REPORT OF THE MINISTER

We began 1975 by moving to the Vestry for Sunday worship - our compromise with heading for Florida or points south. I find myself looking forward to the informality, flexibility and friendliness that results. The choirs can group together more easily than in the choir loft. Some folks do find it easier to brave the winter elements than to tackle the stairs to the Sanctuary. We also look ahead to moving back to the Sanctuary and hearing the big organ once again.

This year we held a one day retreat at Gonzaga Hall in East Gloucester, overlooking the ocean. This proved to be a thought provoking, meditative experience, leaving those who participated with the wish that there had been more time.

One of the highlights of '75 for me was the spectacular music of "Joseph and His Technicolor Dreamcoat" the Sunday after Easter, to a packed house, on what has traditionally been a low Sunday. Under the direction of Linda and Jan, the production was presented at the Essex North Association's Annual Meeting in Newbury - impressing those from other churches with the talents of our young people. We used selections from the music for one of our worship experiences at the Pinecrest Nursing Home in North Andover.

Several adults from our church had the privilege of chaperoning the high school marching band, which includes many of our church youth, to Washington and the Appleblossom Festival in Winchester, Virginia. While we were away, our laymen held an impressive worship service featuring artistic and musical talents. We learn together that our faith in God helps us do what we used to think we couldn't do. The Holy Spirit does work upon us and among us slowly but surely, bringing good out of all life's experiences.

We continued the practice of receiving the Confirmation Class and other new members on Palm Sunday. This year we had one of the larger Confirmation classes; they are actively involved in this church along with their many other activities — witness the number of youth regularly present at Sunday worship and willing to do whatever is asked of them. We are fortunate they find faith and fellowship with us. We followed the Palm Sunday service with a coffee hour so that we could personally welcome our newer members and so that they could become better acquainted with more of us.

On Easter we held a sunrise service, without the sun, in the Sanctuary and then provided breakfast for 75 in the Vestry.

Report of the Minister Continued -

I'm strongly in favor of having the regular church committees meet on the same evening. This can be hectic - but basically harmonious, making for greater interaction, shared concerns without the delays involved when each committee had its own night and relied on me to relay the word from one to another. Non-committee members have taken advantage to attend and voice concerns in congregational fashion.

Once again our church fair brings people together in teamwork unsurpassed, while a fun fair and three flea markets, plus a musical night of nostalgia aided both our finances and fellowship.

We're encouraged by the results of our church canvass. We have more people pledging and fulfilling financial commitments to the church - expressing their stewardship of life.

Our nominating committee is urging changes in the By-Laws which would reduce the length of terms on committees, feeling that the people are willing to serve the church but find it hard to commit themselves for more than two years at a time.

Our summer services with West Boxford have worked out well, climaxing with a combined Communion service the 7th of September. We were pleased to have the West Boxford church host the Ecumenical Thanksgiving Eve Service and fellowship hour in our building, and our combined Senior Choirs provided stirring music. We had planned to have Junior and Senior Choirs from both churches combine for Christmas Sunday services in both churches, but the weather caused a cancellation. We were pleased that the West Boxford Senior Choir wanted to join us the Sunday after Christmas instead.

Our church is active and healthy with good tradition from the past and excellent potential for the future. Thank you and thank God for making it so.

REPORT OF THE DIACONATE

This past year has been an informative and busy one for the Diaconate. Working with our minister, we have encouraged innovations in our worship service. For example, Deaconesses helped with the preparation and serving of communion. Lay Sunday featured an audio-pictoral sermon using combined talents of several of our church family. Weekly Sunday bulletins are being sent to our shut-ins.

In February an all-church retreat was sponsored by the Diaconate to discuss religious doubts and fears. It was held at the Gonzaga retreat house in Gloucester, and led by Mr. James Small. It was felt by those attending that there was a definite closeness of friends sharing their thoughts about God. The beautiful view from the retreat house alone was inspiring to the mood of the retreat.

Christian Service, organized and coordinated by the Diaconate, to help members of the church help others in our church and community, was updated. Many new names were added as helping hands and the service had its busy times providing meals, transportation, baby sitting, etc. We were also able to help a few of our church families financially to carry them through some "rough spots". Praise the Lord!

