The Annual Meeting of the First Congregational Church of Georgetown, Inc. was called to order at 8:10 P. M. by the Moderator Donn Chatterton.

The Rev. Philip Southwick offered Prayer.

The Warrant was read by the Clerk.

Articles One and Two were passed.

ARTICLE 3. To hear the report of the Finance Committee regarding the Church ^Budget and to take action thereon.

Donald Johnson, Chairman of the Finance Committee, spoke regarding increases in the Budget. Pledges last year came through well and Mortgages are being taken care of. There were some questions which were answered by Mr. Johnson.

Moved that the Church proposed Budget as presented of \$35,995.00 be accepted as presented by the Finance Committee. Motion seconded and so voted.

ARTICLE 1. To receive the reports of the several Boards, Committees and Officers of the Church, and to take action thereon.

The several reports as printed were gone over and discussed. The report of the Auditing Committee was read by Leeland Lowell. Mr. Lowell congratulated our Treasurer on a job well done.

ARTICLE 2. To hear the report of the Nominating Committee and to take any action required thereon. The report of the Nominating Committee was read. Moved, seconded and voted that the report be accepted. The Moderator asked for further nominations and there were none.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Church will vote to pay the sum of \$4205.00 for the repair of the Steeple. Money to be taken from the Reserve Account.

Moved that the Church vote the Sum of \$4205.00 for the repair of the Steeple, the money to be taken from the Reserve Account. Motion seconded. Lawrence Tripp explained that the Steeple was in bad shape. Test borings made and found rot and carpenter ants. Mr. Tripp explained how the Steeple would be repaired. The figure of \$4205. is for work to be done soon, leter it will cost more. Motion amended that Contract as submitted by American Steeple and Chimney Company be signed by Chairman of the Board of Trustees. Motion seconded and so voted.

ARTICLE 5. To hear the recommendation of the Self Study Committee that a Committee be formed with the sole responsibility for internal communication and public relations and to take action thereon.

James Gammie moved that the Article be accepted as written. Motion seconded. This Article was a suggestion from the Neighborhood Meetings. Voted.

ARTICLE 6. To hear a status report from the Self Study Committee.

(Report as printed incorporated in the Records.) Copies will be mailed to all on the Mailing List. Mr. Gammie thanked Mr. and Mrs. Barlow and Mr. and Mrs. ^Blanchard. Mr. Barlow noted that the Neighborhood Meetings were both enjoyable and helpful. The report as submitted is on Neighborhood Meetings only. A Complete report of the Self Study Committee will be submitted later.

ARTICLE 7. To take and other action relative to the Church and/or its property.

Robert Davidson moved that the Church authorize the expenditure of a sum not to exceed \$5000000 for the painting of the Steeple after other work has been completed. Seconded and so voted.

James Gammie read the following motion: I move that the Cabinet of the First Congregational Church of Georgetown organize periodic discussion groups to promote understanding and fellowship in the Church family. (Moderator suggested that we listen and the Chair will rule if motions are out of order and must be tabled.) Seconded and voted.

Mr. Gammie moved that the Cabinet of the First Congregational Church of Georgetown give consideration to changing the Church By-Laws so as to reduce the maximum term of office on all elected committees from five to three years. Moderator declared the motion out of order. Mr. Gammie moved that the Diaconate of the First Congregational Church of Georgetown take whatever action they deem desirable to provide alternative worship experiences such as

- (a) An evening servie during the week
- (b) A service in the vestry once a month to accommodate older people
- (c) Earlier worship service on Sunday to accommodate a coffee hour and discussions. It is suggested that these and other alternatives might
 - be determined through experimentation.

Motion seconded and voted.

The Self Study Committee was complimented for their many hours of work. The Church Secretary and Committee were complimented for their efforts in preparing the report.

In answer to several questions regarding the fefurbishing of the Vestry this will come after the Steeple repairs.

Meeting adjourned.

Cookies and Coffee were served before the Meeting and during meeting by Mrs. Chatterton.

