Moderator Betty Davidson called the annual meeting to order at 8:05 P. M.

Meeting opened with Prayer by the Rev. Southwick.

The Warrant was read by the Clerk.

Records of the last annual meeting and special meeting were read and correction made. Records were accepted.

ARTICLE 1. To receive the reports of the several Boards, Committees and Officers of the Church, and to take action thereon.

Corrections were made in the Treasurers report, as printed. Treasurers report accepted as corrected.

Report of the Auditing Committee was read and accepted. Moderator called for motion to accept all reports as printed. Motion made, econded and voted that all reports, as printed, be accepted.

ARTICLE 2. To receive the report of the Finance Committee regarding the Church Budget and to take action thereon.

Ray Curtis, of the Finance Committee, explained the Budget as printed. After questions and discussion it was moved that the Budget in the amount of \$49,580.00 be accepted. motion seconded and voted.

ARTICLE 3. To hear the report of the Long Range Planning Committee and to take any action required thereon.

Carol Knapp reported for the Long Range Planning Committee. Moved, seconded and voted we accept third course of action, as per the printed report of the Long Range Planning Committee. (3. Maintaining the present Church, Parsonage and Education Building. Focusing on reduction of operating and maintenance costs, including energy conservation needs.) Printed report is on file in the Church Office.

Long Range Planning Committee reported we need to spend money on Parsonage Improvements. Voted we accept report, as is, with exception of parsonage improvements. Ray Curtis made the following motion: Moved that money be appropriated to replace basement floor at the Parsonage with a carpet, stair treads be replaced and a dehumidifier purchased, total cost not to exceed \$1300.00, motion seconded. Ten voted in favor, eight opposed. The motion did not carry.

There was a lengthy discussion regarding the authority to make repairs, Church property being the responsibility of the Trustees. Suggested that the needs of the Parsonage and all Church property be kept up with by the Trustees. Voted the Trustees be authorized to look into the Floor problem at the Parsonage and report to the Cabinet.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Church will vote to suspend for the years 1980 and 1981 Article 4, Section2, Faragraph a, third sentence, of the By-laws which reads: a member cannot serve more than two consecutive terms.

Nominating Committee reported the necessity of having a Deacon serving who is around during the day to take care of anything that may need immediate attention. Voted that we suspend for the vears 1980 and 1981 Article 4, Section 2, paragraph a, third sentence, of the By-laws which reads: a member cannot serve more than two consecutive terms.

ARTICLE 5. To hear the report of the Nominating Committee and to take any action required thereon.

The report of the Nominating Committee was read. Motion made that the report of the Nominating Committee be accepted, seconded and voted. As there were no further nominations moved that the Clerk cast one ballot for the Officers as read, seconded and voted. #### REPORT OF THE MINISTER

In looking at my calendar for 1980, I was delighted with the number of different worship experiences. There were established services, developing traditions, and special events.

(Epiphany) celebration Little Christmas January Appreciation Sunday Giff Towle spoke to both Church School and February morning worship service about the work of our Christian World Mission in India, with special emphasis on irrigation projects he helped to establish. The Reverend Joseph Neville, our new area March minister, spoke to us. Palm Sunday with reception of members April Maundy Thursday Passover, Communion, Tenebrae Easter Sunrise Service, followed by breakfast Easter Service Motion picture - The Shroud, during worship Laymen's Sunday - Sue Gustafson, Our Faith Dialogue Sermon which included Young Adults May Graduates' Sunday June Children's Day spectacular directed by Evelyn Boose The Youth Choir production of Joseph and His Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat
John Rugayo talked about newly won freedom in July Zimbabwe on our Independence Day Sunday June - July - August - Union Services with West Boxford Rally Day celebration of the 200th anniversary September of the Sunday School movement A series of sermons about the polity, practice, October and creedal positions of the United Church of Christ. Stewardship Sunday with Covenant Players November 15th Annual Thanksgiving Eve Service, St. Mary's Annual appearance of the Bellringers of the December First Baptist Church of Beverly Christmas Eve Candlelight service

One winter's day we had two visitors in the office - Two Covenant Players who introduced themselves and their programs to us. Two Diaconate members and I attended a performance at the West Parish Church in Haverhill, and signed them up for a Sunday evening Family Night in March. They presented a Lenten theme which we enjoyed so much that we asked them to return on a Sunday morning in the fall. We served as their home base of operations during the week of November 17 through 22.