From the Memorial Fund, eight trays for communion bread were purchased. "Communion invitation" cards were also purchased and are available to anyone in the church family for inviting friends and neighbors to share the Sacrament of Communion. The Sunday School was given money to purchase items such as tape recorders, record players and Christian books for students and adults. Money was also provided for our new Supplementary Hymn Book.

The Self-Study report, three years in the making, was reviewed by all Diaconate members. They felt that the report represented a great deal of hard work. All those who worked on the report especially the Barlows, Gammies and Blanchards, deserve much credit for their work. The report has many good recommendations; some of which have already been implemented. A copy of the report was given to Area Minister, Karl Phillippi who expressed the feeling that the report should be considered an exciting adventure.

Gert Pingree and Beth Bond attended a six-week course on "Death and Dying" at Northern Essex Community College. Since we are all faced with these situations at some time, they made the recommendation that our church consider a similar program in the near future.

Diaconate Report Continued -

We again combined with the West Boxford Congregational Church for summer services, ending with a very meaningful joint communion service in West Boxford with both The Reverend Southwick and The Reverend Crook participating.

With regret we accepted the resignation of Lee Lowell in June.

Regarding other church activities, our thanks go to former junior high youth leaders, Pat and Allan Barlow, choir director Linda Games, organist Jan Flyzik, and members of our junior and senior high youth groups who presented the cantata, "Joseph and His Technicolored Dream Coat". Well done!

The year closed with a vote of confidence and note of thanks to the Reverend Southwick for all his efforts on our behalf. We appreciate all he has done and is doing for us and our community.

My sincere thanks to all who have helped us this past year. It has been a most rewarding year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Board has had a very interesting year with some dramatic changes taking place.

Spring efforts were devoted to the Heifer Fund which the Church School children wished to support. A bake sale and a Flea Market by the teachers and pupils, a family-night buffet supper by the Board, and various outside donations including some of the Church School missionary monies, netted the \$500 required to provide a heifer to a needy group in Honduras. In connection with this project, the Church School classes visited the Muscavitz farm, touring the barns and seeing close-up a new-born calf. We were also visited by Mr. Royce Crimmins of Bradford, an active lay person in the Heifer Project. Mr. Crimmins addressed the Church School classes and also spoke to the parents at Sunday Worship.

Recipients of Star Island Conferenceships this year were Judy Bell, Carol Flyzik, Kim Knapp, Kathy Ledger and Holly Margeson. Pam Sheehan, Mary Ellen Nunan, Craig Southwick and Dwight Southwick returned to the Conference also.

There were few vacancies in our teaching staff, and these were filled competently by the opening of Church School in October. The Margesons are continuing with the Senior P.F. and the Dispenzas have taken over the leadership of the Junior P.F. "The Living Presence" offered a special service for the opening of Church School on "Rally Day".

We are an extremely fortunate church in having a most dedicated staff of teachers, leaders, and an indefatigable Church School Superintendent, Evelyn Boose. Not too many churches in the area can boast of this. New curriculum was ordered for all grades this year. Reaction has been almost unanimously favorable from both teachers and pupils.

With the Pentucket Workshop moving from Metcalf and the Thrift Shop occupying the back room therein, renovations were started to the building. Keith Tibbetts has volunteered hours of labor and skill in making the facilities more versatile and attractive. With the help of some parents and students, progress has been made.

Another innovation this Fall has been to provide a program for children in grades 3 - 6 from 11:30 - 12:00 noon. The purpose of this program is to allow parents, who have been reluctant to ask their children to sit through a church hour after an hour in Church School, to come to church. This program will continue as long as the need is evident.

Please feel free, Everyone, to attend our Board meetings and to bring any criticisms or suggestions to the members of the Board at any time.

Our children are our future church. Please support them in every way you can.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

Our Church School is lucky to have a group of good caring teachers and children whom we love and enjoy. Our classes are usually small but faithful and its great to see so many in church each Sunday or involved in various projects of the church. The children seem to be enthusiastic about becoming a part of the whole church community. Surely this is an important way to keep our church thriving!