REPORT OF THE MINISTER

In our Church this year we've had our moments of strife and sorrow. The year seems to have passed quite quickly, indicating to me that for me, at least this has been a busy, happy, and hopefully productive one. The reports which follow will reveal the highlights and review most of the activities carried out by the committees and organizations within the church. A look at my calendar convinces me that we've had a busy year.

Variety has been a key word for 1973. We've tried to vary the worship experience from week to week, so that our varying tastes and needs could be at least in part satisfied. We've used films; we've had guest speakers; we've had different types of music to help God reach our spirits, touch our lives, and teach us whatever we needed to know.

Special events during the year included a one day all-churchretreat, with an all-church overnight retreat coming up, a Sunday evening hymn sing along with an Easter film, a church family night covered dish supper - which turned into a memorable birthday party. We've planned another supper as a fellowship occasion rather than the traditional money making events. For the first time in recent years we held a series of pre-membership meetings for adults, in addition to the annual confirmation classes for youth.

As a result of last year's retreat, we organized a Christian service group - made up of many who are ready to minister, willing to help, and able to assist all who call upon them. They have provided short notice transportation to doctors and hospitals, baby sitting and child care during emergency situations, assisting families facing crises. A member of the Diaconate is the contact person for each two week period. We've listed who these are in the Newsletters. This is a ready arm of your church.

With the help of the Diaconate, we are now using the flowers that are taken to our shut-ins at Christmas and Easter, as our altar decorations for those holidays, thus taking some part of the worship services to those unable to attend. This means that the floral memorials which many people used to give at Christmas and Easter can be used on other Sundays throughout the year, on dates which may have special personal significance. By scheduling these floral memorials, we're insuring ourselves of flowers to beautify our worship center.

We've also taken steps to improve our publicity and communication. Since the paper shortage makes it difficult to get much for notices into the local newspapers, we've resorted to smaller, more frequent church newsletters, with a monthly schedule of activities printed in them. By establishing regular office hours for the church secretary (Monday, Wednesday, Friday; 10-1) we've been able to coordinate programs, keep calendar conflicts to a minimum, and pick up lots of details that used to just slip by.

Now we come to the most important indicator of the health of a church -- its spirit. There's a new feeling in the church, new life, new energy. I believe that a number of us have stopped resisting God and started letting His holy spirit assist us in our private lives and in the life of the church. I believe that the Holy Spirit is expressing itself in enthusiasm, in willingness to experiment and experience -- without the success or disappointment of any one venture affecting our willingness to try something else. I believe that the Holy Spirit is expressing itself in our acceptance and enjoyment of variety, in the feeling that what each one thinks, feels, believes, and needs, does count.

I thank all of you for having made 1973 such a good one in our church. I join with you in praising God for his abundant energy and steadfast love. I trust that in the coming year, together with him, we will face life's crises, turning points, joys, and sorrows in ways acceptable to Him.

Diaconate

REPORT OF THE DIACONATE

The formation of our Diaconate (the combination of the two separate boards of Deacons and Deaconesses) has brought about closer contact with our various duties and services and has proved to be a successful union.

During this past year the Diaconate has been willing and ready to give assistance to needy persons with whom we have come in contact. Sometimes this has been in the form of financial aid and in a couple of cases transportation was furnished to people stranded in town for one reason or another.

As a result of an inspirational retreat held last spring, our Diaconate has sponsored a Christian Service Group. Those of us on the Board take turns serving as Coordinator of the Christian Service Group, designed to help those in our Church Family as well as in the community at large, who are temporarily in need of assistance, such as with babysitting, visiting, transportation to doctors and hospitals, meals, etc. This group has progressed favorably and has come to the aid of several porsons and families. More helpers are always needed in a program of this type and hopefully the coming year will provide the extra help we need to keep it in operation.

Our Church Family responded generously to our plea for emergency food for the victims of the Chelsea fire and we wish to thank all who brought in non-perishable food items for distribution in Chelsea.