As Scribe of the Essex North Association, I had the privilege of taking part in the installation service of Joseph Neville as our Northeast Area Minister of the Massachusetts Conference of the United Church of Christ, held at the Maple Street Church in Danvers on April 20, 1980.

During 1980 the Junior and Senior High youth groups were combined for several activities - a swim party at the Newburyport YWCA, two paper drives, a roller skating party, theatre party, and the town-sponsored Walk for Mankind. During the summer we made two decisions regarding youth for the coming year:

1: to hire a leader for the junior high age youth;

2: to schedule both groups to meet on the same Sundays. We hired Dan Silveira, a senior at Gordon College to work with our junior highs, and we agreed to meet basically twice per month, the first and third Sundays, thus opening the other weeks for activities with our families. Both decisions appear to have been good. Marcia and Bob Houlden continue to be my right hand help with the senior high group.

While other churches are facing declines in Church School, our Church School attendance is up over a year ago, directed by a group of dedicated teachers. I hope you realize how fortunate we are to have so many of our youth active in the church - in junior and senior high church school, and in youth groups.

Those church school teachers in the 11 o'clock session are unable to attend church, and they miss worship, especially communion. So we have been holding mini-communion services for them on Communion Sundays, before they go to teach. In this way they may be included in worship as well as in our prayers. With assistance from my Diaconate, we have enjoyed taking communion to shut-ins and we plan to continue both of these practices in 1981. Please let me know if you want to be included in the home communion service program.

During the summer we updated our Supplementary Hymnals, including hymns that several of you suggested. In September we celebrated its completion by choosing only hymns from it for morning worship.

We have a post-high group which meets four times per year for supper and a varied program. This year we held a discussion on death, viewed a motion picture, shared a Communion Dialogue Meditation during a Sunday morning worship service, hosted a speaker from Western Electric, and enjoyed a Christmas social. Again, we are fortunate to have so many young adults actively working on our church committees and singing in the choir. How many churches can boast of a choir director and an organist, both home grown and talented and young?

To combat the midwinter blahs, the church sponsored a series of Thursday morning meetings for mothers of pre-school children, giving them a chance to get together and have a variety of programs of interest to them. At this moment they are considering a similar series for the coming months. Out of this group of young mothers came both the desire for, and a willingness to assist with a Vacation Church School, which had not been held here for several years. This turned out to be a successful mid-August program.

This past summer our pattern of union services with West Boxford was varied, still meeting here through July, then moving to West Boxford for August and early September. Norman Crook and I worked out a schedule which permitted each of us to conduct worship in both church sanctuaries, providing greater variety for all, and a split vacation for both of us.

Our church home took on a new look. Not only did we put on siding and storm windows, but a lawn was planted on the Clark Street side, and new attractive memorial plantings took shape on both sides of the front entrance.

At the parsonage, the basement family room received a facelift in the form of industrial carpeting, firmly reconstructed stairs, and a dehumidifier to remove dampness, thus making it usable and attractive throughout the year. No sooner had that project been completed, than the furnace rusted through and had to be completely replaced. This has resulted in a noticeable fuel savings. We greatly appreciate Forrest Bridges' work and dedication to these improvements and repairs.

We are fortunate; there are so many who are willing to do whatever needs to be done. Oh sometimes we groan and grumble, sometimes we boast and forget to be humble. But thanks be to God for letting us share the work. May God bless you, and make His face to shine upon you, and grant you peace each day of your lives.

#### Diaconate

#### REPORT OF THE DIACONATE

We were pleased to begin the new year by officially accepting the gift of the beautiful Christmas creche set from Dorothy and Charles Blanchard. After celebrating "Little Christmas," Diaconate members carefully packed it away. Five more figures were taken to Chuck Margeson for restoration and repainting.

