The Annual Meeting of the First Congregational Church was called to order at 8:05 P. M. by the Moderator Donn Chatterton.

The Rev. Southwick opened the meeting with Prayer.

Clerks report of the 1983 Annual Meeting and a Special Meeting to elect a member of the Diaconate were read and accepted.

The Warrant was read by the Clerk.

ARTICLE 1. To receive the reports of the several Boards, Committees and Officers of the Church, and to take action thereon.

The several reports were reviewed and minor correctiona made. Carol Sheehan reported the Guild had purchased a ninety six place setting of China for use by the organizations of the Church. Also the Guild gave donations of food to H. O. M. E. These were omitted from the Guild annual report. Voted that all reports (with corrections) be accepted as

printed.

The report of the Auditors was read.

ARTICLE 2. To hear the report of the Finance Committee regarding the Church Budget and to take action thereon.

Allan Barlow explained the Budget by means of charts. In 1983 we were \$1000.00 in the red, used Improvement Fund to pay bills or it would have been \$2000.00. 115 pledges have been received for 1984. Beginning in 1984 Payroll taxes (State Income, Federal Income, and F. I. C. A.).will have to be paid. Carol Sheehan read a directive regarding Payroll taxes. Budget increases and decreases, as printed, were reviewed. Voted that the report of the Finance Committee regarding the Budget be accepted.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Church will authorize the Finance Committee to borrow from the Improvement Fund and/or Renovation Fund from time to time, if needed, in anticipation of income to pay Current Expenses, and further, to transfer funds from the Improvement Fund and/or Renovation Eund accounts to Current Expenses, Account 208, in the event that income from Special Fund raising activities, Account 207, does not meet Budget Expectations.

Allan Barlow moved that the Church authorize the Finance Committee to borrow money from the Improvement Fund, and/or thedRenovation Fund, if needed, in anticipation of income, to pay Current Expenses, and further, to transfer Funds from the Improvement Fund and/or Renovation Fund to appropriate Current Expense accounts in the event that income from special fund raising activities does not meet budget expectations. Motion seconded and so voted.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Church will authorize the Board of Trustees to enter into Contract with George F. Burgess, Steeple jack, for the purpose of:

1. Reconditioning and reorienting weathervane.

 Replacing missing slate, matching color and pattern as close as possible.
 Refasterning loose slate.

4. Other repairs as authorized by the Board of Trustees.

Total expenditure not to exceed \$10,000.00 and to authorize the Finance Committee to raise and/or appropriate funds to finance said project.

Trustee Chairman Craig Southwick reported that Robert Metcalf (Olive's brother) had given \$1500.00 so that Olive's long standing wish could be accomplished. It had been Olives desire that the Weathervane be reoriented and recondition, this will now be done.

As it was necessary to consult a Steeplejack it was the opinion of the Trustees that missing slates on the Steeple be replaced and loose slates be repaired. The loose and falling slate is definitely a safety hazard.

Craig was congratulated on a super presentation. Craig moved that the Board of Trustees be authorized to enter into a Contract with George F. Burgess, Steeple jack, for the purpose of reconditioning and reorienting weathervane, replacing missing Slate, matching color and pattern as close as possible, refastening loose slate and other repairs as authorized by the Board of Trustees. Total expenditure not to exceed \$10,000.00 and to authorize the Finance Committee to raise and/or appropriate funds to finance said project. Motion seconded and voted.

ARTICLE 5. To hear the report of the Nominating Committee and to take any action required thereon. Lillian Grissino read the report of the Nominating Committee. Voted Nominating Committee Report be accepted as read. REPORT OF THE CLERK

I would like to thank all who have been supportive and helpful as I have tried to fill Mina Marble's position as Clerk of our Church.

Some highlights of the year's Cabinet meetings are as follows: In February the Cabinet voted that the Lenten Easter Offering be used (1) to contribute funds to the Community Hot Meals Program of Haverhill, and (2) toward further redecoration in the Sanctuary and Narthex, and the upgrading of thethermostatic controls of the heating system. In April a discussion was held on our Church Building and Property Use Policy. It was voted to accept the Policy, as formulated by the Trustees, with an addition to 8d - adding "subject to rate change". In December the Cabinet voted that 20% of the Advent Offering be used for Missions in the Boston area.

REPORT OF THE DIACONATE

I would like to thank the Diaconate for all their devoted work this year. They are Secretary Marion Harding, Oliver Gates, Forrest Bridges, Donald Gammon, Ernest Kelloway, Sue Kelley, Christine Boyland, Ann Kelloway, and Barry Games.