Worship services during the year have been varied and have included films and speakers. The service with the Reverend Roger Palmquist renewed some old acquaintances and was received warmly by those who heard him for the first time. The picture that he drew last year has been framed and now hangs in the youth room for all to enjoy.

Our joint services with West Boxford Congregational Church during the summer months were well received and hopefully will be continued again. The Community Thanksgiving Eve Service is growing each year in numbers and in ecumenical spirit, as we continue to find a more common ground with the other churches in our area.

I would like to take this opportunity to give my heartfelt thanks to all those who have helped make this a successful year for our Board.

Christian Education

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Board of Christian Education, concerned with all the bodies of the Church has had a busy and challenging year. We've offered a variety of programs for enlightening families and Church School leaders.

For the enrichment of our families, a special bus and four private cars took 68 adults and children to Boston on March 31st to see "Godspell". Many had first attended the Guild's ham and bean supper, and some came back to the Church after the show to share refreshments and discussion of the evening.

Two primary concerns of the Board this year were the Teacher-ina-Box program and parent-child-teacher co-commitment. The Teacherin-a-Box was offered to all teachers in three fall sessions. Those who attended agreed it was helpful in understanding others better, especially the children in our Church School classes. A second series on how to teach the Bible has been ordered for future teacher meetings.

The Board carefully drew up a letter inviting parents to get involved with their children in a special area of the Church School program, the area being optional. This letter went home with the students in the fall. Response to date has been NIL. We'll keep trying.

In April three Project Sundays changed the Church School program temporarily, with coordinated service to the community. Mixedage groups made bird houses for Conservation, cookies, puppets for the Hale Hospital's pediatrics ward, and a wide variety of kindergarten teaching aids. The cookies were distributed by the Diaconate to shut-ins and families temporarily in distress.

The afternoon of Children's Day in June the Board sponsored a Family Picnic at Bradley Palmer State Park. Games were played contests held, ribbons awarded. A song-fest led by the Gunderson family climaxed the day. Ninety-two parents and children enjoyed the outing.

Thanks to scholarships provided by Jack Rohner, four of our Church School girls enjoyed a wonderful week in July at Camp Cathedral Pines. The Board provided 2/3 scholarships to two girls interested in attending the Star Island conference in August. Lori Dispenza and Terri Grissino found the experience delightful and soulsatisfying.

The fall program opened in September with Teacher Dedication Sunday. A breakfast, prepared by the men of the Board, was served to the teachers, their aids, and the Board. The following Sunday was Registration Day with Rev. Roger Palmquist as the special speaker for the church service, followed by a coffee hour.

Bob and Vicki Graffum resigned as Pilgrim Fellowship leaders in June after finishing a very successful year. The Board was fortunate in hiring Chuck and Joanne Margeson to take over this leadership. They have offered a varied program this fall and have had excellent attendance in both groups.

Board of Christian Education Continued

Traditionally the first Sunday of the month the Church School offering goes to the charity that the Church School chooses, the current regular recipient being H.O.P.E. However, the Board voted to have the November first Sunday offering given to U.N.I.C.E.F. in lieu of the usual door to-door collections. A check for \$42.45 was sent to U.N.I.C.E.F. The Thanksgiving offering of canned goods went to our local Welfare Office.

In December a Christmas Fun Shop was held for the children in grades K through sixth. The Junior and Senior Highs and P.F. groups served refreshments, presented a pageant in the Sanctuary and played in the band. The carol sing was led by Dom DeFilippo, and the children brought gifts for the Haverhill Salvation Army.

The Board accepted a gift of hard candy from the Georgetown Pharmary. It will be used in classes were children are rewarded for early arrival and memorizing of Bible verses.

A Bible Study group started meeting at the Parsonage each Wednesday night early in the year to study in depth the book of Matthew. The group resumed classes in October and continues with attendance of eight to thirteen regulars. Dot Blanchard offered a six-week course on the study of John Sunday mornings and has tentative plans for another sixweek course during Lent. Both of these study groups are open to anyone interested, and the Board highly recommends them.

