becoming better able to determine directions our ministry should take. One change being proposed by our By-Law Revision Committee is to combine the present Boards of Deacons and Deaconesses into a Diaconate responsible for and sensitive to the spiritual health and vitality of the Church.

In the summer of 1971 we combined for nine weeks with the Byfield Parish Church fr union services. We blan to repeat the practice this coming summer. Speaking of cooperation, relations with St. Mary's have been good. Our Church School attended mass there. The Mormon Church Cub Pack held its banquet in our church last year and is planning to do the same next month.

There is growing concern about the role of the church in our lives. More people became aware that their spiritual life left room for growth and improvement. Some realized that things in the Church won't get done without not only their participation but also their leadership. One of the biggest problems here as I see it is not a shortage of ' willing workers but a lack of leaders.

The three choirs and the variety of music they provide are a joy and asset to our worship week by week.

I am looking forward to more adult study programs in 1972 - the Parables of Jesus on Wednesday evenings at the parsonage, Bible study during committee meetings, a retreat for Church School teachers, a closer look at COCU, an increase of significant programs, a reduction of unnecessary, outdated ones.

The days ahead never seem easy. There's always the frightening and challenging need to grow in mind and heart. We must not become satisfied; rather we must remain restless, pushing out, reaching out toward the future with faith in God and confidence in the leading and strength of His spirit.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DEACONESSES

Each month the Deaconesses visited the shut-ins, sent many cards to hospitals, rest homes, and one or more attended each funeral.

A Memorial for Miss Ida Bancroft was held May 18, 1971.

At Easter we delivered 21 plants and 4 baskets of fruit to shutins and 12 Ideals were sent to shut-ins and past ministers.

The Easter Service was taped by Anna Tozier and taken to Bertha Poole and her friends at the rest home.

In April the Deaconesses met with the Deacons at Ross Kelloway's and plans were made to form a Diaconate. It was planned for the Deaconesses and Deacons to meet together in the future and work as a joint board.

At Christmas we delivered 12 plants and 2 boxes of food were prepared and jars of candy and gifts to the Carlton Home and others.

The Christmas program was taped and taken to the Carlton Home where it was happily received.

Our Chairman, Anna Tozier, held three meetings and Mary Outram held the November meeting. We had a representative at each Cabinet meeting.

We had two new members join in January--Mrs. Condon and Mrs. Outram. We welcomed these new members and enjoyed working with them.

All six members attended a meeting in February of all Deacons and Deaconesses for all the churches in the Association, and the Deaconesses served tea, coffee, and cookies.

Our Chairman, Anna Tozier, goes off the Board in January and we will miss her thoughtful leadership. We welcomed our new member, Mrs. Isabel Gammon.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The members of the Board: Larry Tripp, Audrey Magown, Helen Snow, Beth Bond, Bill Haid, Carol Dispenza, Evelyn Boose, and Phil Southwick.

Larry Tripp and Audrey Magown were co-chairmen of the board and Carol Dispenza was secretary for the year.

The main project for the year was the remodeling of the Youth Room (previously the Ladies' Parlor). Funds were raised to paint the walls, carpet the floor and get new curtains for the windows. Some new chairs were also donated for the room. At year's end, the project has been completed.

The use of the church as a drop-in center by a community youth group was discussed. The board got permission from the trustees for the use of the church. The group has not as yet made use of the offer.

After the Children's Day service this year, it was decided to have an informal picnic on the church lawn.

Teacher installation was held October 17; Sunday School started on September 26. The hour that Sunday School starts has been changed from 9:15 to 9:30 A.M.

The Sunday School Mission funds were given to "Compassion" for a Korean war orphan from January to September.

It was then decided to stop sending the money to "Compassion" because there had been so many changes of orphans in the last year. It was decided that instead we let the children in the Sunday School decide what charity they would like to support. The children decided to send the mission money to Project Hope.

In June, Evelyn Boose resigned as superintendent of Sunday School and Helen Snow became superintendent for the Sunday School year 1971-1972 beginning in September.

The yearly Christmas workshop was not held this year. Instead, each department of the Sunday School worked on their own projects or planned their own parties.

It was decided this year that UNICEF should be a community project rather than a project just for our Sunday School. The P.T.A. was contacted to see if they would like to sponsor UNICEF. The P.T.A. was interested but were not organized as yet so we sponsored the project again this year. The boxes were distributed at the school and were delivered to the church. Next year the P.T.A. is interested in sponsoring the UNICEF if contacted again.