Under the direction of Oliver Gates, many dedicated people volunteered to assist the Diaconate in visiting the shutins. Those visited were brought the booklets, <u>The Upper Room</u> and <u>Guideposts</u>, which they greatly enjoy reading. Visits were also made at Christmastime and at Easter to deliver the memorial plants. We also have continued the tradition of celebrating the birthdays of our members who are 80(+) years old by having a birthday rose placed in Church, and later delivered to them.

Ann Kelloway had the duty of providing greeters each Sunday morning before our worship services. It was the responsibility of a Diaconate member to greet after the service. The pulpit and Communion table cloths were changed by Barry Games. Many get-well and sympathy cards were sent this year. Chris Boyland was appointed this task. Also, Sue Kelley was our Christian Service Coordinator. She saw to it that many meals and rides were provided for when there was a need.

Our Lenten season began with a joint Ash Wednesday service held at the West Boxford Congregational Church. Reverend Southwick and Donald Gammon both took part in this service. We were again fortunate to have had another Wednesday evening Lenten series, led by Reverend Southwick. The topics about which we discussed and meditated on were: "The Betrayal", "Watch and Pray", "The Arrest", and "Peter's Denial". The series was well-attended and it was a very meaningful experience. The whole Diaconate takes part in our Maundy Thursday service. It is a very inspirational service in which we celebrate The Passover, Our Lord's Last Supper, and Tenebrae. On Palm Sunday we held a reception for the ten new members who joined the Church that day.

We were pleased to have eight youth join our Church through Confirmation on Pentecost Sunday in June.

Again this year, we participated in joint summer services with the Second Congregational Church of West Boxford. We held a welcome back breakfast, served on our front lawn, in September.

Other Diaconate duties included: assisting the Minister in Communion, (breads from around the world were served during World Wide Communion, and homebaked loaves were passed at the First Sunday in Advent service), Baptisms, and the Christmas Eve Candlelight Service. We saw to the decorating of the Sanctuary for the Christmas season. The Diaconate purchased, from Memorial Fund monies, seventy-five new hymnals. Now the whole Sanctuary is supplied with new hymnals. Thanksgiving Sunday was a very special Sunday this year. A Colonial Thanksgiving Worship Service was held. The congregation met in the Vestry and processed to the Sanctuary as one body, led by a drummer. The service was enjoyed by all, and was concluded with the honoring of our Minister and his wife on the occasion of Reverend Southwick's twenty-fifth anniversary of Ordination. We are fortunate that nineteen of these years have been spent with us; we appreciate this dedication and leadership. BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Most of the duties and objectives of the Board deal directly with working with our Church School program and our youth, although the Board has the responsibility for the organization, administration and/or supervision of the entire educational program of the Church. We have an interacting relationship with the Church School Superintendent, Missions Coordinator, youth advisors, Minister and other boards. During our calendar year, our six-person Board has events, activities, programs and duties which are scheduled for each year, working with new themes or ideas. On the other hand, there are times when other programs or events outside our"programmed" schedule are initiated and/or supervised by the Board.

Our year in brief was as follows:

On February 12 a Covered Dish Supper with a Valentine theme was held, with a sing-a-long led by Linda Flynn and piano playing my Mina Hartman. During this evening an \$83.00 free-will offering was collected for Heifer Fund.

A Church retreat, "Making Prayer Work," was held March 2-3 at Rolling Ridge, North Andover. Ester Zeimetz, Educational Coordinator of our area conference, was our leader, and 19 people attended. They shared their thoughts, experiences and ideas regarding various concerns, with meditation being a focal point. There were quiet and reflective times as well as shared emotional and joyous times. A retreat is a "being" experience which the Board greatly enjoyed sponsoring.

A Wednesday Evening Lenten Series was led by Reverend Southwick and centered on prayer, meditation and study based upon the last night of Christ's life. The meetings were held 8:30-9:15 as follows:

Refreshments were served and approximately 125 people has a very enjoyable evening:

Graduates' Sunday was held June 3, with the following high school seniors being recognized and cross pins/tie tacks being presented to: Craig Amnott, Kathleen Grover, Neil Kimball, Reed Savory, Cynthia Bridges, Lisa Grover, Dan Malone and Leann Silvernail. It gives us great pleasure to wish our graduating seniors the very best and our most hardy congratulations. At this same service, our 1984 Confirmation Class was received into Church membership, and their names appear in the Church Clerk's Report.

Also occurring in June was Children's Sunday, held the 10th of the month. The Board assists the Church School Superintendent with the program which has been planned by her and the Church School teachers. Flowers were purchased for the children and refreshments served.