Sometimes we Board members feel frustrated and discouraged because our offered programs are not 100 percent successful, i. c. not everyone takes advantage of what is offered. The reality is that we have a healthy Church School, an excellent group of teachers and helpers, and a nover-tiring Superintendent in Evelyn Boose, and a Board dedicated to offering the best possible program to all age groups in the Church. We welcome all suggestions.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

We have had a good year in our Church School. Most important of all is the work of the teachers and their rapport with each child. We are very fortunate to have a group of adults who are willing to give of their time and love to an important part of our Church.

Much of our group effort as a Church School goes to various missions. Our collection of the first Sunday of the month goes for mission giving, most of it to H.O.P.E. We sent our Oct. collection, along with some money collected by individual children, to UNICEF. Our Thanksgiving food collection went to the local welfare office for distribution and our Christmas gifts were given to the Salvation Army. A new mission project was also tried in the spring. The three Sundays after Easter were designated as Project Sundays. The children chose from different projects and under the loadership of many adults from the church, they made a number of useful items for the Church and community -- birdhouses for the Lufkin Brook area, kindergarten aids for the public school, hand puppets for Hale hospital, cookies which were given to many of our church members, planting around Metcalf house, and the younger children went around parts of the town picking up litter, and made decorations to brighten the Church Vestry.

In April our Junior Choir sang in a Junior Choir Festival in Marblehead. The Festival included about 300 children from about twenty churches. Our Childrens' Day in June had the theme "Sing for Joy" --- a worship service of music, complete with band and balloons.

We held a Christmas Funshop in December as a party for all ages. The children made Christmas decorations and were entertained by a carol sing, pageant and band music. We were helped a great deal by both P.F. groups with decorations, refreshments, etc. The Junior Choir was joined by the Jr. High P.F. for a Christmas pizza party and went caroling - a large and melodic group!

Our 9:30 classes meet together for about 15 minutes each Sunday to learn new music, see movies, hear from various speakers, and to hold special worship services. One new program this Fall has been very successful in some of the 9:30 classes. Children who come ten minutes early are being drilled in Bible memory work and given awards (candy) for their efforts. I've actually seen some third graders running to their class! We hope that more parents will be interested in bringing their children early for this training (which also helps the teacher begin class on time).

Again - a special thanks to our teachers: Marcia Manning, Joyce Howe, Lois Hazen, Susan Kelley, Audrey Magown, Joyce Telman, Dan and Beverly Clausen, Serge and Shirley Sauvageau, Joseph and Carol Knapp, Marian Harding, Malcolm and Alice Stroad, Carol Dispenza, Phil and Shirley Southwick and helpers, Karen Mutch, Diane Castle, Christine Richardson, Erica Pierce, Kathy Magown and Donna Davidson.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

During the year 1973 many projects were undertaken, the biggest of them being the repair of the Church steeple. This work was contracted to the American Steeple Company, Salem, Mass. at a cost of \$6,255. The work consisted of replacing large carrying timbers below the bell deck, spraying thermicide to exterminate carpenter ants, replacing external finish boards, and repainting.

Another contract was signed with the Pentucket Workshop, a nursery school using the rooms on the first floor of the Metcalf House. Likewise the Essex Mental Health is using two rooms on the second floor of the Metcalf House.

The Trustees would like to thank the Ross Kelloways for donating a painting by the Rev. Roger Palmquist which has been hung in the Youth Room. We also have received a piano which has been rebuilt, using money from the Memorial Fund. We are still looking for one more piano in fairly good condition.

The walls of the Minister's Study were repainted Seacrest Green. Our property at 3 Cottage Street has new tenents and with the change, many improvements were necessary. Numerous windows, which were broken over the past year, have been replaced. We believe most of this damage was done accidentally.

New drain pipes were installed from the kitchen sinks. Work has also been started at the Parsonage to repair plumbing.

Ten new tables were purchased at a cost of \$420. These tables will be used throughout the year but were primarily purchased to replace the old wooden tables used during the Church Fair and special suppers. A new sign board should be completed this spring which will replace the present sign on the front lawn.