During this year the purchase of a duplicator for the Sunday School teachers' use and the repairing of bulletin and black boards were discussed. Funds have not been available for either project.

Superintendent REPORT OF THE CHURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

The Church School closed its 1970-71 year with a Children's Day program on June 14 which followed an ecology theme. It stressed God's world is our world and we must do all we can to preserve it for ourselves and for future generations. Evelyn Boose retired as Church School Superintendent and was given a gift from the church. Three teachers who retired were given certificates of appreciation: Natalie Tidd, Florence Hamelin, and Warren Stone.

Church School recommenced September 26 with a complete staff of teachers and a few reserve volunteers. We have 13 full-time, 5 parttime teachers and 4 helpers. A few classes are so large that we have had to put two teachers in charge, and this system is working well. Starting time was changed from 9:15 to 9:30 A.M. and we have been starting <u>promptly</u>. Total enrollment to date is 190. Attendance is errotic as always. Perhaps one new reason contributes, viz., three-day holiday weekends make camping and longer trips out of town possible for more families.

In September a delegation of three attended a work shop at the Congregational Church, Haverhill: a representative from the Board of Christian Education, a teacher, and the Church School Superintendent.

Teacher Dedication Sunday was October 24. Star Island representatives from our church shared their memories of a most meaningful experience.

Because the curriculum this year is "The Church", the 9:30 session of Church School plans to visit churches of other denominations and started this program with a Mass at St. Mary's on November 7. Reactions to this change of service varied greatly. No one was indifferent!

During the Advent season the 9:30 session followed the Advent Candle ceremony and learned of its tradition and the meaning of each candle. Each week the candles were lit in order by different children as the Christmas story reached its completion.

Both our Thanksgiving and Christmas contributions were given to the Spanish-speaking Center of Haverhill. Our gifts made possible a Christmas party with presents for 150 children. The Center honored us with a beautiful poinsettia for the Vestry.

Concensus of opinion chose class or departmental Christmas parties in lieu of a workshop which for now appeared to be "old hat". Both teachers and children agreed the new plan was just as much fun and far more meaningful.

On November 5th the teachers held a bake sale at the IGA to raise money for the Youth Boom drapes. A profit of \$50.00 was realized. Another bake sale is planned.

Because of the frequent change in Korean Orphan (supported by church school contributions the first Sunday of each month), the children voted by ballot for a new cause to serve. HOPE won. Several teachers' meetings have been held in the Youth Room. Teachers have been very cooperative in attending. I feel we have a remarkably dedicated, enthusiastic, and capable group of volunteers in this area of church work, and I urge all parents to give them cooperation and support in every way possible. Come visit the classroom and show your children you're interested in their religious education. You are welcome any time.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Monthly meetings were held as scheduled except for July and August for the transaction of such business as should regularly come before us.

Items of interest during the year other than routine:

In the winter we entertained a request for the use of one room in Metcalf House for use as an office for unit four of Northern Essex Mental Health. After checking insurance and tax aspects and checking with the Superintendent of the Sunday School, we agreed to let them use it and signed a one year agreement from April 1971 to April 1972.

The installation of the fire detection system was completed under the direction of Allan Barlow. The cost of a sprinkler system was found to be prohibitive.

We agreed to the purchase of carpet for the former nursery room.

In the soring estimates were obtained for painting the Church and repairing the brickwork; however, it was found that there were insufficient funds to do this in 1971. Hopefully it can be done in 1972, as the work is badly needed.

Trustee Douglas Melzard moved to New Hampshire and was replaced by Larry Tripp, who is your chairman for 1972.

Troop 51 Boy Scouts was granted permission to meet regularly in the vestry. The Girl Scouts have not met here since June 1971.

We have attempted to stop through traffic from going across the parking lot from Cottage Street to Clark Street, so far unsuccessfully. We put up barrels and they were stolen; we installed a chain between two trees and first the cars bypassed the chain, and then the chain was stolen.

We moved the upright piano from the Sanctuary to the vestry; the Weber is available; make an offer if interested.

The initial set up for the Church Fair was attended only by the Trustees and the co-chairmen of the Fair; more help would be in order next year.

We continue to rent our Cottage Street properties as in the past with rents collected to date as of Jan. 3.