In February, Lillian Grissino was re-elected Chairman, Janet Brown re-elected as Secretary and Marcia Houlden was appointed to continue to be in charge of flowers and cards. Other members of the 1980 Diaconate were: Charles Blanchard, Carol Dispenza, Barry Games, Don Gammon, Donna Gordon, Bob Gustafson, Tom Hamelin, Earl Johnston and Cheryl Wyman. This enthusiastic group had a busy, active year.

We were happy to welcome our new area minister, the Reverend Joseph Neville, at morning worship in March. Several of our members attended a meaningful installation service for Reverend Neville held in Danvers in April.

We coordinated a covered dish supper and performance by the Covenant Players in March. Several church families hosted their overnight stay. This energetic, devoted group impressed us and we invited them back to participate in morning worship November 2. They thought we were a happy friendly church, and asked if we would act as their host church for a week in November. So arrangements were made for overnight accommodations and meals for the week of November 17. Our thanks to all of you who so graciously opened your homes and hearts to these young people. We look forward to a return visit in the coming year.

Reception of new members was held on Palm Sunday. The Maundy Thursday service was again held in the Vestry and included an adapted version of Passover as was done the previous year. We noted with interest this fall that the UCC is now encouraging this type of service and is offering a resource kit which shows the relationship of the Lord's Supper to the Jewish Seder. (We were ahead of them by two years!) An interesting, thought-provoking film about the Holy Shroud was shown during the worship hour the Sunday following Easter. On Laymen's Sunday, April 27, we were all enlightened by Sue Gustafson who shared her thoughts on what it means to be a member of the United Church of Christ.

A CPR course, coordinated by the Diaconate and taught by Jack Spears, had 9 participants. This valuable course, sponsored by the Red Cross, will very possibly be repeated in the Spring of '81. If you are interested, please speak to a member of the Diaconate.

In response to a concern about the roping off of pews in the Sanctuary, a questionnaire was sent to all members and was also included in the Sunday morning bulletin. Results of the survey showed that the majority did not object to the roping off of the three back pews.

Twelve babies were baptized during 1980, 6 of whom received the Sacrament of Baptism on Mother's Day.

A sub-committee was formed to have the antique silver appraised. After its appraisal, many hours were spent in polishing it. Plans are to rotate the display in the glass case.

Joint summer services were held with West Boxford. Ministers of both churches participated in the introductory and concluding services which were highlighted by Communion. This summer the ministers worked out a schedule whereby they exchanged pulpits several times. Reaction to this arrangement was very favorable.

The 15th Annual Ecumenical Thanksgiving Eve Service was held at St. Mary's with a capacity crowd. As a result of these joint services, comments were heard that "we should do more together."

We visit those in the hospital, and continue to enjoy our visitations with shut-ins. The Minister and members of our board continue to administer communion to those unable to attend Church services. Easter and Christmas plants, as well as flowers from special services, have been taken to shut-ins throughout the year.

Subscriptions to the <u>Upper Room</u> and <u>Guidepost</u> have been renewed and are available on the church literature rack. We wish to express our appreciation to all who assist in making "Christian Service a workable, supportive project.

During the past year, 18 members of our church family were honored with a rose placed on the communion table during morning worship. The rose was then personally delivered by a Diaconate member to the recipient. Should you know of anyone approaching their "80th or over" birthday, who is not presently included in this special celebration, please notify us. In September, we decided to ask the birthday person to choose their favorite hymn to be sung at morning worship on their "birthday Sunday" if they might be able to attend Church. "How Great Thou Art" has been a favorite of several.

We appreciate Carol Knapp's arranging the "before service" greeters each week. After church, a Diaconate member stands with the Minister to assist in relaying messages and to greet you. This is a good time to express any concerns or give suggestions to the Diaconate.

Using Memorial Fund monies, two more Communion table and pulpit cover sets were completed (white and green). The purple set was first used during Advent 1979. We plan to have the red set made and ready for use in 1981, thus completing this project. For your information, an explanation of the four colors, their meanings and usages follows on the next page.

