

The Rev. Philip Southwick called the Annual Meeting of the First Congregational Church of Georgetown, Massachusetts, Inc. to order at 8 P. M. Rev. Southwick opened the Meeting with Prayer.

In the absence of the Moderator Donn Chatterton, Allen Barlow was elected Moderator Protem.

Moderator Protem read the Articles to be acted upon.

ARTICLE 1: To receive the reports of the Several Boards, Committees and Officers of the Church, and to take action thereon.

Moved that the reports be accepted as submitted, motion seconded and so voted.

ARTICLE 2: To hear the report of the Committee appointed to revise the by-laws, especially pertaining to the length of service of Committees, and to take action thereon.

Betty Davidson reported that the Committee recommends changing to two years the term of Office of the Diaconate, Finance Committee, Board of Christian Education, Music Committee, Board of Trustees and the Nominating Committee, each of these may succeed themselves once. Change the number of Trustees from 5 to 6, the Nominating Committee from 5 to 4 and the Music Committee from 3 to 4. Also grammatical changes here and there. Betty Davidson moved that we accept the written recommendations effective January 1976. Seconded. Joan Chatterton thanked Louis Hamelin for making minor changes in the by laws. Mr. <sup>D</sup>arlow questioned the wisdom of reducing all terms of Ofice to two years. Voted unanimously that the recommendations be accepted.

ARTICLE 3: To hear the report of the Nominating Committee and to take any action required thereon. Joan Chatterton read the report of the Nominating, commenting that three young people have accepted nominations. As there were no further nominations it was moved, seconded and voted that the report of the Nominating Committee be accepted. Allen and Patricia Barlow were nominating as Church Delegates. #### MINISTER'S REPORT

The reports on the following pages tell some of the story of 1976 in our church. They tell about meetings, activities, and expenses. As these reports promote in us memories of the past year, as they instill in us incentive for the coming years, this incentive tells of the ongoing work of God's spirit among us for the building of His kingdom through us.

To report on the ministry of the church is to tell of expressions of gratitude from people who appreciated Christian service, to tell of awareness of God that has been awakened, guilt relieved, and strength given for another day.

We continue to gather in the Vestry to worship during the winter and whenever it is more convenient for the content of the particular service. After a lapse of several years we once again held a Youth Sunday on February 29, and we have tentative plans for another one in February this year. This fall we had a member of our United Church Board for Homeland Ministries, Mrs. Phyllis Baldwin of Winchester, show us slides of the Ryder Memorial Hospital in Puerto Rico and talk about our Congregational heritage there. I am convinced that it is easier for us to have such programs in the Vestry where it is easier for speakers to feel closer to their hearers, and a more intimate atmosphere prevails. We have turned to having coffee and fellowship every Sunday, instead of just on special occasions, which has made each week, in a way, a special occasion.

Throughout the year the Bicentennial theme kept occuring, especially on Laymen's Sunday, Bicentennial Sunday, and the Fourth of July. We had a number of special Sundays - Masonic Sunday, Rainbow Sunday, Firemen's Sunday, Scout Sundays, plus the bicentennial weekend in the spring. I had the privilege of organizing the opening ceremony for the town's Bicentennial celebration held on the Church's green.

During the year, music has played an important part in the life of our church. Our youth and senior choirs, accompanied by some of our instrumentalists, presented the same folk mass, once in the spring and again in the fall during morning worship. We also used this with an ecumenical choir as part of the ecumenical Thanksgiving Eve Service, which was the best attended in the eleven year history of that event.

I feel that our summer arrangements with West Boxford continue to be satisfactory for both churches. This summer, our West Boxford friends had with them some guests from England who worshipped with us during July. We enjoyed meeting them during our fellowship hours.

In December it was a pleasure to bring together the "Thoughts At Christmastide" booklet, about which many of you have commented appreciatively. We are hoping to produce another booklet of prayers sometime during 1977. Finances remain our biggest ongoing headache, as they do for many churches. I remain convinced that it is possible for us to be selfsupporting in our stewardship, not dependent upon as well as grateful for those who provided for the church they loved through their wills and gifts for its ongoing ministry in days gone by.