Rally Day was held September 23, with our new puppet theater being used for the first time. Our theater, a long-time wish of Evelyn Boose, was suggested for Rally Day by Ginny Ryder, designed by Evelyn and Emery Boose, built by Forrest Bridges and funded by contributions from the Pre-School Mother's Group headed by Karen Dole. Thank you allfor the cooperative effort and teamwork for yet another avenue of teaching Christian principles in a manner so entertaining and enjoyable! Subjects covered were forgiveness, self-acceptance, working together and facing problems. Thanks also to our puppeteers: John Morrison, Kim Morrison, Cathie Durkee, Craig Southwick, Michele Auclair and Roger Auclair. Refreshments served.

In November the Board worked with the Church School in the collection of our annual Thanksgiving Food Offering, which again this year went to the Crombie Street Church, Salem, in support of their outreach program, "Break Bread Together". Clothing and money donations accompanied the food. Thanks to you all and to Lillian Grissino for baking pies to send and to Barry Games and Donn Chatterton for food delivery.

Our Church School Christmas Party was held December 2, 2:00-4:00, with the Board assisting the Church School Superintendent and teachers and providing and serving refreshments to the children. (Lots of popcorn, soda and Hoodsies!) Christmas gifts were donated to H.O.M.E., and these were the only Christmas gifts that these children received this year. Our Junior and Senior High youth groups this year have enjoyed an active year participating in fun activities and Christian service projects. Under the supervision of Lillian Grissino and Dwight Southwick for the Junior High, and Karen and Warren Young for the Senior High, the year ran smoothly and effectively because of the time, effort, energy and resourceful ability they all dedicated. Both groups met usually twice a month. On occasion both groups have combined forces for different activities, but usually meet as individual groups with their respective leaders. Some activities have included: a swim party; theatre party for "Jesus Christ Superstar"; spring and fall paper drives; ice and roller skating parties; a sledding party; cleaning and landscaping of front Church area; an end-of-season get-together at Pawtuckaway State Park; Church Fair work party; Boston Christmas outing for Seniors and Christmas Party for Juniors. The Senior Highs worked with Rev. Southwick and planned and led the Easter Sunrise Service, with both the Seniors and Juniors serving breakfast back at the Church. (Thanks to the Sheehans and the Kellys for all that good cooking!)

As many of you know, Kerygma, an in-depth Bible study continued from its beginnings last year. The study presents a thematic approach rather than book by book study so that a holistic understanding of the Bible is developed. The group meets on Sunday mornings, 9:30-10:30, at Metcalf House and discusses the lesson for the week. People who are potentially interested in Kerygma are invited to visit any class. The Kerygma class is a learning, sharing and Christian growth oriented group, interested in one another's views and feelings. The program is divided into ten themes with each theme being studied as a course in itself. New members "join" at the beginning of a new theme. Our leaders have been study group members, and the people studying, listening, learning and sharing this year were: Mina Hartman, Barry Games, Ginny Ryder, Joan Chatterton, JoEllen Fielding and Diane Townsend.

Junior Church, in progress for the second year, was supervised by Ginny Ryder from January through June, and by Shirley Southwick from September through December. Both women have utilized their enthusiasm and talents to do a fine job working with the children, and coordination of a volunteer schedule of adults to assist. This group meets approximately every Sunday, with the exception of when the Junior Choir sings, because most of the children who would be in this group, are in the choir. Children in grades three through six can participate; they attend a portion of the regular church service, generally as a group, leave the Sanctuary prior to the meditation and adjourn to the Conference Room for the duration of Church. Thanks again to Ginny, Shirley and all volunteers who have contributed to this program.

It is with extreme pride and sincerity that I extend to my fellow Board members my gratitude for their helpfulness, willing spirit, creativity and continued dedication to the tasks which needed to be done. My most sincere and personal thanks to Barbara Parker (our secretary), Jackie Amnott, Jan Robertson, Anne Gillen and Ginny Ryder. An extra note of thanks to Ginny for being my Co-Chairman when I returned to the job force this past spring. She was my on-the-localscene eyes, ears and information person, very willing to do many tasks that time and distance would not allow me to accomplish.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees have addressed many issues concerning Church property and its use this past year.

The Church steeple and weathervane were put into good condition by steeplejack, George Burgess. The weathervane was in total disrepair, and its mast was severely weakened by rust. Slate on the steeple and lourvers was painstakingly refastened and replaced as needed. Our steeple is again beautiful and weathertight.

Last winter, the Board was busy repairing cracks in the sanctuary walls. Our labor was well worth the time as we saw the beauty of the sanctuary being restored. This year, the Board will attempt to repair the cracks in the wall to the right of the organ.