White - signifies purity, light, rejoicing
Purple - means penitence, watching, fasting
Red - means Christian zeal, the work and
the ministry of the church
Green - symbol of hope; also growth in Christian
life

USAGES: ADVENT (Purple) Used for four Sundays, signifying Christ's coming CHRISTMAS (White) The birth of Christ EPIPHANY (White) Used for all Sundays preceding Lent LENT (Purple) EASTER (White) Used from Easter Sunday to Whit Sunday (Pentecost): Seven Sundays PENTECOST (Red) Meaning the descent of the Holy Spirit, as tongues of fire, on the Apostles; used for one Sunday THE TWENTY-SEVEN SUNDAYS AFTER PENTECOST (Green) REFORMATION SUNDAY (Red) Dates back to 16th Century, pertaining to the religiou movement resulting in the formation of Protestant churches REFORMATION SUNDAY TO THANKSGIVING SUNDAY (Green) THANKSGIVING SUNDAY (red) Advent immediately follows Thanksgiving Sunday

Memorial Fund monies contributed toward the foundation planting in front of the Church. This beautiful landscaping, done in June, enhances the newly renovated Church building.

A sound speaker system, researched and installed by Tom Hamelin, with the assistance of Dwight and Craig Southwick, has been very recently installed in the Sanctuary for your future listening pleasure. This project has also been provided by the Memorial Fund.

May the light from the multitude of candles warming our hearts and illuminating our faces each Christmas Eve, lead us to inspire, encourage and enjoy each other as we work together - Minister and congregation - throughout the coming year.

#### **Christian Education**

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

This has been an "old" and "new" year for the Board of Christian Education. Some new programs were launched, some old ones renewed, and some old favorites continued.

A new project, headed by Jan Robertson was the pre-school mothers' group. It began in March and ran for 13 weeks with an average of 14 mothers in attendance. The weekly meetings had a variety of speakers each week, while as many as 27 pre-schoolers were being cared for at Metcalf House, on Thursday mornings, by volunteers.

Another new-old project, again headed by Jan Robertson, was the re-establishing of Summer Vacation Church School on August 11 through the 15th. Jan Spence assisted with the return of the Vacation Church School. Over fifty children joined in a long list of summer activities.

This year the Board sponsored two Family Nights. On January 27 we "clowns" hosted a covered dish supper, and on April 13 we held a cheese and cracker and mulled cider family night, collecting \$127 for the Heifer Fund.

The Board hired Dan Silviera as Junior High Pilgrim Fellowship Advisor. He is assisted, on a volunteer basis, by Kristen Merrill and they meet with the juniors twice a month.

On March 5 we thanked our Sunday School teachers with a spaghetti supper and guest speaker, Louise Barry who charmed us with her discussion on children. Beginning February 3 Reverend Southwick served Communion to the Eleven O'clock teachers before church. This has and will be continued on each Communion Sunday. Our dedicated teachers gave of themselves again on December 14, planning crafts and goodies for the Christmas Party.

Our Church School has reached out in many ways to help other people. Personal hygiene kits were collected from the children for Church World Service, instead of the usual "white gifts" at Christmastime. The Junior High girls held a Halloween "horribles parade" on November 2 and \$40.35 was collected from the children for UNICEF. The Thanksgiving Food offerings that were collected this year were sent to the Crombie Street Congregational Church in Salem Mass. for their weekly Friday suppers for underprivileged people in their area.

Continuing our mission work, we had a candy and flower sale which raised \$112 for the Reverend and Mrs. Gifford Towle. This money was taken to the Vadala School in India. A flea market was held in the spring and benefited UNICEF with a profit of \$75.

Following past tradition, gold cross lapel pins were presented to the Goergetown high school graduates during the worship service the first Sunday of June. The children of the Church School presented another hit musical and puppet show, Moses and the Freedom Fanatics for Children's Sunday this year. Bibles and plants and

balloons were presented to the children to wind up the Church School year. A photo of all the classes was taken in commemoration of the 200th year of the Sunday School.