Our Senior high youth group is comprised of many who are also active in the high school marching band and many other school activities. It has proved best to schedule our meetings cooperatively with the school rather than compete with school activities. Thus we are meeting two or three times per month during the winter, and less often in the fall and spring. Our young people are enthusiastic, talented, and appreciative. We are all grateful for the three years Joanne and Chuck Margeson gave their leadership to the youth group.

Our spring and fall paper drives continue to finance such special activities as a winter swim party at the Newburyport YWCA. We have re-established, through our youth, the traditional Easter Sunrise Services, followed by breakfast at the church. For a Christmas program this year we held a "Walk from Nazareth to Bethlehem" in which our young people thought of themselves as either Mary or Joseph, being forced from their home in Nazareth at a most inconvenient time, to their ancestral home in Bethlehem. They entered into the spirit of the meeting, and God's spirit entered them that night. For Halloween, the youth conducted a most successful "Ghost Walk" for the church school children, to raise money for UNICEF, with the cooperation and hospitality of the Hamelin family.

At last year's annual meeting we changed the term of service on committees to two years. The following year will tell if we were correct in feeling that people could retain their enthusiasm and be more willing to serve for shorter periods of time. We had little difficulty in finding people for our committees, and those who declined did so for their personal reasons - not because the terms were too long. For several years there has been some talk about appreciation for those completing terms of service and about recognition for those continuing or beginning to serve. We will have such a service the Sunday after the Annual Meeting, similar to the type of dedication we hold for church school teachers. Perhaps this will become a meaningful tradition among us, as it is in some of our neighboring churches.

I appreciate the privilege of ministering with you. We are fortunate to have so many who are willing to serve continuously, as well as those who come forward for specific projects and special programs. In this we compare most favorably with other churches. I believe God's spirit lives and moves among us. God does, indeed, continue to bless us all.

#### REPORT OF THE DIACONATE

The Diaconate has tried to carry out the duties as outlined in our church constitution and by-laws for the year 1976.

The Deaconesses performed their customary good will by visiting the ill, both at homes and in hospitals. Plants, cards and other gifts were distributed.

The Thanksgiving Eve Ecumenical Service held at St. Mary's Church featured the same instrumentalists and combined choirs of the participating churches, resulting in another inspiring and enjoyable performance.

Once again summer Sunday church services were held jointly with our West Boxford neighbors.

The membership roll of our church was reviewed and letters sent to those who are inactive. Some have moved from this area, while others are not living up to their duties as members even though still close by.

Our committee agrees that we are indeed fortunate to have such a dedicated and concerned minister as the Reverend Philip Southwick. Working closely with him gives us an accurate evaluation as to his keen insight and deep concern for all our church family.

As a committee we hope that we helped make our church a better place during the past year, even with our shortcomings. May God show those who serve in the future, ways to improve conditions even more.

#### BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

For the Board of Christian Education there were many accomplishments in 1976.

At the February meeting the Christian Education Committee voted to underwrite the \$150 cost of a Teacher's Retreat at Rolling Ridge in Andover on March 19 and 20. On March 21st we sponsored a family night, with home grown entertainment. The Church School classes and various groups within the church provided a delightful time for everyone, and the money raised by passing the hat was put toward ongoing improvements to Metcalf House.

The recipient of the Star Island Conference Campership this year was Billy Knickles. Craig Southwick and Dwight Southwick returned to the conference also.

We are fortunate to have so many of our Church School teachers return year after year. There are always some changes, however. At the end of the school year in June, the following teachers completed terms of dedicated service - Beth Bond, Bonnie Skinner, Joyce Tolman, and Sue Clohecy.

The few vacancies in our teaching staff were filled by the opening of Church School in October. The Dispenzas continue as our Junior High Pilgrim Fellowship Youth Advisors, while Reverend Southwick took over the leadership of the Senior Pilgrim Fellowship. The Board would like to take this opportunity of thanking Joanne and Chuck Margeson for their faithful years with the Senior High Youth. Our dedicated staff of teachers and the never ending work done by the Church School Superintendent, Evelyn Boose, continue to be one of the strengths of our church.