We are trying a new curriculum this year and the teachers are happy with it. Most of the material is in the pupils' books and this seems to promote more participation by the child and more give and take with teachers. We hope to build up supplementary material (such as the Purple Puzzle Tree records which tell the important stories of the Bible from creation through the Easter story.) The Deacons gave us money from the Memorial Fund for records, a tape recorder and new books for the library. We are trying to buy books that will be of interest and help to people of all ages. You are invited to make use of the library.

Classes from the 3rd. grade through the 6th grade meet for an early worship service. This fall the Junior High girls made puppets and put on a puppet show about UNICEF. The third grade wrote and put on a play about Christmas.

Our missions include UNICEF - this year the kids worked for parents and friends to earn money and our November mission Sunday collection went to UNICEF. We had a Thanksgiving Food Collection which we gave to people in Georgetown. Children brought wrapped toys to the Christmas party and these were given to the Salvation Army in Our special effort this year was for the Heifer Haverhill. Project International. This is a self-help program of aid to the hungry. Our money went toward sending a heifer to the Honduras (to replace livestock lost in a hurricane in 1974). We sent \$500. much of which was raised by three special projects -- a Bake Sale, a Childrens' Flea Market, and a Family Supper where the entertainment was put on by all the kids of the church school. We are grateful for all the donations from parents for this very successful project. We give in very material ways to these mission projects. But also important to us all -- we are teaching the children to be aware of the needs of people all over the world and to care enough to help in some small way.

Our Junior Choir is a busy group of 26 members who enjoy singing. They are a young group this year, mostly 4th grade and younger, but they have good potential. We sang in a Junior Choir Festival (our 4th year) - in Hamilton last year and will sing May 4 in Gloucester. This Festival is composed of over 300 children from about 20 churches. Most of the choirs are from large towns (Danvers Peabody, Newburyport, etc.) so we are proud to take part. We missed our annual outing in June, but hope to have one this year. In December we had a party and went caroling to sing for members of our church.

A special thanks to Keith Tibbetts for his work in remodeling Metcalf House. We are very grateful and look forward to fresh, colorful and innovative class rooms.

Our Church School teachers are: Marcia Manning, Bonnie Skinner, Beth Bond, Sue Kelly, Joyce Tolman, Sue Clohecy, Elaine Kimball, Carol and Joe Knapp, Marion Harding, Audrey Magown, Keith Tibbetts, Phil Southwick. Helpers are: Shirley Locke, Christine Richardson, Pam Sheehan, Francis Brennan and Heather Face.

Thanks to the Board of Christian Education, to the teachers and the children for a pleasant year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

1975 was a busy year for the Trustees. Regular meetings were held each month and problems that arose were settled, we hope, to the satisfaction of all. The usual repairs were performed by each member of the Board.

Use of the Church was approved for most groups that applied and our Church is truly a center for community affairs, reaching out to the town.

We found that it was difficult for our Church School people to meet in the rooms used by the Pentucket Workshop Nursery School at Metcalf House. It was decided that we would not renew our contract with the School. Our relations with the directors of Pentucket Workshop were amicably settled and they moved from Metcalf House at the end of the summer.

The Joyce Dance Studio asked if they could use our Vestry rooms on Thursdays to give dancing lessons to the children of Georgetown. We now have an arrangement with them which will bring in as much revenue as we received from the nursery school, and which will be less wear and tear on our church facilities. We hope that all groups using the church will contribute toward the utilities.

The Couples Club donated aluminum windows for the rear of the church. Those who use the Church Office, the Kitchen and the Conference Room can attest to the comfort and warmth there.

A rubbish problem was settled by talking with our Rubbish Removal Contractor and the purchase of many new barrels. Now if Linda Games devises a musical with spear carrying supernumeraries, we could use the surplus covers!

The Trustees did their usual spring cleanup job in the Sanctuary, with the help of other volunteers, before the Palm Sunday and Easter services.

Gutters were replaced at the Parsonage; thanks to Glen Clohecy for the installation. Special mention to Craig Southwick for his many helpful acts at the church (electrical, painting, glazing, cleanup). Also thanks to Dave Sheehan for landscaping work and to the many young people who helped at Fair time.