Before the opening of Sunday School, a teachers' retreat was held at Evelyn Boose's summer cottage in Sandown, N.H. It was an inspirational, thought-provoking retreat. A highlight of the retreat is the teachers' Communion - the only time of the year when this is possible.

On September 28, Rally Day was held celebrating 200 years of Sunday School. Under the direction of Carolyn Boynton, a grand celebration took place. This included a re-enactment of the first Sunday School class, a birthday cake ablaze with candles, and last but not least, the absolute highlight of the day - the releasing of all those beautiful balloons into that beautiful blue sky.

We would like to express our loving thanks to Evelyn Boose, our Sunday School Superintendent, our teachers and assistants who have given so much of themselves this year. They are: Beth Bond, Karen Dole, Lillian Pendergast, Judy Bezanson, Jan Robertson, Jan Spence, Sue Kelley, Helen Snow, Marion Harding, Carol Knapp, Gladys Gittings, John Morrison and Phil Southwick. Their helpers are Kendra Bond, Allison Zweil, Annie Pendergast, Robin Hurd, Heather Face, Avie Barlow, Robin Gustafson, Lisa and Eileen Skinner, Gail Morehouse, Mark Flyzik, Kevin Dudley, and Deanna Houlden. Our capable director of the Infantry is Carolyn Boynton.

### Thrift Shop

#### REPORT OF THE THRIFT SHOP

Thanks to Ann Low, Olive Metcalf and many other faithful Guild members, we were able to keep the Thrift Shop open all summer. We have been closed through the Christmas holidays due to the cold and snow.

We made our usual \$1,000 contribution to the church and pray that we will be able to do so again this year. An amount of \$75 was contributed to and included in Fair profits.

Due to our shop area being small and people giving so generously, we have donated literally carloads of clothing to other causes. We have, on occasion, been able to help individual families.

In March we held our annual 10¢ rummage sale, selling everything from coats to shoes for 10¢. With this sale, the Guild members held a food sale to help pay our pledge to the Renovation Fund.

Friends and church members have been very generous with clothing and white elephant items for which we say "thank you." Without these contributions, we would be out of business. We still need more children's clothes. We never get enough to meet our needs.

#### WORLD SERVICE COMMITTEE

We continue to help in many ways, as we are able, those outside our own church. Over 200 lbs. of good used clothing and kits were sent to Church World Service by the spring pick-up. Fourteen blankets, many of them new, were sent later by United Parcel. We also sent \$30 to help defray their shipping costs. We had another 200 lbs. ready for the fall pick-up, but word was received at the last minute to hold back our used clothing for this one drive, as there had been a cut in Church World Service's grant from the Federal Government and they were unable to ship out for a while. We hope to send CWS boxes in the spring; at any rate - keep bringing us your clothing, bedding, etc., as there are always lots of places that have a need for these things.

The goods we had intended for CWS were divided between the Pleasant Hill Community Church Thrift Shop in Tennesse, the Rosebud Reservation, St. Charles, South Dakota, the Boston Seaman's Friend Society, and to the Crombie Street Church in Salem for its work with needy people.

We keep sending boxes of clothing and other articles to Pleasant Hill. We have also sent clothing to the "boat people" and more recently to the Cuban refugees, through the International Institute in Lawrence. We sent several boxes of clothing to Danvers State Hospital and also the the Walker Missionary Home.

At Thanksgiving the Sunday School collected food which was taken to the Crombie Street Church, in Salem, for distribution. They also gave to UNICEF and the Heifer Fund.

The Missionary Society gave to CARE, the Walker Missionary Home and the good ship HOPE; also to the Least Coin Fund.

The Guild held two work parties for World Service, and we look forward to another one in February. All ladies of the Church are welcome to these work parties - many things are accomplished - including rolling bandages, making "johnnies" for hospitals, etc.

For the first time in years we did not contibute to the Boston City Missionary Society's Christmas Gift Shops. We were hit too hard by colds to get it in on time - but - the contributions were added to the articles taken to the Crombie Street Church.