The fall program started with Teacher Dedication which was combined with All Church Rally Day. The culinary skills of the Christian Education Committee were tested at the teacher breakfast while the musical talents of the Senior Choir augmented by some of our young people provided a Rock Folk Mass Service.

Work on Metcalf House has continued during the year. Keith Tibbetts has contributed countless hours of labor to build a central hallway through which a bathroom and the class rooms are now approached individually. Two rooms, one on each floor, have received a temporary face-lifting by the generous efforts of Church School teachers, helpers and members of the Christian Education Committee.

I would like to express my thanks to all the teachers, helpers and members of the Board who have helped me so generously during the year.

#### REPORT OF THE CHURCH SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

A great bunch of kids, plus caring, capable teachers add up to a church school which is a vital part of the whole church. We have classes for children three years through High School, and two of the largest classes are the three year olds and the senior highs.

Missions are important to us. Our offering the first Sunday of each month goes for missions. We donated November's collection to UNICEF, and the senior fellowship group donated proceeds of a Halloween party which they gave for the children. We collected food for Thanksgiving which was donated to local families. Children brought wrapped Christmas toys to their Christmas party, December 12, and these were given to the local Salvation Army. This coming spring we plan another Heifer Project.

In early spring, teachers held an overnight retreat at Rolling Ridge, Andover, led by Mrs. Dorothy Blanchard. It was a chance to get away for part of a weekend for training, reflection and fellowship.

Children's Day is always an important Sunday for us. This June the theme was the life of Jesus told through scripture, songs and tableau. The fall schedule was started with a teachers' breakfast and Dedication Service.

We are still working hard to spruce up Metcalf House. Keith Tibbetts (after renovating the Nursery and Guild Thrift Shop) is now doing a major renovation in the entry and hallway. This meant tearing out an old bathroom and putting in a completely new one, eliminating one stairway and making a hallway that will enable people to get to every room from the hall - a big traffic-flow improvement. Now Keith is replacing all hallway woodwork and we hope to replace the floor and then paper and paint. The Board of Christian Education painted the downstairs long room and a group of teachers are meeting every Thursday morning to paint the upstairs.

The Junior Choir had an active year. In the spring we went to Bradford to see the Living Presence play "George M". We worked all year on music for the Junior Choir Festival given in Orthodox Congregational Church, Manchester, May 2. In July four of the children went into Boston (Trinity Church) to be part of a demonstration choir for an American Guild of Organists workshop. We ended last year in June with an outing in Sandown, New Hampshire. One of our favorite times is our Christmas party which this year included painting manger figures, walking downtown for caroling and returning for pizza. The eighteen girls are an enthusiastic and dependable group. They are still young as Junior Choirs go, and show a lot of potential for the future.

A special thanks for a fine group of teachers, this year including Kathy Magown, Carol Flyzik, Marcia Manning, Jan Spence, Carolyn Boynton, Helga Pearson, Susan Kelley, Elaine Kimball, Carol Knapp, Marian Harding, Audrey Magown, Keith Tibbetts and Phil Southwick.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES FOR 1976

The contract with the Haverhill Board of Mental Health and Retardation for use of space in Metcalf House was renewed in February with their agreement to pay 90% of the cost of utilities for the space. The contract was terminated in October when their expanded activities and staff forced them to relocate in larger quarters.

The roof on the front of Metcalf House was replaced at a cost of \$357. This included removal of the skylight and associated rotten wood to eliminate a serious leak. This project was delayed several weeks because a huge colony of honey bees living in the attic adjacent to the eaves forcibly ejected the roofers. It took several days work by professional exterminators to get rid of the bees.

The policy on borrowing Church equipment was reviewed and reestablished as follows: Church equipment may be borrowed by Church members with the permission of at least one member of the Board of Trustees. Trustees granting such permission are responsible to make sure the Church Secretary and/or Minister agrees that there are no prior commitments by church organizations to use the equipment during the period of the loan, to establish date and approximate time of removal and return, to establish a written inventory signed by borrower and Trustee in cases of multiple articles and quantities where memories could become haz 7, and to make certain that the absence of the equipment does not interfere with the Sexton's activities or cause him extra work. Members borrowing equipment do so with the understanding that it must be returned in essentially the same physical condition it was in when it left and that they are liable financially and physically for repair or replacement of any damage and replacement of consummable items.