In September we received an offer of a stove from the Georgetown Grange. After much effort, we finally got it installed in time for the Church Fair. Special mention should be made for Mary Outram's work in getting the stove measured, negotiating its transfer and cleaning up with us. Thanks to Sheila Kelly and to Carol Sheehan of the Kitchen Committee for cleaning up the new stove and seeing to it that we got it connected in time for the Fair.

Trustees Report Continued -

The Trustees approved repairs and remodelling of Metcalf House, including the Thrift Shop. Keith Tibbetts is working on these plans at the present time.

Now I come to the bittersweet part. We have worked for years with Ed Jones and he truly was "Mr. Trustee". It was with regret that we accepted his resignation, and we pay tribute to one who has set a fine example for us. However, he is and will be, still active as will the writer. We won't even fade away as with old soldiers, but will be ready to help when called.

Missions

CHURCH WORLD SERVICE REPORT

With the coming of another Annual Meeting it is time to take note of what our year's activities have been in the field of Church World Service.

The Women's Missionary Society, besides contributing to the Church's Missionary giving, has contributed to CARE, to the Walker Missionary Home in Auburndale, sent a box of miscellaneous articles to the Marrow Bone Folk School in Pikeville, Kentucky, and contributed to Vietnam Relief and the Least Coin Offering.

Most of us know that the Church School supported the Heifer Fund and have been privileged to help in one way or another, by supporting their Children's Flea Market, their Bake Sale or the supper put on by the Christian Education Committee for this cause. Do you know that \$500 was raised, and we understand that a heifer was sent to Honduras from our efforts.

The gifts collected at Thanksgiving and Christmas were turned over to the local Welfare Office to be used for needy families in this community.

Some of the children raised money with a variety of small projects to make a contribution to UNICEF.

The whole church had an opportunity to participate in offerings for One Great Hour of Sharing and for Vietnam Relief.

I know several of us who really intend to do something about contributing to the 1776 Fund. It is not too late! This 1776 drive is to provide much needed assistance to five important southern colleges. These schools were founded by our churches to enable black young people to obtain an education. They are doing a great deal to help themselves, but they must also have outside help if they are to continue sending young people from underprivileged backgrounds out to meet life, equipped with a college education. They have a truly wonderful record for taking young people whose prepartion has been seriously inadequate because of little educational opportunity, and helping them to make up for whatever they lack and master a 4-year college course. They go out and assume positions of responsibility both among their own people and in all parts of the country. Some of this fund also helps other minority groups with educational problems. If any of us put a gift in the collection plate, marked "1776" or send it to the Church Collector, it will be sent to the proper place and credited to our church.

The Material Aid Committee of the Guild has been as usual working for a wide variety of causes, so when you read anywhere about any of them, you can think, in a small way at least, "Our Church is helping there" and you can help too.

Church World Service Cont.

About 60 lbs. of good used clothing and household articles have been sent to GLEAM in Lawrence. A number of lots of especially good used garments, and also newly covered pillows for their living rooms have gone to Walker Missionary Home in Auburndale. At least two lots of men's clothing and books and magazines have been sent to the Boston Seaman's Friend Society and another is waiting to be picked up. (Do you know that they serve seamen coming into Portsmouth, N.H. and Portland, Maine, as well as in Boston?)

We sent several boxes of used clothing to Danvers State Hospital, and a number of large cartons to the thrift shop in Pleasant Hill, Tenn. As usual, we sent \$10 to the Protestant Chaplain at Walpole to be spent for the Prisoners' Christmas Observance, a small carton of new garments and new mittens to the Rosebud Indian Reservation in North Dakota, and unwrapped Christmas gifts worth at least \$75.00 to the Boston City Missionary Society.

The Guild held a work party last winter and we look forward to another this year as these are happy occasions for all. We would like to have an occasional meeting, if we could arrange to set them up.

In closing, I would like to express the very special appreciation of the Material Aid Committee for the wonderful work of Agnes Emerson for this group. She was long a member of the committee and even after her resignation from it, she helped in all of our endeavors and was a tremendous help and inspiration to all who worked with her.

The additional \$2,200 helped to balance the budget. To all who pledged and maintained their pledges — to everyone who contributed, a hearty thank you.