The Trustees will continue to meet the last Sunday of each month at 7:00 P.M. Anyone wishing to use the Church property is invited to come to the meeting with their proposals.

You may think of something vou have that you no longer need -- clothing, remnants, curtains, bedding, torn sheets, worn white shirts, pillows all sizes, almost anything that we could use for something to send somewhere:

This work offers an opportunity to every one who reads this. Our very active Material Aid Committee -- Mrs. Henry Dea, Mrs. Clifford Emerson, Mrs. Guy A. Minchin, Mrs. George Swanton and Miss Olive Metcalf, only gather together the many things that come our way, including the handwork of some of you, and we send them out as best we can. If anybody would like to knit, sew, recover an old pillow, make infants' or children's garments, dress dolls -- (What's your "thing?") -- give me a call (352-2941). We haven't been able to plan sewing meetings lately, but our warmest thanks go to those who have made things in their own time and given them to us to send away -- to those who make quilts to send and to sell for this program; to those who occasionally give money and, to all you good friends who support our annual food sale; also to those of you who keep us supplied with clothing fabrics, thread, zippers, buttons and so on. We can also use many more blankets and if you have any to spare, keep us in mind.

We send a few small monoy gifts "in lieu of Material Aid", and we buy some supplies, but by far our greatest exponse is for shipping costs and to Church World Service, which is ten cents per pound for their handling costs. This money comes from our food sale, the sale of quilts, and money donations from time to time.

A partial list of our work the past year follows: to Church World Service, we sent about 200 lbs. of clothing in the spring and another 200 lbs. in the fall. Also included were three fabric kits, 1 box of bandages and some hospital johnies; to the Boston City Missionary Society -- unwrapped Christmas gifts totaling \$150.00; to the Walker Missionary Home -- at least ten or twelves cartons of excellent clothing; to the Indians at the Rosebud Reservation in South Dakota -- quilts, knitted articles and clothing; to the Danvers State Hospital -- seven or eight large cartons of used clothing; to GLEAM, Larence -- several large cartons of used clothing; to the Thrift Shop at Pleasant Hill Community Church, Pleasant Hill, Tenn. -- 65 lbs. of clothing and household articles; to the Women's Seaman's Friend Society -- we have a collection of items to be given out by hospital visitors, which will be delivered shortly.

Small money gifts "in lieu of Material Aid" (usually \$5.00) have been sent to the Ecumenical Center, Roxbury; Elon College, Children's Home in North Carolina; Back Bay Mission, Mississippi; Migrant Ministry; CLEAM in Lawrence, Mass; and Ryder Memorial Hospital, Puerto Rico; the Rosebud Reservation in South Dakota.

We should all be especially grateful to Graf's Express for free delivery of anything within the area they serve, and free transportation to a connecting carrier on articles cutside their area, such as Tennessee, Maryland, etc. We are able to get articles for GLEAM, Danvers, Walker Home and the Women's Seaman's Friend delivered free by the committee members or friends.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

We ended the year 1973 with all bills paid. Although the number of pledges were down from 146 in 1972 to 137 in 1973, the important point is that the ratio of dollar per pledge increased by 11 percent. To all who pledged and maintained their commitment, "thank you". We hope no one has been offended with our publishing the list of paidup pledges. We feel that recognition should be given for a "job well done".

In previous years it has been the practice to borrow from the Improvement Fund to pay any outstanding bills. This year we were fortunate to receive an inheritance of \$13,178. Of this money, \$2,529 was set aside to pay bills, the balance was placed in a special notice account and in term deposit certificates. By subtracting balance on hand, \$1,056 from the inheritance money of \$2,529, a net operating loss of \$1,437 was experienced for the year 1973.

During the coming year we are hopeful that we will be able to balance the budget although it has been increased to cover the anticipated rise in operating expenses.

The proposed budget is, however, dependent on the money raising project account (#208) -- this will be used to balance the budget and everyone will have to help when a fund raising affair is held.