The duties of the Sexton were reviewed in detail and updated to cover the new Vestry heating system and clarify areas that were not described as adequately as they should be. It should be pointed out that the Sexton is a part-time employee. He is expected to spend about 20 hours per week working at the church and we have 20 hours per week worth of duties described. Activities which demand additional time will require additional pay, and it may not always be possible for the Sexton to perform extra work exactly when it is desired.

The Church heating system has been the cause of considerable concern for the Board this past year for two reasons:(1) Its high cost of operation and (2) a steam leak in the boiler. The Trustees invited Frank Youngblood and Elliott's to examine the equipment and make recommendations. Youngblood came back with a quote of \$7,975 to replace the boiler with an oil fired system in compliance with fire safety requirements. Elliotts felt that the leak could be repaired sufficiently well to keep the existing boiler serviceable for up to 20 years and recommended that we stay with coal because of its plentiful supply and the rapidly increasing cost of oil. They further recommended that the badly rusting boiler jackets and matted rockwool insulation be replaced with asbestos cement insulation at a cost of \$250. Both recommended that we attempt better regulation of the temperature control valves in the radiators in the ground level rooms of the Church. We accepted Elliott's proposal.

Many, many things in the area of normal repair and improvements need to be accomplished in the coming year. Following is a list of the more important projects:

- 1. Structural reinforcing and new covering for the Metcalf House garage roof, contract awarded to Duffy Bridges.
- 2. New roofing for the Thrift Shop room in Metcalf House to stop a serious leak, contract awarded to Duffy Bridges.
- 3. Repair/replacement of badly rotted window sash on the southern (Andover Street) end of the Church.
- 4. Scraping and painting of the outside of the Church.
- 5. Installation of a Lexan or Plexiglass cover to protect the stained glass window over the front doors.
- 6. Review, updating, and publishing of rules for use of the Church property and facilities by outside organizations, including fee schedules and suggested donation rates.
- 7. Installation of carpeting in the Sanctuary aisles, dias, front area of Sanctuary, Narthex floor and stairs, and balcony stairs and aisles.
- 8. Improved lighting for the Choir Loft in cooperation with the Music Committee.
- 9. Initiation of a master plan for development and use of the Cottage Street property and Metcalf House.
- 10. Redecoration of the Sanctuary and Narthex.
- 11. Installation of ceiling insulation in the ground level rooms to save on heating costs.
- 12. Installation of solenoid valves and thermostats in the ground level rooms to permit better and easier regulation of heat resulting in savings in heating costs.

The trustees solicit and will welcome comments and opinions of Church Members on these goals and proposals.

#### THE WOMEN'S GUILD

Annual Reports from the Secretary, Treasurer, and all committees were heard, and we voted to pledge \$1,000 of our treasury to the church. We enjoyed a delicious dessert of strawberry pie, with an encore performance of our Hill-Billy Band.

Our 54th year began with an indoors picnic of charcoal-broiled hamburgs, potato salad, chips, relishes, green salad, punch, and ice-tea. Coffee, cookies, and fruit cocktail were served for dessert. It was reported that over \$70 was made from the Tour Luncheon that the Guild served at the Church on September 18th. Representatives from the Church's boards and committees were with us and explained their function within the church. In October we met in the Vestry in the morning to hold a brief business meeting and then worked on projects for the Fife and Drum Church Fair. Each member brought a lunch and coffee and dessert were served.

The year was appropriately ended with our Annual Guest Night of Christmas Music held December 7 in the Vestry. Despite bad weather, about 75 people attended, and a nice evening was enjoyed by all. As usual, a delicious array of refreshments was served.

### Thrift Shop

#### 1976 REPORT OF THRIFT SHOP

After what the Guild thought was a very successful season since opening the Thrift Shop in November 1975, the Guild was able to pledge \$1,000 to the church, plus the proceeds of opening week, which was given to the 1975 church fair. There were good days and poor ones, both weather and profitwise. However, being open only 12 hours a week and our location and size being what they are, we are not discouraged yet.