The emergency lighting systems were modernized by Dwight Southwick by replacing the dry cells with rechargeable batteries, and the installation of recharging circuits.

Our Church Building and Property Use Policy was revised by the Board of Trustees and approved by the Cabinet.

The parsonage's badly weathered roof was replaced by John Pettis and Sons roofing contractors for a cost of \$2,000.

Our annual spring church cleanup day was held on April 7. Many hands made the large job small, plus we all shared in the fellowship of being together. Many thanks to the Guild for providing the workers with a good lunch.

Plans were made to build cabinets and shelves in the Church Office to improve storage and access of supplies and office equipment. (The actual work on these plans will be carried out in the future).

Roger Auclair was hired by the Board as our new Sexton. He comes to this position with the knowledge he learned on the job working side by side with his parents.

Our front lawn sign is starting to peel and weather. Plans are under way to replace this sign with a wood carved sign that should serve us for many years. A new Thrift Shop sign is being fabricated to replace the rotted one.

The Board has started planning for completing the modernization of our Church's heating system. Our plans call for the installation of thermostats and zoning of specific areas so that the heating of our building can be better regulated. Board of Trustees

The Trustees feel that the next project to be undertaken is the repair, insulating, and siding of the Metcalf House Church School building. During a window-washing party by the Trustees and others, we saw that this building has been neglected and needs considerable repair.

Amidst these major concerns, we also handled the running toilets, broken windows, the scheduling of outside groups, the repair and maintenance of the boilers, etc.

I would like to extend my personal thanks to every member of the Board for their hard work throughout the year - for the seen and unseen things that they did. They are: Wendell Arsenault, Doug Gammon, Jim Boynton, Jr., Helen Snow, and Steve Robertson.

Missions

REPORT OF THE MISSION COORDINATOR

In 1984 it was a heartwarming experience to see our Church generously support those who are less fortunate through our many mission projects. Transportation has never been a problem because there was always someone available to make a delivery - whether it was the Pine Street Inn in Boston, Crombie Street Congregational Church in Salem, Church World Service Collection Depot in Topsfield, or for H.O.M.E. in Orland, Maine. Here is a brief summary:

1. CHURCH WORLD SERVICE:

On January 20 our Church was responsive to the One Great Hour of Sharing which supports foreign missions through our United Church of Christ.

In February there was a school kit drive which consisted of paper, pencils, crayons, scissors, erasers and rulers. On March 18 the Youth Group decorated and packed 37 school bags.

On February 28 the Ladies Guild devoted their monthly meeting on sewing layettes which included receiving blankets, night gowns. They also knitted and crocheted baby sweaters. With the cash donations, we were able to purchase diaper pins, wash cloths and cloth diapers.

In May the school bags, the layettes and three boxes of yarn were delivered to the Topsfield Trinity Episcopal Church for Church World Service pickup. The Missionary Society donated \$20 to pay the transportation charges. From Topsfield, the goods are trucked to New Windsor, MD for processing. Within our state of Massachusetts, there are 33 depots which collected 52,906 lbs. for Church World Service in 1984, topping the figures for 1983.

On October 7 our Church was again responsive to the Neighbors In Need Offering which supports social services in our country, and is distributed through our United Church of Christ.

On November 4 our guest speaker was Mr. Douglas Beane, an Associate Missionary with the United Church Board for World Ministries. We heard first hand of his work in Burma, Cambodia, Laos, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Vietnam.

On November 21 an offering was taken during the Ecumenical Service held at St. Mary's. The offering, amounting to \$603.20 was sent to Ethiopia. According to Mr. Stanley of Church World Service, 6,500 tents and 50,000 blankets were sent on December 5 to help relieve the suffering there.

2. CROMBIE STREET CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH:

In November our Thanksgiving Food collection, which consisted of canned goods, paper goods, baking supplies and homemade pumpkin pies, was delivered to Crombie Street Church. Also from individual donations and our Thrift Shop, we were able to pack boxes of men's warm coats, shoes and boots. Through a variety of programs, Crombie Street has become a multi-service mission that responds to the needs of the poor in the greater Salem, Massachusetts area.

3. <u>HAVERHILL COMMUNITY MEALS</u>: From the Lenten Offering, \$200 was sent to the Community Meals Program. About 180 - 200 people are served a warm, nutritious meal once a week, prepared by volunteers from various churches in the Greater Haverhill area at the Haverhill Citizens Center.