I would like to thank Ed Jones for faithfully maintaining the combination lawn mower-snow plow as he has for several years now. I would also like to thank all others who have helped to maintain our church property this year.

REPORT OF CHURCH WORLD SERVICE

What is "World Service"? Is it what our church as individuals and through various organizations gives to "Church World Service" each year? No. It is all that and much more. It is all that we as concerned people in a church that really cares about meeting human needs can do with our money, our materials and our time to help people in need wherever we find them, whether in our own neighborhood, in the United States, or anywhere in the world.

It is not something expensive which only the most prosperous churches and the most wealthy people can support; nor is it something dry and boring which only the most dedicated people would care to bother with. There is something for every one - old and young - to do to help. It is exciting and heartwarming to have even a small share in the really tremendous amount of good being done by church people the world over, contributing what they can to help others whose need is great.

The Church School at Thanksgiving time collected food which went to the Spanish American Center in Haverhill. They also received some of the used clothing which was left over from the church fair. The rest of the clothing from the fair was turned over to the Material Aid Committee. This and other clothing which has come in liberally all year has been widely distributed, some to the above Spanish American Center and another one in Lawrence, some to American Indians in South Dakota, some to a Thrift Shop in Tennessee, and some to Church World Service to be used as they see fit.

The Women's Missionary Society contributed to Mission Advance, Biafra, Southwest Indian Foundation, Least Coin Offering and Walker Missionary Home.

All of you help when you support the Material Aid Committee's Food Sale or any other efforts. There is always a need for good used clothing and household articles, such as bedding, curtains, small rugs, pillows, etc.; also worn sheets and white shirts, also worn garments that contain enough good cloth to be made into some smaller garment. Also yard goods and remnants and yarn remnants. If you have anything you don't want, it might be usable for something.

A group of women have been making quilts whenever they can get together. Some of these have been sent out to various places; others have been sold and the money used for Material Aid needs.

By far the greater part of the Material Aid money is spent for postage, express, and the 10¢ per pound requested by Church World Service to cover their shipping costs. During 1971 over 300 lbs. of used clothing went to Church World Service, much of it by the CWS pick up in April and October. More than 100 lbs. of clothing and household articles went to a Thrift Shop at Pleasant Hill, Tennessee. Quilts and knit goods were sent to Indians in South Dakota. A limited amount of selected used clothing and new and recovered pillows were sent to Walker Missionary Home, also a money contribution from the Guild. Contributions were made to the Riverside Memorial Church Building Fund. Money was contributed for Christmas gifts at Walpole State Prison, and handmade articles and other new or nearly new items were sent to Boston City Missionary Society for their Christmas gift program. We also sent bandages, hospital johnnies, and other articles

made by some of our women.

Our thanks go to Graf's Express. They deliver to the Boston City Missionary Society free. On shipments to CWS in Maryland, Tennessee and other places, they cancel their part of the bill, and we are only billed for the other carrier who receives the shipment from Graf.

There is no end to what needs to be done in this field --- no end to what we might do. If you would like to help, call me at 352-2941 and let me know what you would like to do. We can always find something.

Two committee members resigned last spring, the Misses Eleanor and Satira Stetson. It would be impossible to list all the ways they have contributed to this program. Enough to say that we all appreciate what they have done, and we are extremely happy that they are still working loyally as before, only we hope with a little less pressure and responsibility than before. The Material Aid Committee now is Clive Metcalf, chairman, Mrs. Henry Dea, Mrs. Clifford Emerson, Mrs. Merton Pitkin, Mrs. Harry Sweetland and Mrs. George Swanton.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

1971 has been a rough year financially with a last quarter pile-up of bills totalling almost \$3,000. Thanks to the eleventh hour windfall of money from the Church Fair, we were able to pay almost all our current expense bills.

At the October church meeting the Finance Committee submitted a budget of \$37,000.00, which would have provided adequate operating funds and revitalized our church programs. It was our hope that the membership would increase their pledges to meet this challenge.

The all-member canvass for 1972, during the month of November, yielded \$1,000 less than the 1971 pledges. The church's financial challenge was not met for 1972.

The monies pledged for 1972 are as follows:

In view of the decrease in the total pledges the budget was revised at the January meeting and cut back to the 1971 level. The fact remains that with rising costs we cannot operate on less than a \$33,000 budget.