Townspeople, friends, and parishioners have been very generous with clothing, etc. and we have not, so far, been choosy. In general, we have donated station wagon loads for the Friendly Service Committee to pick over, pack, mend and send away. We have taken several loads to the Salvation Army box. Donations have been made to a few needy families and two large boxes packed and sent to a family in Kentucky, sponsored by the Diaconate. We still have a very full shop to overhaul, and several boxes at our respective homes to be sorted, marked and taken to the shop.

Our year included one successful, combined rummage and food sale, held in the Vestry last March. The sale in May was not so successful. Our advertising has brought several out of town customers, but we still feel we have not reached as many people as we should, either locally or otherwise. In fact, we are our own best customers at times. Anyone in the church family who would like to make suggestions or volunteer time is welcome, whether a Guild member or not.

Our hours remain the same -- 1 to 4 on Thursday & Fridays 10 to 4 on Saturdays, excepting holidays

We found it wise to close part of the summer and this winter for the Christmas season. At time of this writing it has been decided not to reopen until February 3rd, due to the severe cold and snow.

We recommend new chairmen be chosen at the end of the Guild year. Grateful thanks to each and every one, without whose help we could not operate.

#### REPORT OF THE CHURCH WORLD SERVICE CHAIRMAN

For a number of reasons, our workers have been somewhat less active than usual. Fewer sewing meetings were held (the Guild sponsored two sewing meetings) yet the total of our work is quite encouraging. Over 400 lbs. of used clothing went to Church World Service. More than 50 lbs of used clothing and household articles went to a Thrift Shop in Pleasant Hill, Tenn.

Several small packages of hand knit and other articles have been sent to Indians in South Dakota. A large collection of used clothing, books and magazines went to the Boston Seaman's Friend Society in the spring and another lot has been ready for several months, but has not been picked up.

In the summer we gave a large carton of used clothing to a center now operating in Lawrence for the benefit of the American Indian families in this area and other minority groups.

Several large cartons of selected used clothing, some very good hats and about a dozen freshly covered pillows were given to the Walker Missionary Home.

New and very nearly new clothing (worth \$125) and toys for Christmas gifts were sent to the Boston City Missionary Society for their Christmas Gift Shop. Mr. Southwick took these to the Graf's express and Graf took the boxes to their destination, free of charge. The Protestant Chaplain at the Massachusetts Correctional Institute at Walpole received \$10 for use for the prisoners' Christmas gifts. The Thrift Shop sent several cartons of clothing to the Walter E. Fernald State School in Belmont, a school for retarded people of all ages. The Thrift Shop also gives lots of good things to the Material Aid Committee to help out with our work.

The Women's Missionary Society continue their good works -their accomplishments are listed in their report. The Church School is also concerned with others less fortunate. Their donations given for the Youth Group's Halloween party went towards UNICEF and their Thanksgiving food collection went to needy families in this and nearby towns.

My sincere thanks to all of you who made this possible. I hope we can do even better in 1977. The Material Aid Committee now is Mrs. Marjorie Dea, Mrs. Wilfred Hunt, Mrs. Guy Minchin and Miss Olive Metcalf. If you wish to offer to help in any way, such as sewing, knitting or anything else, give any one of us a call. Gifts of materials, clothing, bedding, etc. may be left at my home, 21 Central Street.

#### Missionary Society

#### REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY SOCIETY

The Missionary Society met at the homes of several of its members for seven meetings from September through June. The average attendance was twelve. During the year contributions were made to our church Mission Fund, the Walker Home, the World Wide "Least Coin", Good Ship Hope, Memorial Flowers for the Sanctuary and the usual contribution to our Church's General Fund.

On October 17, our President, Olive Metcalf, attended the Earth Family Outing at Derby Wharf, Salem, sponsored by the United Church Board for World Ministries to celebrate the Historical event of February 12, 1812 when the first American Foreign Missionaries set sail from Salem. She reported it as a very interesting and moving event, attended by a great many people.