4. HEIFER PROJECT INTERNATIONAL:

The Board of Christian Education and the Sunday School sponsored two fund raisers to purchase sheep. There was a Covered Dish Supperon February 12 and a Family Stunt Night on April 1. Also, Sunday School collections from the first Sunday of every month, help with this project. "Heifer Project International works at home and abroad through livestock development programs to improve the nutrition and increase the resources of those most in need of freedom from hunger and the oppression of poverty." The executive offices for this area are located in Rutland, MA - a holding farm for animals who will eventually be shipped to deprived areas of our country or out of the country.

5. HOMEMAKERS ORGANIZED FOR MORE EMPLOYMENT:

In February 100 lbs of clothing was delivered to the people at H.O.M.E. On November 30, the Youth Choir participated in a Rock-a-Thon for 24 hours to raise money for H.O.M.E. In December Christmas presents were collected for the children at H.O.M.E. In addition, one of our Church families refurbished a goodly number of toys, making them usable, and like new again. A week before Christmas, a truck arrived from H.O.M.E. to pick up the many, many beautiful Christmas presents, record albums for teens, boxes of extra toys, warm clothes, boots, homemade jellies and candy canes.

6. PINE STREET INN:

Due to a plea for men's warm clothing on the television news last winter, for Pine Street Inn,we immediately gathered warm coasts, sweaters, pants and socks from individual donations and our Thrift Shop.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC COMMITTEE

1984 was a busy year for the musical life of our Church. Our talented and faithful leaders continue to be a source of inspiration and joy to us all: Bob Knapp, Director of Music and Senior Choir Director; Emily Knapp, Organist; Evelyn Boose, Junior Choir and Bell Choir Director; and Linda Flynn, Youth Choir Director.

In addition to the outstanding music provided to us every Sunday by our Organist and choirs, the following highlights of 1984 stand out:

- Bob and Emily led us in two Sunday evening programs of hymn-singing - one on Palm Sunday, and one on Veterans' Sunday.
- 2) In March our Junior Choir, under the direction of Evelyn Boose, participated in the annual Junior Choir Festival joining with many other junior choirs in this area. This year the Festival was hosted by St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Beverly.
- On May 11 and 12 the Broadway Belles was produced under 3) the joint coordination and direction of Evelyn Boose, Linda Flynn and Sandy Elkins. They presented a dynamic musical show in order to raise money for the First Congregational Church hand bells. And indeed they did. Proceeds of almost \$1,000 were realized and put toward the purchase of our own bells. The remaining bells, funded through individual donations made as memorials, were ordered in June and received at the end of the summer. Rehearsals started in mid-October and, under the direction of Evelyn, our very own Bell Choir gave its first performance (a real musical treat!) as part of the Christmas Concert in December. They played again at Christmas Eve Service. Here is the lineup of the Choir: Beth Arsenault, Emery Boose, Linda Flynn, Jan Flyzik, Isabel Gammon, Tracy Green, Jennifer Harding, Marion Harding, Helen Snow, Dwight Southwick and Shirley Southwick. Commendations to them all!
- 4) On August 11, as part of the Georgetown's "Now & Then Festival", the Music Committee sponsored a series of miniorgan-concerts. Besides our own Emily, the following organists each donated their time and talents for a halfhour to inspire us with three hours of music: Ruth Bowers, Judy Chadwick, Richard Merrill, David Morrow and Chandler Noyes. Several hundred festival participants came into the cool Sanctuary that afternoon to hear them; many others enjoyed the music from outside.

6) On December 7 we were pleased again to present Douglas Rafter in a concert of Christmas Music on our special tracker-action organ. We received \$200 from the Georgetown Arts Lottery Council in conjunction with the concert. Total proceeds amounted to \$475.00.

- 7) On Sunday evening, December 16, our combined choirs provided another inspiring evening of Christmas music in our Sanctuary. Followed by the annual Walk to Bethlehem (sponsored by the Georgetown Theatre Workshop), it was a beautiful evening of preparing for the Christmas season. The Music Committee coordinated a supper for all the choir members (over 60 of them!) that night after their various rehearsals and before the concert.
- 8) Finally, the music "highlights" of the year culminated on Sunday morning, December 23, when our talented Bob Knapp directed the Senior Choir in singing his own "A Christmas Cantata". Bob dedicated the Cantata to Phil Southwick in honor of the 25th Anniversary of his Ordination, in his 20th year of being our Minister. The Cantata was beautiful. We hope to hear it again next Christmas.

On behalf of the Music Committee, I would like to extend my heartiest thanks to all of the many people who gave their time and talents so generously to the musical life of our Church this year. We feel very fortunate to have you.
